Work Started On 1962 City Directory

Rotan Lions Club voted to sponsor 1962 issue of City Directory and expect the Chamber of Commerce and Jaycees to co-sponsor the publication.

The 1962 issue is planned to carry much more information and pictures of highlights of Rotan, than previous issues. The Jaycee-Ettes have started making canvass of listings of residents of Rotan, getting name, occupation, house number, street address and phone number. They plan to secure 100 percent coverage. In addition they are gathering information as to number of persons in each family, which will be valuable census information. Their work will prove valuable in the publication.

Plans call for 3,000 copies to be printed in the Advance office. They will be distributed to every home in Rotan and mailed to all boxholders on routes.

Last issue of the City Directory was in 1959 and the supply is exhausted as well as rather obsolete. Chamber of Commerce mails several hundred copies out of town each year upon request and each new resident is given a copy, hence the publication has filled an important part of the business life of Rotan.

1962 issue is expected to be delivered in August.

Rotan Fire Ins. Key Rate To Change

Mayor Morrow has just received the letter below from the State Insurance Department in regard to a change in Rotan's fire insurance key rate. The letter compliments the Fire Department following a recent inspection, and also stresses the necessity of a larger or additional pipeline from the water farm in connection with the proposed 12 inch line from Snyder to water farm: Mr. Justin Morrow, Mayor, Rotan, Texas

Dear Mr. Morrow:

We wish to thank you and your city officials for the cooperation given to our engineer during his inspection of the fire protection facilities of your city. As a result of his inspection your city will be placed in first key; however, it will be several months before your new rate becomes effective since your city will have to be rerated and a new rate book published. The following recommendations are made to show how additional reductions may be obtained in your new key rate:

In connection with your water system, your service pumps, water wells, ground storage reservoir and elevated storage are all sufficient in capacity for your present population. However, your 6-inch supply line is deficient in size which results in a 2c charge in your key rate, and also limits your supply of water to only approximately 400 GPM. We strongly urge that the proposed 12-inch line from Snyder to the well field and the 8-inch line from the well field to town be carried out as soon as possible. If the 8-inch line from the well field to the pump station is installed, the 2c charge would be eliminated. Please be sure the pipe installed is listed and approved by the Underwriters Laboratory to avoid a 5c charge in your key rate.

We are enclosing a copy of our map showing where additional mains and fire hydrants are required in order to remove charges totaling 3c in your key rate. Special attention should be given to replacing the 3-inch main along Snyder Avenue.

In connection with your fire department, we wish to commend the Fire Chief and the members on the fine work they are doing. Our engineer reports the equipment was clean and the members appeared to be drilling properly. Please see that this good work continues in the future.

Your 1938 International pumper failed to pass the required in-service test which results in a 2c charge in your key rate. If this truck is repaired please take it to Sweetwater and have Chief A. C. Forgay test it at his convenience, sending us a copy of the test. If you feel it would not be worth while to repair a truck this old we recommend that a new 500 GPM triple combination pumper be purchased as soon as funds permit.

Much information was given on cotton insect control which is valuable to farmers.

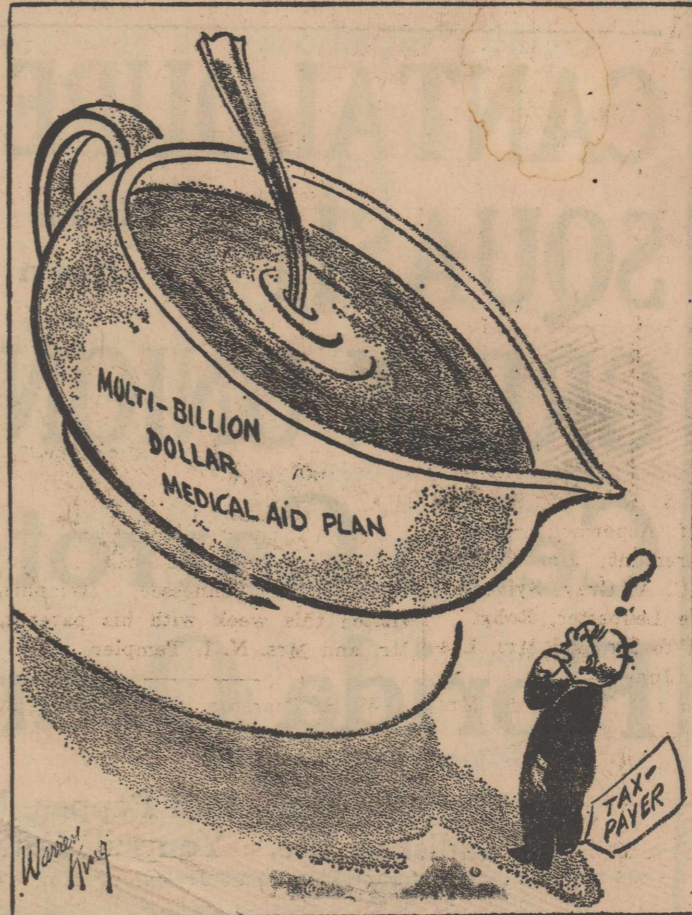

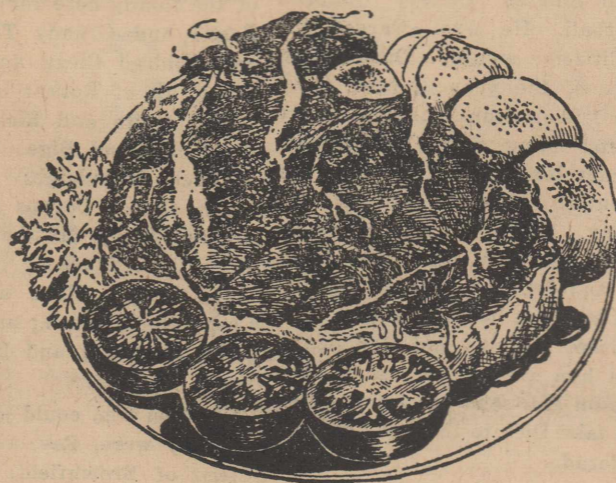

The story of milk goes back to the beginning of civilization. Pre-historic drawings, unearthed in the Sahara Desert and dating back 8,000 or more years, feature picture-stories of cattle. A 5,000 year-old mosaic frieze, found in an ancient temple near Babylon, depicts a dairy scene showing milk containers and strainers.

Down through the years, emphasizes A. M. Meekma, extension dairy specialist, milk has continued to be a food of primary importance in the diet. The Bible makes references to milk and even described the promised land as one of "milk and honey." Marco Polo noted in his early travels that the Tartars credited much of their strength and endurance to milk.

The history of dairying in America predates that of the United States as a nation. Meekma points out that the first dairy cows landed at Jamestown in 1611 and helped bring an end to a terrifying period of starvation. Still later, as the pioneers moved westward, nearly every covered wagon was accompanied by a cow, literally, the family's "food factory" on the move.

For many years now, June has been observed in America as Dairy Month. Meekma says it's the time of the year when the nation recognizes the vital contributions the dairy industry makes to the nation's economy.

And it is also, he adds, the dusty. Modern dairy herds barely resemble the cattle of the pioneers. They are much more productive and more scientifically cared for than the herds of only a few decades ago.

There have also been great changes in the processing and distribution of the product. Milk, today is pasteurized, often homogenized, often fortified with vitamin D, sealed in sanitary containers and, in general, improved beyond the fondest dreams of pioneer American dairy farmers. It is food, concludes Meekma, which provides about 28 percent of our daily nutritional needs for approximately 19 percent of our food dollar.

Hatchery raised bobwhite quail, by agreement with the Texas Game and Fish Commission, are available to 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters for quail management demonstrations, reports Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist. Details on the program are available from game wardens or conservation officers and from your county agent.

Changes in feeding and management practices are required to keep egg shells thick and strong during the summer months, reports Dr. J. H. Quinsberry, head of the Department of Poultry Science, Texas A. & M. College.

With the drone of power-driven lawn mowers about to start, cases of chopped finger tips and toes and serious injuries by mower-propelled missiles will climb sharply.

Neither power nor hand-driven mowers are completely safe in use because they can cut most things they touch besides grass.

Rotary power mowers have blades which spin at tremendous speeds cutting everything in their sweep -- grass, weeds, fingers and toes.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that 75,000 power mower accidents occur each year. More than half the injuries are to the feet and hands. About one-third involve different parts of the body when stones or pieces of metal are thrown by the mower blades.

These missiles can have the impact of a 22-calibre bullet.

Since most injuries are due to carelessness or error on the part of persons using mowers, the Texas State Department of Health advises the following precautions:

First, remove stones, sticks and other objects from the lawn. Then check all bolts, nuts and screws to see that they are properly tightened.

Add fuel before starting the engine, never while the engine is running and keep hands and feet away from mower blades when starting and mowing.

Learn how to stop the mower's engine quickly. Children and pets should be at a safe distance from the mower, preferably inside the

house.

Always stop the engine before pushing the mower across gravel driveways, walks or roads and be sure of your footing when mowing slopes or when grass is wet.

Never plug in an electric mower when it's raining or when the grass is still wet and always check the cord to be sure it is in perfect condition.

The mower should always be moving away from the operator and remember that sit-down mowers have a habit of turning over on sloping ground.

Disconnect the spark wire before checking or cleaning the mower. Mowers with crank-type starters should not be in charged position until ready for use.

Keep fuel in a marked, closed container in a safe place. Regardless of the situation, stop the engine when the mower is left unattended.

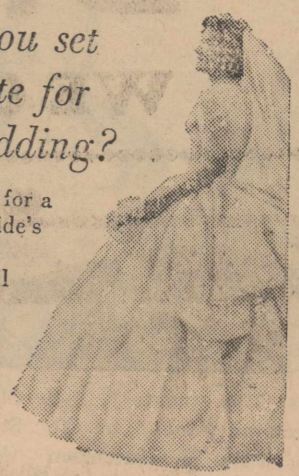

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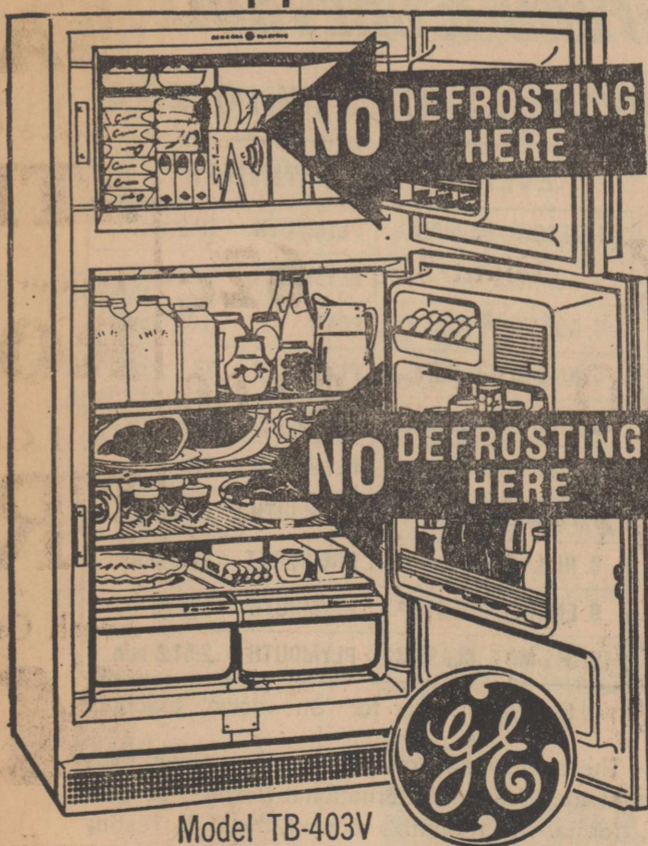

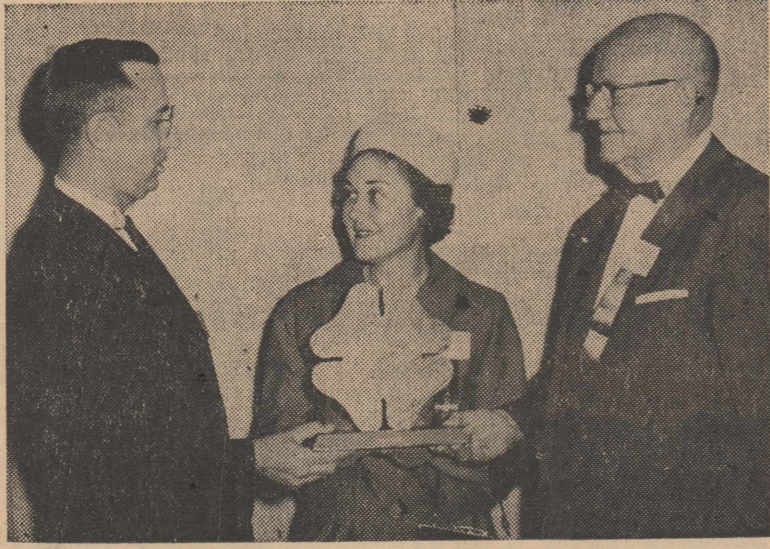

HD Agent Hints—

PERFECT FOR PANCAKES, WAFFLES . . .

A new crop of tasty maple syrup will soon be coming to market from the woodlands of our Northern states. The versatile, aromatic syrup will be excellent on pancakes and waffles, as well as in icings, in cakes and candies and on ice cream.

Foods specialist of the Extension Service explains that top quality maple syrup is crystal clear, light amber in color, and delicate in taste. As the color of the syrup becomes darker, the maple flavor gets more pronounced. Grade labels—either of the state in which it was grown or of the U. S. Department of Agriculture—are good indications of quality.

The USDA has developed color standards which are now in general use throughout the industry as a quality control, following years of research.

FROZEN, CANNED FRUITS IN GOOD SUPPLY . . .

Frozen and canned fruits and fruit juices are important to food shoppers the year-around. They take on added importance during the winter and early spring, when supplies of most fresh fruits are less abundant and more expensive. points out Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension Service consumer marketing specialist.

The frozen fruit and juice pack of 1961 was about 10 percent larger than the 1960 pack. A record 487 million pounds remained on hand Feb. 1 of this year.

Strawberries, red tart cherries, peaches and orange juice concentrate are the big four which domin-

ate the frozen fruit and juice pack. Mrs. Clyatt explains that frozen and canned fruits and juices come from orchard to retail market by quality grades. Retail labels do not wear grades as such, however. Brand names are an indication of quality. Most packers protect their top brand, using it only on their top quality products. Letting the family cast their votes for or against a brand is one way to select canned and frozen fruits. Unfamiliar brands should always be purchased in small numbers for trial-testing with the family.

Frozen fruits and juices should be the last selection on the shopping list as damage once done a frozen

food package can never be undone by refreezing.

Canned fruits and juices should be stored in cool, dry, dark storage cabinets to preserve nutrients, texture, flavor and appearance.

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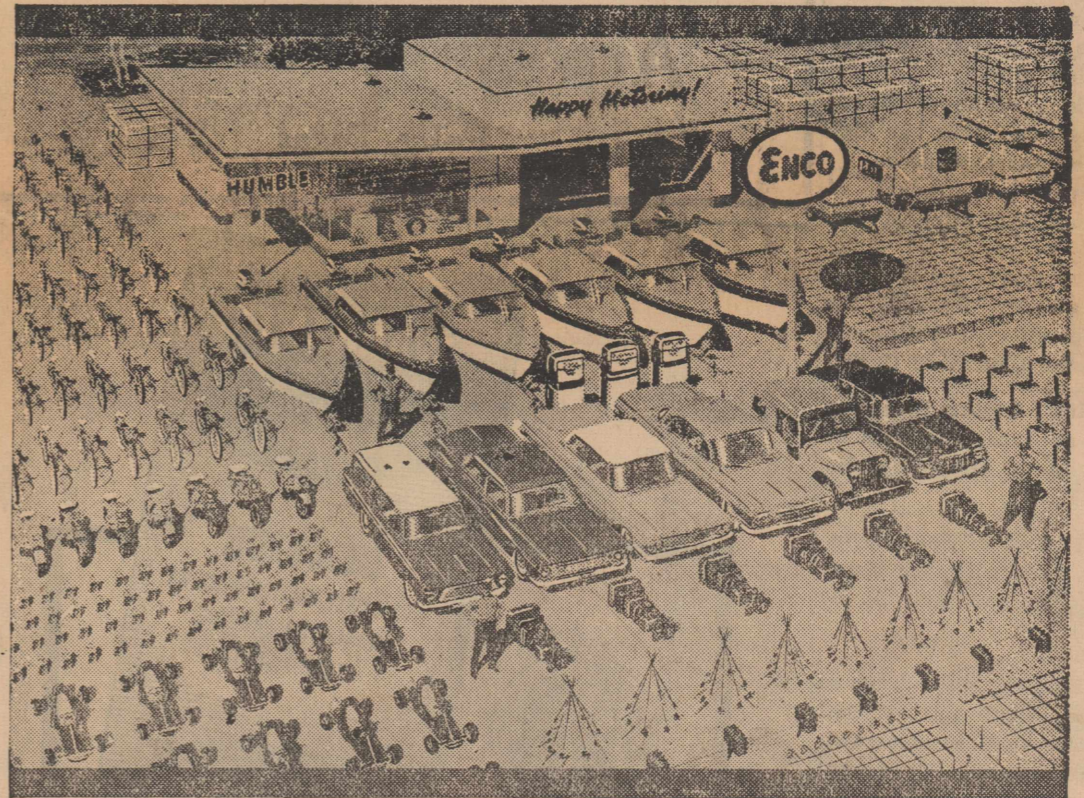
