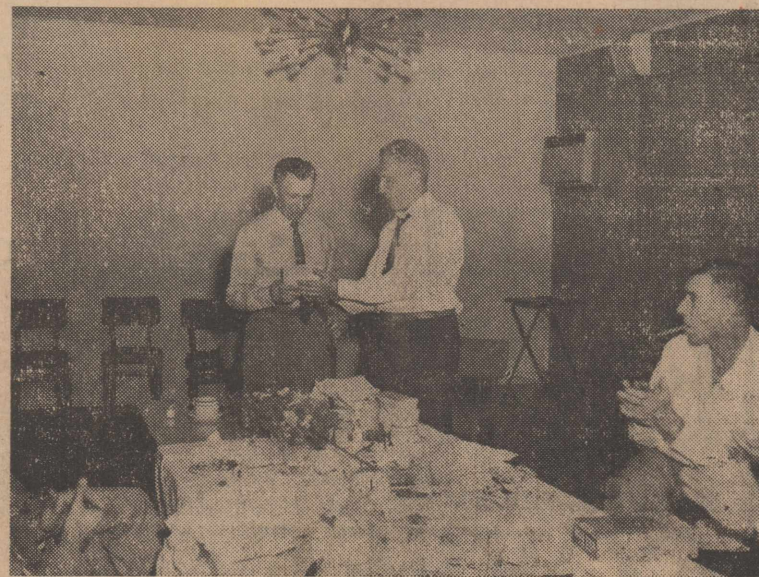

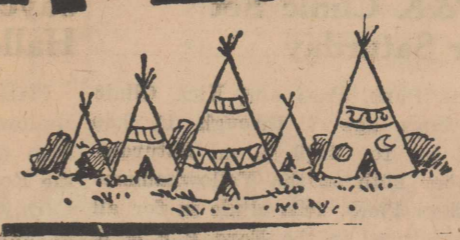

Research On Drying

Many homemakers still believe that there's nothing like sunshine for drying white clothes. They continue to hang their sheets on the line -- even though they may have a dryer sitting idle indoors.

Automatic dryers tend to yellow white muslin -- but so does much sun, research studies show.

Test made by textile specialists at the Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station in Stillwater show that 6 hours in the sun produces nearly as much yellowing as a run in the automatic dryer.

The homemaker who really wants her white clothes to stay white will hang them indoors. Or, she'll put them outdoors in the shade.

Sheets hung in bright sunlight for an hour and a half also showed little yellowing. But beyond that -- for 6 hours, say -- there was a visible difference in whiteness. Six hours in the sun will weaken the fabric in a sheet, too. So, if you prefer to hang your sheets outdoors, do it wisely, hang them in the shade or in a limited amount of sunshine only long enough to get them dry.

If the choice is between sunshine and the dryer, choose the dryer. It's quicker and easier, and often more convenient, and the difference in yellowing is negligible, according to the study.

REFREEZING THAWED FOODS...
When frozen food thaws in your home, is it always necessary to discard it?

Research studies reveal that if the temperature of the food has not risen above ordinary refrigerator temperatures (40 degrees F.), then you may consider refreezing it -- provided it has acceptable odor, texture and color.

The process of refreezing in itself introduces no hazard, the study shows. If the partially thawed food is safe to eat, it is safe to refreeze. These facts about refreezing may prove helpful to the homemaker.

Frances Reasonover, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, reminds. The research findings come from USDA's Agricultural Research Service and other agencies.

A rise in a food's temperature up to thawing impairs color, flavor, and texture, and the refreezing period causes further loss of quality. If the total time involved in short enough, there may be enough quality left to justify refreezing.

No health hazard is involved if the temperature of the food has not risen above ordinary refrigerator temperature. Food-poisoning bacteria have never been found to grow at temperatures below 38 degrees F., and they grow very slowly between 38 and 45 degrees, other bacteria can grow slowly at these or even lower temperatures, and they cause off-odors and off-flavors that spoil foods but do not cause food poisoning.

FROZEN BEEF MORE TENDER?
Rapid freezing of steaks makes them lighter and brighter and more tender, according to foods and nutrition specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at the A&M College of Texas.

An impartial taste panel rated frozen steaks better than not-frozen steaks -- in flavor, tenderness, and overall satisfaction. The only thing the tasters didn't like about the frozen beef was the amount of juiciness.

The research work on Frozen beef was conducted by scientists at the Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station in Stillwater.

Highway Construction Work Is Completed

Construction has been completed on eight highway projects located in Fisher and Nolan Counties. A contract was awarded E. M. Bailey Contr., Ltd. & J. H. Strain & Sons Inc., of Abilene by the Texas Highway Department on April 13 for this construction work which consisted of seven projects located in Fisher County and one project in Nolan County.

This construction was State Highway Betterment and Farm to Market Improvement work and was completed in 101 working days at a total cost of \$190,278.37.

In Fisher County, work consisted of constructing 3 culverts and approaches on State Highway 92, 6 miles east of Rotan to 1 mile east; adding a passing lane on US Highway 180, 3 miles east of Roby; constructing 5 culverts and approaches on FM 1085 from Sylvester to 7 miles southeast; constructing one culvert and approaches on FM 1224 located 1.2 miles south of State Highway 92; constructing 2 culverts and approaches on FM 57, 1 mile southwest of Longworth; 10 culverts and approaches on two projects on FM 419 from 7 miles southwest of Roby to the Nolan County line.

In Nolan County, work consisted of constructing a culvert and approaches on FM 419 two miles north to Sweetwater.

Authorization for the construction work on State Highway 92 and US Highway 180 was made in December 1960 under the 1961 State Highway Safety and Betterment Program. Construction work on State Highway 92 consisted of replacing the I-Betm spans with 3-10x10x80 multiple box culvert on the West Fork of Gyp Creek, 3-10x10x86 multiple box culvert on the Middle Fork of Gyp Creek and 2-8x8x56 multiple box culvert on the East Fork of Gyp Creek. Drainage has been improved by widening the channel both up and down stream on the Middle Fork of Gyp Creek. Construction work on US Highway 180 consisted of constructing a 16 ft. climbing lane on the north side of the existing pavement. The completed section consists of 39' two course surface section with an 8' shoulder.

Authorization for the construction work on the FM Highway projects was made in December 1960 under the 1961 FM Highway Improvement Program. The construction on these projects consisted of rebuilding selected short sections by improving the grade and installing culverts in some of the dip sections to provide more adequate drainage. Drainage was further improved by widening the existing channel adjacent to structures.

Nelson Shave, Senior Resident Engineer at Hamlin was in charge of the project while it was under construction.

Each bidder submitting a bid for the construction of such street improvements will be required to bid on forms provided by the City, which forms may be obtained by any interested bidder at the office of Lubbock Engineering Company. No plans and specifications will be given to Contractors during the 48 hour period prior to letting time.

The character and amount of good faith deposit to accompany each such bid is stated in the aforementioned contractual documents.

The City of Rotan reserves the right to reject any and or all bids,

to waive any and all formalities, and to accept the bid which seems the most advantageous to the City.

There must be paid on this project not less than the generally prevailing rate of wages which has been established by the City. A list of such wages as so established is bound with the contractual documents.

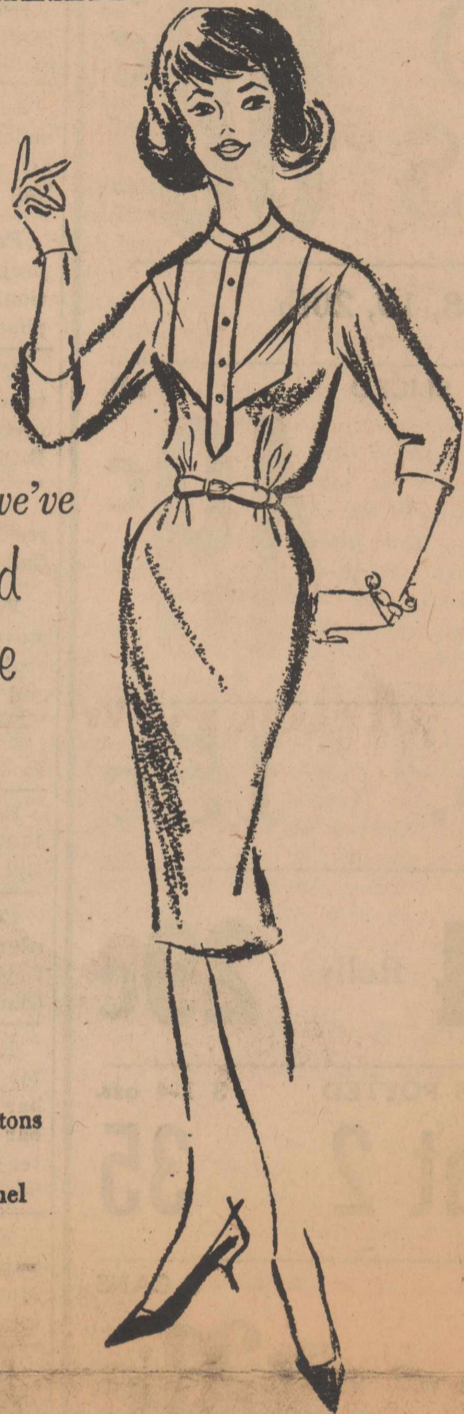

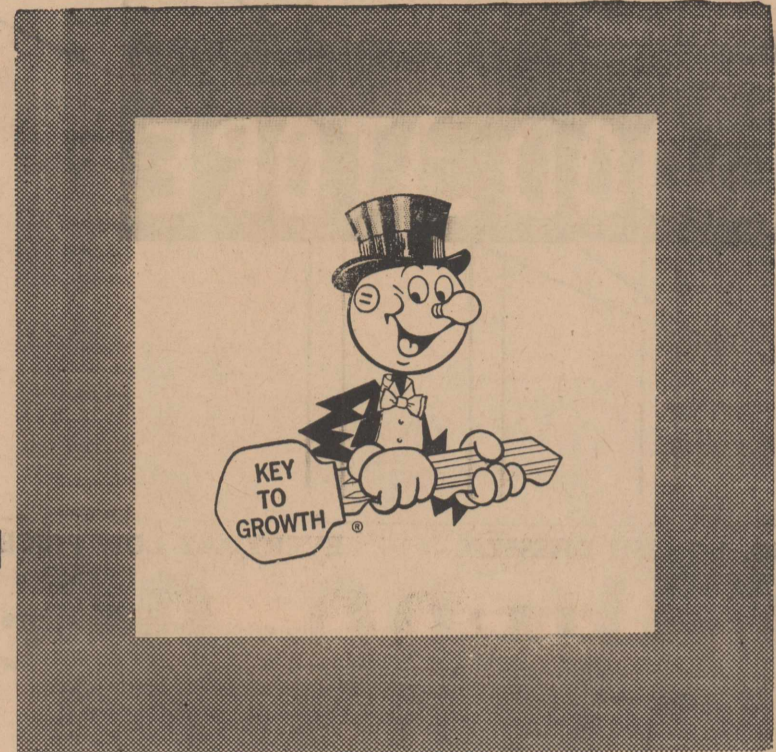

Return of the 'Square'

Non-involvement has become an accepted way of life, and one of the great dangers of affluence is that it permits such detachment, according to Charles H. Brower, president of Batten, Barton, Durstine & Osborn, Inc.

In a call for "our return" to the forces that made America great, the advertising agency executive told the Dallas Advertising League in the Hotel Adolphus here today that a six-letter word should be "restored to its proper place in our vocabulary" -- the word "square."

"Back in Mark Twain's day," he said, "square was one of the finest words in our language... You gave a man a square deal if you were honest. And you gave him a square meal when he was hungry. You stood foursquare for the right as you saw it, and square against everything else. When you got out of debt, you were square with the world. And that was when you could look your fellow man square in the eye."

A lot of strange characters then got hold of this "honest, wholesome, word," with the result that a square today, is "the man who never learned to get away with it; a Joe who volunteers when he doesn't have to; a guy who gets his kick from trying to do something better than anyone else can; a boob who gets lost in his work; a fellow who doesn't have to stop at a bar on his way to the train at night because he's all fired up and full of juice already."

"This country was discovered, put together, fought for and saved by squares", Mr. Brower said. "It is easy to prove that Nathan Hale, Patrick Henry, Paul Revere, George Washington, Benjamin Franklin and almost anyone else you care to include among our national heroes are a square -- by simply thinking what he might have said had he not been square."

"Nathan Hale -- 'Me spy on those British. Are you trying to be funny? Do you know what they do with the spies they catch? I'll give you a news flash, chum, they HANG them!'"

"Patrick Henry -- 'Sure, I'm for liberty. First, last and always. But we've got to be a little realistic. We're a pretty small outfit. If we start pushing the British around, someone is going to get hurt.'"

"George Washington -- 'Gentlemen, I am honored. But I do wish you would try someone else. Let's say General Gates. I'm just getting things organized at Mount Vernon. Also you might say I had already served my time. Against the French, you know.'"

Stating we are living in a country quite different from the one we were taught to love, Mr. Brower said, "What has happened to us, I think, is that we have changed from an exporting country to an importing country... We have been importing instead of exporting ideas."

"The United States of America was once the greatest exporter of ideas the world had ever known. We created and sold abroad the idea of individual dignity, responsibility and freedom. We reated and sold the idea of government of the people, by the people and for the people... We exported the idea of freedom of worship, of an unfettered press, the idea that those who are taxed should be represent-

ed."
The force of government, he noted, "is now directed more fully toward the security of the weak than the encouragement of the strong."

DEATH BY LOSS OF PERSONAL FAITH

"Of 21 notable civilizations, 19 perished not from external conquest, but from evaporation of belief within," he added, quoting historian Arnold Toynbee.

"Today our country still has a choice. I believe it has already begun to make that choice," he said. "I believe it is going back to its old beliefs in such things as ideas, pride, patriotism, loyalty, devotion and even hard work."

But the forces of conformity are still strong, he said. Too many of us are still sitting it out instead of sweating it out. Too many of us haven't got the guts to stand up straight and dare to be square.

"To many of us know the short cuts, and too few know or care where the path leads. Too few of us leave the path, because the path is always the easy way, the way

most people go. But there is no path to the future, no path to greatness, no path to progress. No path to outer space or to inner satisfaction."

In concluding, Mr. Brower noted that "we have, at least, the satisfaction of knowing our problem is not new. When Benjamin Franklin was told the war for independence was over, Franklin said, 'Say rather the war of revolution is over; the war for independence has yet to be fought.'"

"Today -- 146 years later -- the war for independence has still to be fought."

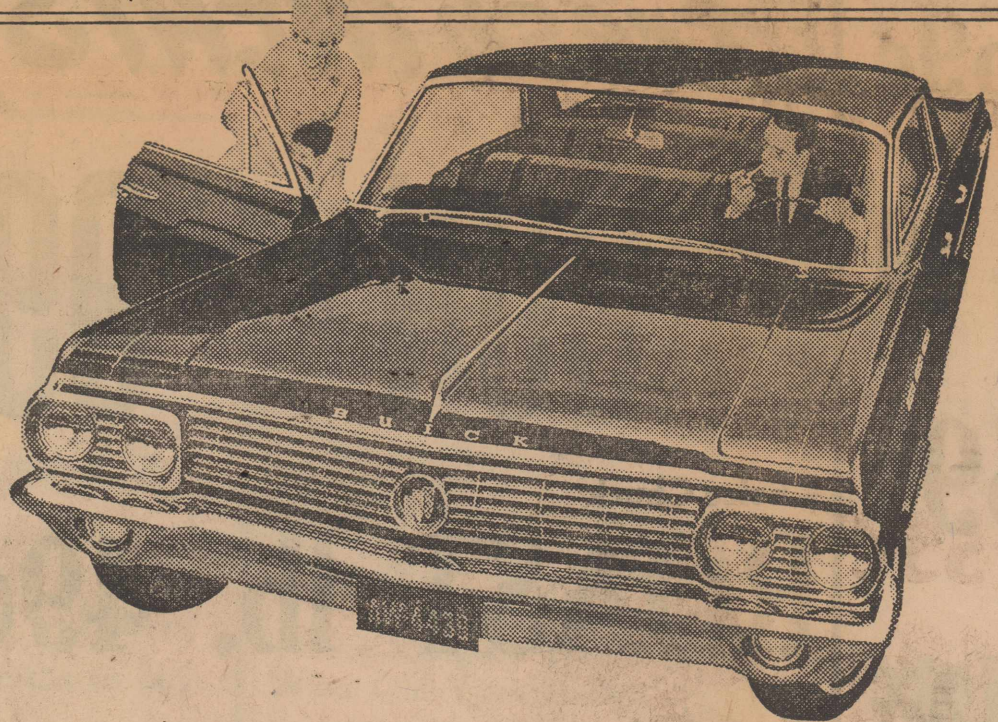

Texas Rangers To Wear Old Type Badge

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today the Texas Rangers are going back to the tradition-steeped Mexican silver badge worn by their predecessors in frontier days.

Garrison said the new official Ranger badge, issued to each of the 62 members of the force, is a replica of the badge which old-time Rangers carved out of Mexican silver pieces when Texas became a state and their duties changed from military to law enforcement.

The best information available indicates that the five-pointed star on the badge symbolizes the "Lone Star" of Texas. The points are supported by an engraved wheel.

When the Department of Public Safety was created in 1935 and the Rangers became part of it, this badge was replaced with a solid badge of somewhat different shape and design. Then in 1957, a different badge was adopted for all officers of the Department, including the Rangers. This is a modern version of the old Ranger badge, with a five-pointed star surrounded by a royal blue background.

The history of the Rangers dates back to 1823 when Stephen F. Austin hired a contingent of 10 men to "range" over a wide area to protect his colonists from Indians. Since that time, the force has been synonymous with the suppression of lawlessness and crime--first the Indians, then the bandits and cattle-rustlers, then the outlaws of the early 20th century, and finally the modern-day criminals.

Local Residents Are Checking SS Benefits

During the July-September quarter 222 Rotan residents have taken the time and interest to check up on their own social security rights and responsibilities, according to Don Austin, field representative from the Abilene social security office, who visits here each month.

Of the number 40 filed claims monthly benefits under either the old-age, the survivors, or the disability insurance provisions of the social security program.

R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager, suggests that all persons past age 62 who have not talked with Austin or some other social security representative in 1962 make plans to do so, unless (1) they are already receiving monthly social security checks, or (2) they have never had any earnings covered by social security. The 1961 changes in the law made many more people eligible for some payments even though they were still employed past age 62, and also permit payments to some who were denied before 1961 because of not having worked long enough to be insured.

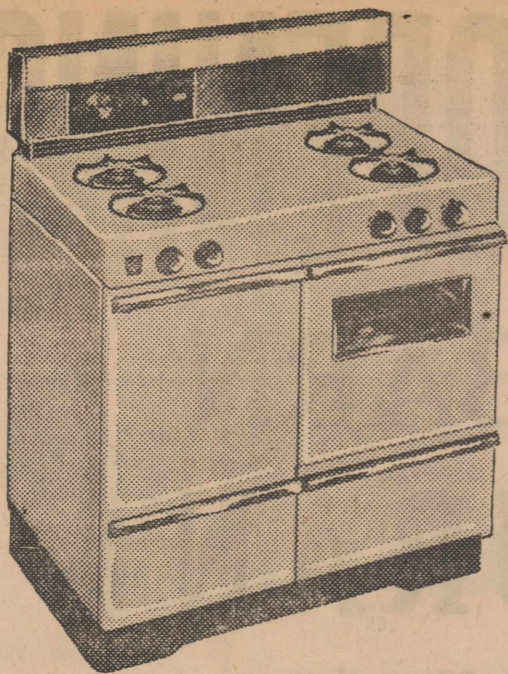

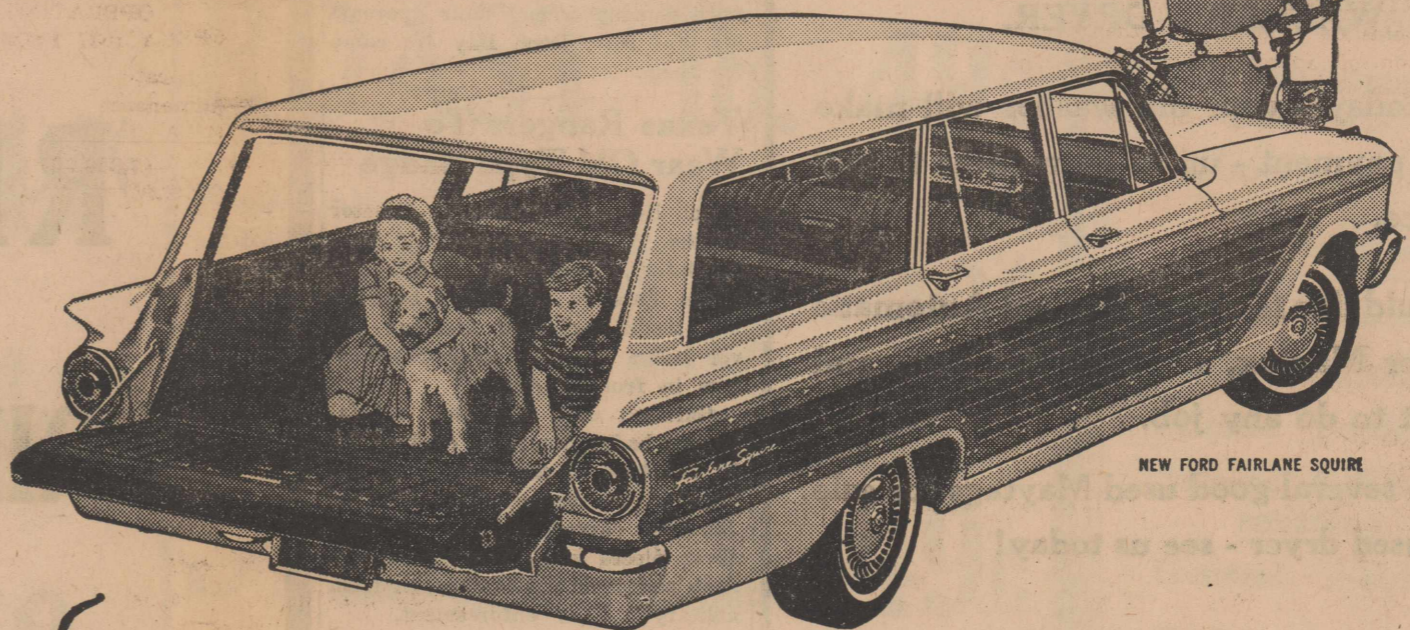
