Not only would it prevent the irresponsible ownership of nuclear devices by the Chinese Communists, but would be a clear and unmistakable warning to others who are in various stages of eveloping their own.

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



These programs—the Texas approach, we call it -include medical benefits to Old Age Assistance recipients and extensive health cost protection through the use of special insurance plans for the aged. The Texas legislature is also expected to implement a medical care plan for those who are not on Old Age Assistance but who do need help in meeting medical expenses.

Consider these facts:

\* 229,000 needy aged, representing 30 % of Texas' entire aged population, now have a Blue Cross-Blue Shield health insurance policy paid for by the State,

\* This State program provides hospital, medical, surgical, x-ray, and nursing home benefits.

\* 72% of the aged in Texas now have one or more health insurance policies,

\* Through the 'Texas 65 Health Insurance Plan, "Blue Cross" "Senior Texan Service," and other special programs offered to the aged by private companies, health insurance is available to all who want it at a reasonable cost,

\* Studies by Belden Associates indicate that only a small percentage of the aged actually still need and want help in paying health costs (these aged would be covered by the program now being considered by the Texas Legislautre).

In view of these facts, the national "medicare" tax proposal (the King-Anderson bill, H. R. 1) is not needed. "Medicare" benefits are very limited, covering about one quarter (25%) of the total

yearly health care costs of the average aged person. "Medicare" would not cover physicians' services or surgical charges, nor would it cover the cost of drugs outside of institutional care.

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The "medicare" proposal is an extremely expensive one. While we all are starting to enjoy a reduction in federal income taxes as a result of action by Congress last year, the "medicare" program would cost an estimated \$1.7 billion dollars in additional taxes the first year. "Medicare" would increase payroll taxes to cover everyone over 65 even the wealthy. The employee who now pays a maximum tax of \$174 annually would find the amount for Social Security benefits and "medicare" increased to \$291 by 1971. Employers would pay a similar increase for each employee, thus resulting in higher prices for goods and services.

The Texas approach of providing medical, surgical and hospital care to those who need it is a more comprehensive, more economical program than "medicare" and it provides more benefits. If you object to paying higher payroll taxes for an undesirable, unneeded program, write your Congressman today. Ask him to oppose the "medicare" tax proposal, mentioning the programs for the aged now available in Texas. Ask him to support the Herlong-Curtis Eldercare Bill (H. R. 3727), which would make possible the broadening of the existing Texas program to provide medical, hospital and nursing home care for those few remaining aged who are still in need of help.

The development of resistance to insecticides, deposit of harmufl residues in the soil or on neighboring corps and destruction of beneficial insect parasites and predators distate the judicious use of insecticides. If possible, their use should be restricted to actual need based on inspections.

The guide, in addition to listing the recommended control measures, point out many other important factors involved in the overall problems of controlling cotton insects and the safe use of insecticides.

All insecticides are poisonous and the need for using them in strict accordance with the manufacturer's labeled instructions is emphasized.

Off-Flavored Milk -- The setback calves suffer at weaning may possibly be reduced by feeding the mother cow some material which gives her milk a bad taste, says Dr. Jan. C. Bonsma, visiting professor at Texas A&M University. The famed animal scientist from the University of Pretoria, Republic of South Africa, points out that calves lose a tremendous amount of weight during the weaning period and the loss might be prevented if the calf gradually weaned itself due to its dislike for the mother's milk.

FHA Has New Loan Program

A new loan program, recently, announced by the Farmers Home Administration, is designed to help rural families finance enterprises that will improve their incomes, according to County Agricultural Agent, James S. Norman.

The FHA County Supervisor, George Dorman, has informed Norman that the new loans are a part of the Economic Apportunity Act of 1964. They can provide up to \$2,500 for up to 15 years at a 4 1-8 percent interest rate. Rural residents can get the loans on the basis of their ability and character.

According to Dorman, the loans are for people who know a good way to increase their income, but who cannot readily get financing through regular credit channels.

The county agent said farmers can borrow for improvements, land, equipment, livestock, machinery, buildings or other items that will add to their income from farming.

Non-farm rural residents can use the same plan to finance a small business, trade or service. This includes loans to set-up such things as small repair shops.

Another provision of the new FHA program provides leans to establish cooperatives for processing, marketing and other services of benefit to farmers.

Anyone interested in additional information about the new loans should contact their county FHA Supervisor, located at Rotan, or their county agricutural Agent.





Anyone who thinks measles is a harmless childhood disease is sadly mistaken.

In the first place, "chlidhood disease" is a misnomer. Any person, regardless of age, who has not had measles may have them. Measles is, however, rightly associated with childhood since 90 percent of our children have it before their fifteenth birthday.

Secondly, measles is not the harmless illness that most mothers seem to think it is.

Although recovery is routine for most children, about 500 children in the nation die every year from illnesses steming from it. Or, a side-effect can be inflammation of the brain, leading to mental retardation.

Last year 71,629 measles cases were reported in Texas. Satistics show several charactistics of the disease. One is that every two or three years, a reservoir of susceptible children builds up. A measles epidemic empties, the reservoir. Nearly all children who are exposed

and not protected come down with measles.

Another fact the figures show is that February through April is the measles season - that is, more cases occur during this time of the year.

A virus so small that measures only from two to five millionths of an inch in diameter is responsible for the disease.

A child coming down with measles may seem to have cold symptoms - dripping nose, watery eyes, wheezing and similar discomfort - about 10 days after exposure. The first sure sign that it is measles is the appearance of "Koplik spots" - bluish-white specks surrounded by redness in the mouth. A blotchy rash follows on the child's face and body, as the sign most of us recognize as measles. If your child develops any of these symptoms, contact your physician at once.

Today, you can keep a child from having measles and eliminate the possibility of serious side-effects with immunization against measles. Why take a chance; see your family physician.


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
