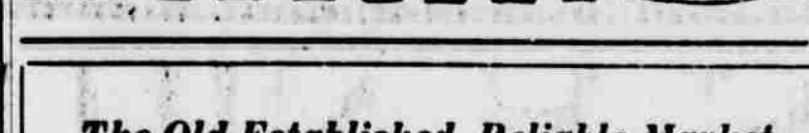

1,600 Degrees Heat In Ordinary Fire

How hot is a fire? may be deserving of the answer reserved for the question "How long is a string," but science, co-operating with the Haskell fire department has catalogued temperatures as one part of its effort to reduce fire hazards here.

For years experts associated with the United States Bureau of Standards and private research laboratories have studied the problem of fire hazard. Apparent indifference on the part of builders who were counting only first costs and depending upon luck, however, has restricted progress and kept insurance rates on a high average, statistics recently compiled show.

In their investigations scientists found that the temperature develop-

ed in the ordinary conflagration reaches approximately 1,600 degrees of heat. The intensity of this heat may be imagined when it is pointed out that steel beams are unable to sustain their own weight in a fire which generates 1,000 degrees of heat.

To discover a substance whose use would foil fire was the problem experts had before them for years until it was found that certain clays, when properly treated, would resist several thousand degrees of heat. Studying the effect of fire upon fire brick and clay linings in ovens it developed that the proper clays, found in great quantities in Texas, could be plugged and pressed into a hollow tile for structural purposes.

Following this discovery and subsequent tests wherein actual houses were erected with structural clay tile for the walls, vast new industry sprang up in Texas.

Surveys over the state show that clay deposits have been worked in 75 or more counties. The clay tile industry in Texas today represents a production of over \$6,000,000 annually and is growing steadily.

Increase in the use of structural clay tile for building of homes, commercial structures and farm buildings, records show, is responsible for the growth of the clay industry in

Texas. Economists estimate that within a few years it will develop into one of the largest native Texas industries.

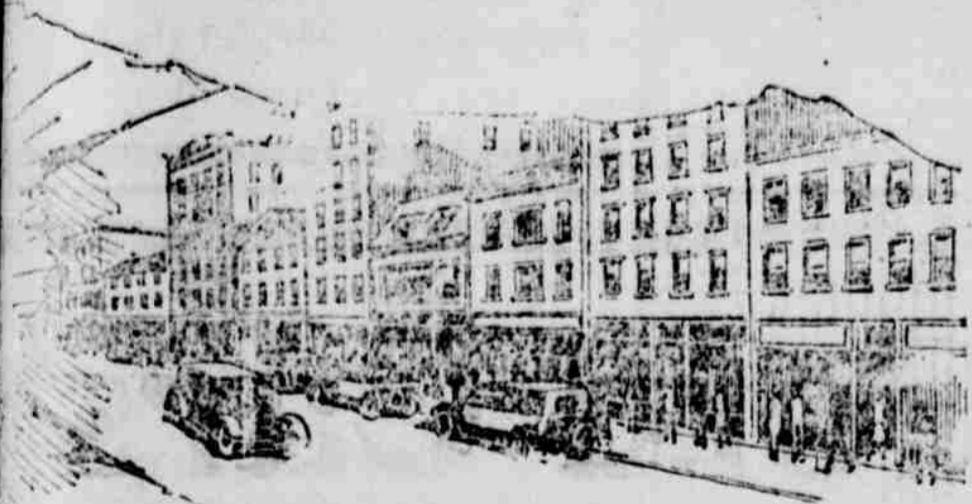

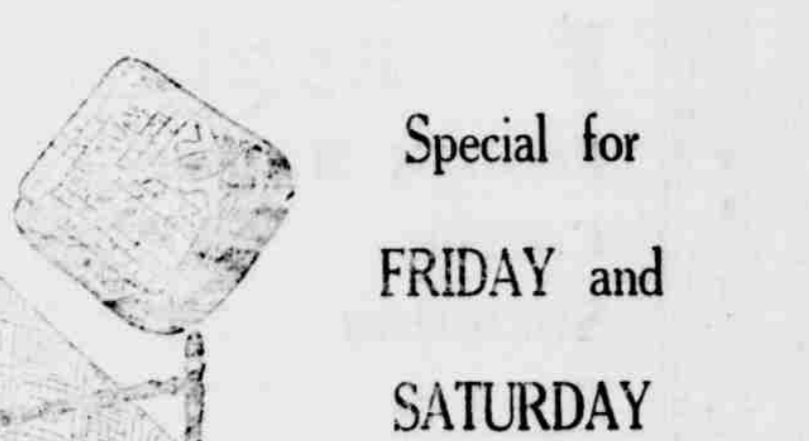

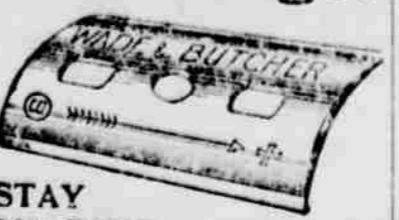
