1966 Savings Bond Report

United State Savings Bond sales in Fisher county during 1966 totaled \$41,460, according to R. L. Springer, chairman for Fisher county Savings Bonds Committee. The 1966 sales goal for Fisher county was \$50,000 and 83% has been achieved.

During 1966 Texans purchased a total of \$153,172,007 in Series E and H Savings Bonds. This represents 104 per cent of the state's goal of \$147.5 million. Sales in Texas during the month of December totaled \$13,790,961 which is an increase of 19 per cent over the same period of 1965.

Gray Boys Hurt At Stephenville

Two sons of Mr. and Mrs. B. W. Gray of Stephenville were seriously injured about 8 a.m. Sunday morning, and John Scott, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Von Scott of Hico was fatally injured when their Jeep overturned pinning them beneath.

Mr. and Mrs. B. W. Gray and family are former residents of Rotan and the boys are grandsons of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Gray who recently moved from Rotan to Stephenville, and Mr. and Mrs. P. D. Parks of Roby.

Injured in the mishap and being treated in Stephenville Hospital are Robert Dale Gray, 14, and his brother, Jerry Dan, 11, both of whom are listed in fair condition.

Robert suffered a cerebral concussion with amnesia and multiple cuts and bruises. Jerry suffered a broken wrist, extensive cuts and bruises and possible internal injuries and a cerebral concussion.

Gray and his eldest son, David were summoned to the scene by young Scott's grandmother, Mrs. J. W. Scott, 60, who lives on the place where the accident occurred. They along with Ray Clap, another neighbor, lifted the Jeep from the youths and Clapp took them to the Hico Hospital. The Gray boys were later transferred to Stephenville.

SCS Soil Surveys Are Available

"The Rotan Work Unit Office of the Soil Conservation Service has recently received the published Soil Survey for Fisher County," reports Bob Price, Work Unit Conservator.

The book contains aerial photographs of entire Fisher County. Superimposed on these photographs are physical features such as roads, houses, gravel pits, ponds, etc. Also the photos show soils delinations and soil maps. The narrative portion of the book explains the physical characteristics of the soils and recommended management practices for each individual soil. Work toward publication of this book has taken approximately 10 years.

To date the books have been distributed to the Vocational Agriculture Dept. of the Rotan Public Schools and to the members of the Rotan Lions Club. A program on the book and its use will be given this Thursday to the Roby Lions Club at their regular weekly meeting. Copies of the book will also be distributed to the Vocational Agriculture Dept. of the Roby Schools.

These books are available at the SCS office in Rotan and are free of charge. Anyone interested in obtaining a copy is invited to come by and pick one up. Any of the SCS personnel will be glad to explain its use.

Projected Cotton Yield Increased

"The possible \$2 million dollar increase in projected yield income payable to Plains cotton farmers under the announced additional reserve allotted to Texas resulted from the refusal of Farmers Union and Texas members of Congress to give up in their effort to get USDA to correct erroneous projected yield allocations for certain skip-row pattern counties for 1967."

The state farm organization president called from Washington to advise several county Farmers Union presidents in the Rolling Plains area that Texas was being awarded an additional three pound per acre on the state's projected cotton yield to adjust "hardship situations and inequities" in the yield announced for 1967.

The state ASC Committee has the responsibility of allotting the additional poundage, but has been instructed to use it in counties disadvantaged by the skip-row pattern of planting.

The good news for Rolling Plains cotton farmers was released from Senator Ralph Yarborough's office while the Texas Farmers Union president was in Washington. According to Naman, "The additional projected yield was released in response to persistent appeals by Senator Yarborough, Congressman Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls, Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson, and Congressman W. R. Poage of Waco, who recognized that the projected yield figures for 1968 unjustifiably penalized areas of Texas that had traditionally planted cotton in skiprow pattern."

In a letter to the senator and the congressmen, Naman praised their effort in behalf of west Texas cotton growers who had been unjustly penalized.

Some counties that have been particularly adversely affected by the original projected yield announcements might recoup as much as \$100,000 in income as a result of the additional projected yield allocation. Fifteen to twenty Rolling Plains counties should be materially helped by the boost, and it is believed that all twenty-three counties generally considered in the Rolling Plains will be helped to some degree.

"Even though this is a step in the right direction to correct grievous wrong, we will continue to work to see that all projected yield inequities have been completely corrected and that there will be no penalty because of any pattern of planting cotton," stated Naman.

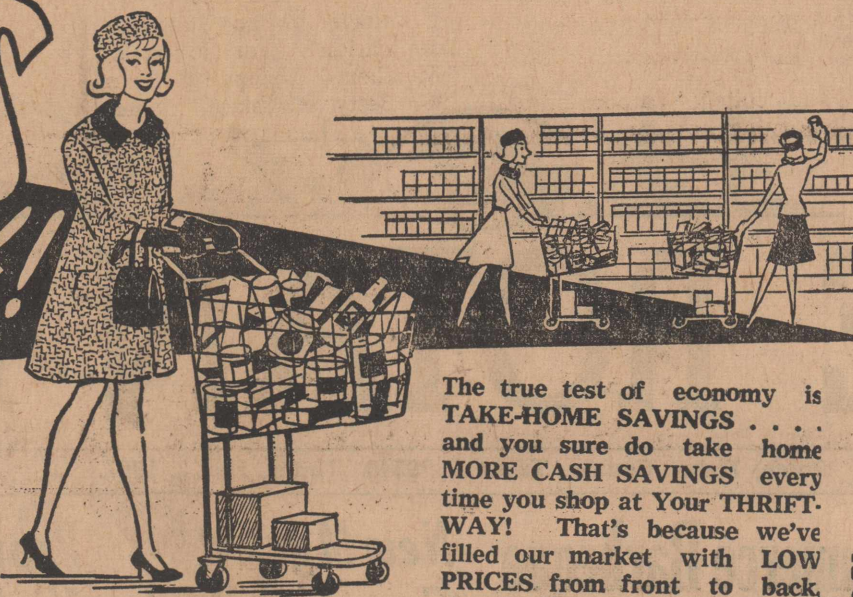

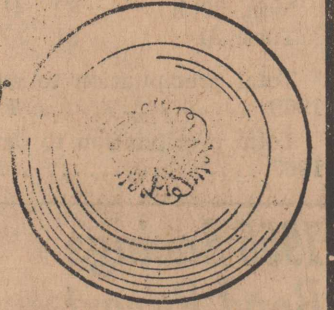

Difference in Boys Girls B-B Games

Cotton Meeting Planned El Paso

El Paso — (Spl.) The National Cotton Council today announced plans for the 1967 Western Cotton Production Conference to be held here at the Rodeway Inn, March 7-8.

Production problems peculiar to the western grower will be analyzed by a number of experts reporting on latest production methods and research findings.

An extensive examination of insect control problems and research developments is scheduled, with one-half devoted to this topic. Pink bollworm problems will be discussed during one session by a panel of speakers including a producer, a researcher, and an extension specialist.

Working chemical weed control practices into an over-all weed control program will be the topic of one speaker, while a two-man panel will delve into the area of chemicals and equipment in coordinated weed control.

Other topics on the two-day program include a report on basic research for future production and areas of emphasis for increasing yields. Practical on-farm irrigation and soil problem solving will be other production topics discussed.

A research worker and a producer will analyze the results of variable row spacing in western cotton production, while other speakers will consider quality in planting seed and the economic trends in over-all cotton production.

A session on wilt defoliation is also scheduled.

The El Paso Valley Cotton Association will serve as local host for the meeting which is co-sponsored by the Southwest Five-State Cotton Growers Association and the National Cotton Council. The meeting is open to anyone interested in cotton and no registration fee is involved.

Farm Employers To File Form 943

Dallas — Employers of farm workers are required to file Form 943, Employer's Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employees — 1966, and pay over their share of Social Security taxes plus amounts withheld from employees wages, on or before January 31, 1967, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for northern Texas announced today.

These taxes applied to cash wages of \$150 or more paid to each employee in 1966 or on cash wages in any amount even though under \$150 in 1966, if the employee performed agricultural labor on 20 or more days during the year, Mr. Campbell said.

The rate of tax is 4.2 percent for the employer and 4.2 percent for the employee or a total of 8.4 percent on the taxable cash wages paid.

A "Crew Leader" is treated as an employer under the law for the purpose of these taxes the director said.

Tips on Social Security Benefits

Wayne Baker, social security representative for Fisher county has some timely time saving tips for you. When you come to file your application for social security benefits, Baker says if you bring the necessary proofs with you it can save days and in some cases weeks in getting your monthly benefit started.
He says that in most cases where you are filing for your retirement benefit you will need only two things: proof of your 1936 income and proof of your age. If you were self-employed in 1966, you will need to bring a copy of your complete 1965 income tax return which the social security administration can keep. If you paid your income tax by check and the cancelled check has been returned to you, bring it with you. The cancelled check will be returned to you. If you worked for wages, your copy of form W-2 is all that is needed. This also will be returned to you.

Next is proof of your correct date of birth. According to Baker, some people tend to panic at the thought of having to prove their correct date of birth. He says that actually most people have had proof lying around their home for 25 or 30 years and don't realize it.

There are many things which can be used as proof of age. First, if there is any document such as a birth certificate or baptismal record made before your fifth birthday, a certified copy must be furnished to the Social Security Administration. (If you were born in Texas in 1903 or later, you should write to the county clerk of the county in which you were born giving him your date of birth, your full name at birth, your father's full name and your mother's full maiden name. Enclose a \$1.00 money order.)

If there is no record of your birth which was made before you were 5 years old, the Social Security Administration requires you to furnish the oldest proofs available to you. This can be an old insurance policy, poll tax receipt, delayed birth certificate, one of your children's birth certificates if your age is shown on it or most any other old record where your age or date of birth is shown. If you have any of these items, bring several of the oldest ones with you. If you don't have anything, don't worry about it because the social security employees are experienced at "digging up proofs" and they are more than glad to help anybody who asks for help.

Baker has this caution for people, "If you don't have any proof of your age, start getting it now even if it is two or three years before you will be filing for your benefits." The social security employees will be glad to assist in any way they can at anytime and there is no charge for their services. A representative is in Rotan at Police Dept. on Tues. at 10 A.M. on the following dates: January 24, February 7, 21, and March 7, 21.

If you prefer to conduct your business in the district office at Abilene, it is located in the Post Office Building at N. 3rd and Pine. It is open each weekday from 9:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M. except national holidays. The Abilene office remains open until 8:00

P.M. each Tuesday so that working people can get in to see them.

All Under 65 To File Tax Return

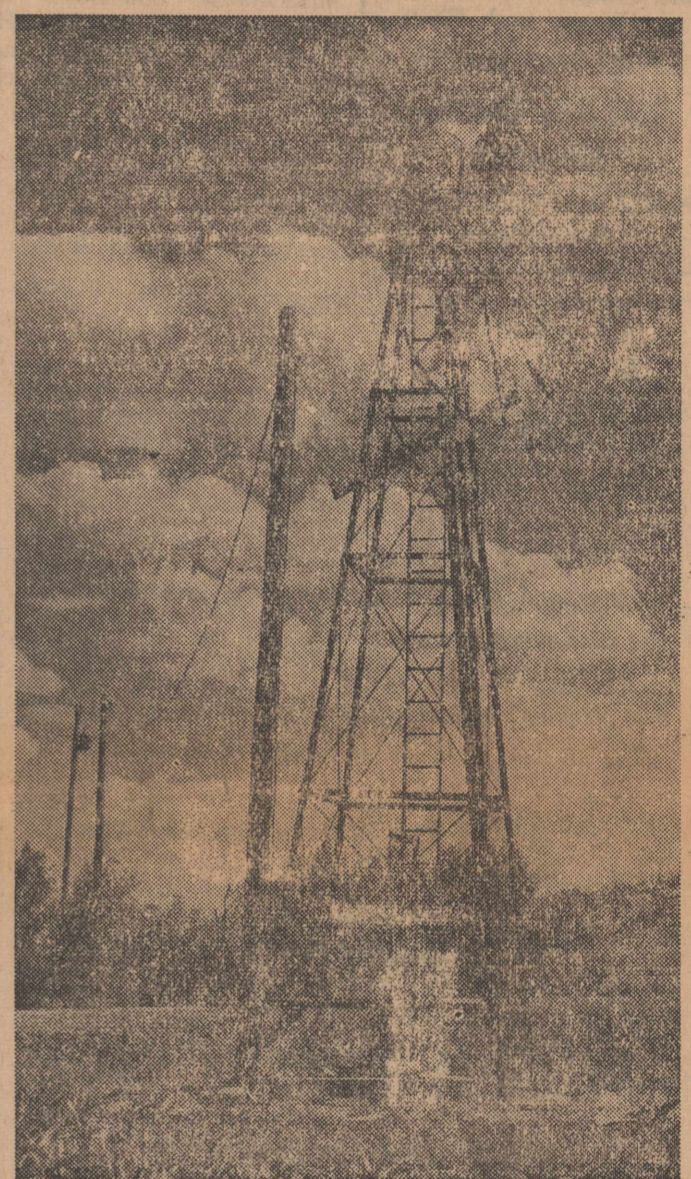
Dallas — Everyone under 65 years old, whether single or married, who is a citizen or resident of the United States and had gross income of \$600 or more during the year must file a return, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of the Internal Revenue Service for northern Texas advised taxpayers today.

If you are 65 or older on the last day of your tax year,

no return is required unless gross income was \$1,200 or more. If your income is under the above figures, you should file a return to obtain any refund due you of income tax withheld from salaries or wages.

Businessmen, farmers, and other self-employed persons must file a return if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.

Document No. 5107, which furnishes more detailed information on this subject, may be obtained by dropping a post card to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, 1600 Patterson Street, Dallas, Texas 75201.

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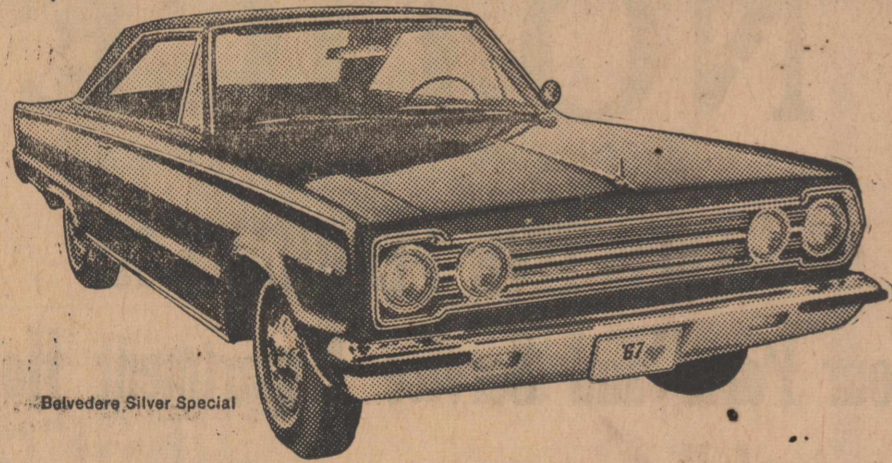
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
