Herron In Calf Scramble Mar. 4

Mike Herron, Rotan 4-H Club member has been selected to participate in the "world's greatest calf scramble" at the Saturday, March 4th, 2:00 p.m. performance of the Houston Livestock Show Rodeo in Houston's famed Astrodome.

Contestants come from every county in the state and are selected by the 4-H and F.F.A. leaders in each area. The boys are guests of the show at the performance in which they participate. Dates of the show are February 22 through March 5.

When the Houston show held its first scramble in 1942, 24 calves were awarded. It was not dreamed that the project would result in putting some 4,000 boys into the cattle business in the next 22 years.

In 1944, 112 boys scrambled for 56 calves in 5 contests. Each year the calf scramble activities increased and more and more sponsors stepped forward.

The Calf Scramble Contests became so popular with the rodeo audiences that for the past twenty years, there has been a contest included as an event in each performance of America's Wildest Rodeo.

During the course of one season, 384 boys now scramble for 192 calves. Half of the calf certificates are given to boys interested in dairy cattle and the other half to those who prefer beef cattle.

When the calf scramble contestant wins, his work has just begun. With his cash certificate he purchases the best animal he can find. He must then care for the calf, furnish monthly records to the Houston Livestock Show and his sponsor, and return his animal to the show the next year.

As a result of the Calf Scramble contests, over a million and a half dollars in livestock, cash and prizes have been put into the hands of Texas youth, giving them a substantial start in business.

Dates for the Houston show are February 22 through March 5. It opened with the traditional downtown parade beginning at 1:00 p.m.

Governor's Proclamation

OFFICIAL MEMORANDUM by John Connally, Governor of Texas

Austin, Texas—Greetings: Special observance of increased emphasis on our education system has been marked annually for fifteen years by a Public Schools Week in Texas.

During this period, parents are encouraged to visit the public schools, and all citizens are urged through special programs to recognize the tremendous importance of our system of education. Our goal is to make Texas public schools the finest in the Nation, and to achieve this our citizens are urged to take an active interest in the school system and to cooperate with their school boards, superintendents, principals and teachers.

Never before in our history has there been a greater need for educated leadership. As we rush to train young people in science and technology to keep pace with world events, it is also important to remember that our public schools will furnish our tomorrow's leaders, with the basic human, moral and spiritual foundations necessary for more advanced training and knowledge.

Therefore, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the period of March 6 to 10, 1967 as PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK in Texas.

Texas Public School Week To Be Observed Here March 6th to 10th

Public Schools Week in Texas will be observed March 6 to 10 and parents and citizens should visit their community schools to see what is going on in education.

The visitor to a school today may not see it at first glance but the public schools in Texas are in a period of critical transition.

The visitor will see bright new equipment in the science labs. But he should keep in mind that new achievements in science and space research are outdistancing the text book writers and the school must race to keep up.

The mathematics classroom the visitor sees may contain new and ingenious teaching aids. But the visitor should realize that education al research is moving so fast that the schools must continually re-evaluate their curriculums least they fall behind current developments.

The school principal can point with pride to the expensive new language laboratories. But the visitor should remember that more and more expensive equipment will have to be purchased and from somewhere, somehow the money to buy it will have to be found.

A teacher may tell a parent about a summer program being planned for disadvantaged preschoolers. This should be him enough that the American school system is rapidly becoming a major vehicle for social action among poverty groups. Poverty areas overlap other areas and all, the rich and the poor, will be affected.

Another teacher may talk about good attendance at his school. But every school is troubled by the dropout prob-

lem. The factors which cause a child to drop out of school before graduation are primarily rooted in the home, but the schools are being expected to solve the dropout dilemma.

The visitor to a school may be attending an open house in a brand new school building. But the population growth in Texas is so great that many more schools are needed than can be built. This is a problem the local community must solve strictly at the local level, from a severely strained, inadequate local tax base.

The teacher a visitor encounters during Public Schools Week is the best qualified teacher in the state's history. But each year Texas needs from between 9,000-9,500 new teachers. About one-third of this number is needed to take care of increasing enrollment. The remainder is needed to replace teachers who are retiring or who are seeking employment in non-teaching jobs. At this time, there is inadequate financial promise offered to new teachers in order for Texas to continue attracting well qualified young people into the teaching profession. And there is inadequate financial promise to hold them there to become career teachers.

The visitor to a Texas public school can take pride in his state's educational progress. But he should take note that a society which is demanding more and more from the schools must in return furnish increased financial support and increased moral support for the professionals in charge of the schools.

Mr. Bryant was enroute to his farm home about four miles northeast of Roby when the accident occurred.

Funeral service was held Friday at 2 p. m. from Weathersbee Chapel with Rev. E. L. Yeats officiating. Burial was in Roby cemetery under direction of Weathersbee Funeral Home.

Mr. Bryant, a retired farmer was born April 25, 1888 in Tyler. He was married to Doshia Knight in Tyler Nov. 7, 1907. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

DAR Chapter Observes Am. History Month

"The Lesser-Known Signers of the Declaration of Independence" was the subject of the program given by Mrs. Robert M. Faver at the Nancy Harper Chapter DAR meeting held recently in Sweetwater. Mrs. Wade E. Forester was hostess to the chapter at the Sweetwater Country Club.

Mrs. Faver in introducing her program state that in keeping with the American History Month Observation -- "it is my purpose to bring to you some facts concerning the lives of the lesser-known but no less heroic man who mutually pledged to each other their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor, the signers of the Declaration of Independence."

A picture of John Trumbull's painting, "The Declaration of Independence," was displayed by Mrs. Faver and also a photostatic reprint of a facsimile of the original document of the Declaration of Independence about which Mrs. Faver said, "WE see and recognize (in the painting) the committee whose duty it was to draft this document, Robert Livingston, Roger Sherman, Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, and Benjamin Franklin. But what of those other men whose names are not familiar to us? Are they any less worthy of our praise than are the more noteworthy signers? Unfortunately, history has not recorded the noble acts and brave deeds done by all the signers, but we may assume, from the lives of those about whom we can read, they not only pledged, but gave their lives and fortunes. It is interesting to note that the Revolution cost \$100 million raised without taxation.

The speaker traced the events leading up to the Declaration of Independence, stating that, "The war against England began long before the drafting and signing of the Declaration of Independence. There had even been open warfare, as when on April 18, 1775, the red coats marched on Lexington and Concord to seize military stores and capture the patriots, John Hancock and Samuel Adams, upon whose heads the British had a price of 500 pounds each.

Mrs. Faver traced the history of the signing from the second Continental Congress until its unanimous acceptance by the representatives who signed it, knowing that the King had declared every Rebel in the land a traitor, and penalty for treason was death by hanging. On July 4, 1776, only John Hancock, president, signed on behalf of the members of the Congress, and Charles Thompson, secretary, attested the signature. The delegates ordered the Declaration to be read in all provincial assemblies, pulpits, market places and army camps On July 19, 1776, the Declaration was ordered "engrossed on parchment" and signed by the Delegates. On August 2 they began affixing their signatures. For fear of reprisals against the signers and their families, the signers names were not made public for six

months.

Mrs. Faver told of the vengeance wreaked on the signers and their families who were confined to filthy barracks, treated brutally, their homes burned. William Floy and his family were exiled from their home. Phillip Livingston lost his vast estate, his business stock and implements. One signer, Abraham Clsrk's two sons in the army were captured and put on a prison ship in loathsome conditions. Judge Richard Stockton was dragged from his bed, brutally beaten, thrown into prison, and his home burned. Robert Morris, who became the financier for the Revolution, lost about 150 of his own ships and when the crash came in 1798, he lost everything he had left and was thrown into debtors prison in Philadelphia.

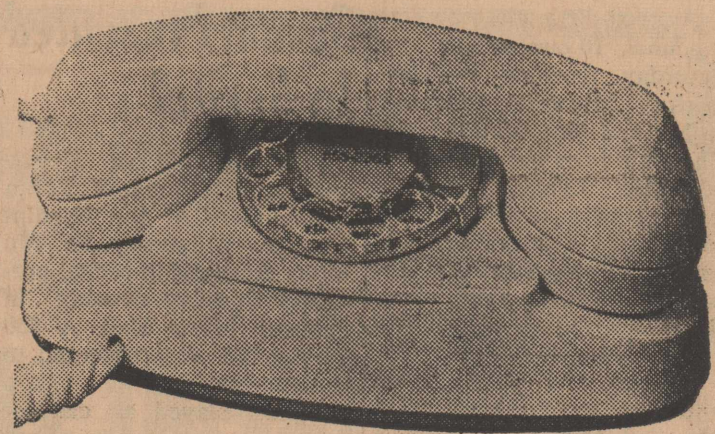

Charge For Princess Phone Is Reduced

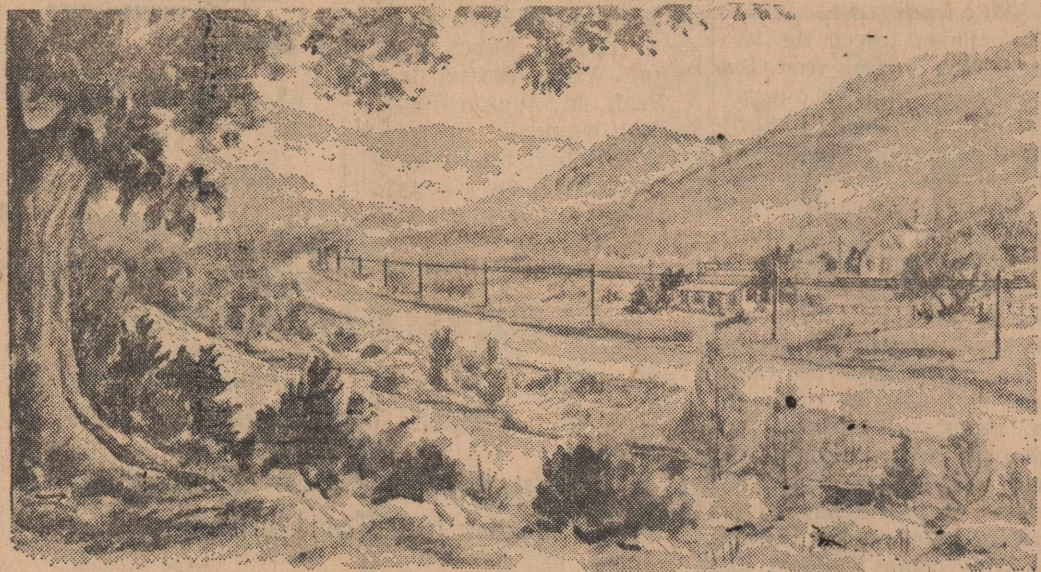
EFFECTIVE March 1, the monthly charge for a Princess® telephone is reduced from 75¢ to 50¢ for Southwestern Bell customers in Texas—a 25¢ reduction.
