## COMMISSIONERS COURT ORDERS POISONING OF PRAIRIE DOGS

Poison to Be Furnished by County at Cost to Land-Owners.

Notices are being sent out this week to all land owners in Haskell county acquainting them with the proceedings of the state law ordering the killing of all prairie dogs, the provisions of which are embodied in an order passed by the Commissioners Court in November.

In compliance with the law, necessary poison has been prepared under Government supervision and can be had from the County Clerk, the county only charging the land-owner with the cost of the poison.

The order as passed by the Commissioners Court is given below.

**Court Order Declaring Prairie Dog a Nuisance and Ordering Killing of Same in Accordance With State Law and Sheriff's Notice.**

To All Land Owners, Lessors or Tenants of Haskell County, Texas: By an order of the Commissioners Court of Haskell County, Texas, made at the November term of county commissioners court, 1929 and entered of record, you are required to destroy all the prairie dogs on your premises by law, which statute is as follows:

Art. 6328 a.—Prairie Dogs Declared a Nuisance. Duty of Land Owners to Exterminate. That the Prairie Dogs are hereby declared a public nuisance and the owner of any land in any county in this State upon which prairie dogs exist shall, within two years after this act takes effect, kill or cause to be killed all dogs in land so owned by them. (Acts 1915, 1st, Ch. 11, Sec. 1.)

Art. 6328 b.—Investigation by Commissioners Court. Notice to Owners. It is hereby made the duty of the Commissioners Court of any county in which prairie dogs exist to investigate and determine whether owners of lands in their respective commissioners precincts have complied with the provisions of Section 1, of this act (Art. 6328a) and if any such land owners have failed or refuse to destroy the prairie dogs on their land, it shall be the duty of Commissioners to immediately notify the sheriff of his county of such failure, and the name and postoffice address of such owner or his agent, that if he shall fail within thirty days from the date and after the mailing of notices by the sheriff, to comply with the terms of Section 1, of this act, that the sheriff shall immediately proceed to destroy all dogs on said land. (Id. Sec. 2.)

Art. 6328 c.—Duty of Sheriff to Exterminate Prairie Dogs. Audit of Expenses. Compensation of Sheriff. After the failure of any owner to comply with the provisions of Sec. 1, of this act (Art. 6328a) and the terms of Sec. 2, Art. 6328b, destroy said prairie dogs, it shall be the duty of said sheriff to immediately destroy the dogs on the land of said owner and to use the practical and economical methods in

destroying such animals, dogs, and small mammals as may be present. All the expenses of such destruction shall be paid by the property owner, and the amount so paid by the sheriff, shall allow and cause him to be paid, and by his order duly entered assess said amount against said owner and same as a debt against the land.

It being further provided, however, that the Commissioners Court may compensate the sheriff the sum of not to exceed Five (\$5.00) Dollars per day for each and every day the sheriff shall have performed actual service in the manner of supervising the destruction of said prairie dogs. (Id. Sec. 3.)

Art. 6328 d.—Enforcement of Assessment. If the owner of any land against which assessments and expenses have been assessed by the Commissioners Court shall fail to pay the same in thirty days after notice of assessment, it shall be the duty of the County Attorney of such county to bring suit in any court of competent jurisdiction to enforce the payment of such costs and expenses, and the County Attorney shall, in each suit brought by him for said purpose, be allowed a reasonable fee, to be fixed by the Court trying the case, which fee shall be taxed as costs in the case, and upon the rendition of any judgement for such costs and expenses, execution and order of sale shall issue and be executed as in cases of other judgements. (Id. Sec. 4.)

Art. 6328 e.—Investigation by Commissioners Court. Notice to Owners. It shall be the duty of every lessor tenant holding premises by contract to procure the poison and destroy all pest described in this act and all expenses incurred by such tenant or lessee in the destroying of the pest shall be charged against the owner of the land and collectible as other valid debts. (Id. Sec. 5.)

You are therefore notified to destroy all prairie dogs on your land, either as owner, lessee or tenant.

You are further advised that in accordance with order aforesaid, that I, as County Clerk, will have the necessary poison prepared under Government supervision in Haskell, Texas, for the purpose of destroying all prairie dogs on your land.


