



Proposed Constitutional Amendment
Providing for a State Board of Education and Relating to Terms of School Officers.
(H. J. R. No. 14)

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 16, providing that the term of all officers of the public free school system, including State institutions of higher education, may be fixed not to exceed six years, proposing to amend Section 8 of Article 7 of said Constitution, authorizing the appointment or election of a State Board of Education to serve not to exceed six years, requiring said amendments to be submitted to the people for adoption and making appropriations therefor.

Section 2. That Section 8 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 16 as follows:
The Legislature shall fix by law the terms of all officers of the public school system and of the State institutions of higher education, inclusive, and the terms of members of the respective boards, not to exceed six years.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment
Authorizing Legislature to Grant Confederate Pensions Regardless of Date Pensioner Came to Texas or When Widow Married Pensioner or When She Was Born.
(H. J. R. No. 15)

Section 1. That Section 31, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing a tax levy for Confederate soldiers and sailors and their widows, and providing for the submission of same to the qualified electors of this State at any election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1928, and providing the necessary proclamation and appropriation to defray expense of proclamation, publication and election.

Section 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be needed is hereby appropriated for the expense of publication of said Amendment.
Approved by the Governor, March 30, 1927.

and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations of militia, provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax now herein levied, and provided further, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be needed is hereby appropriated for the expense of publication of said Amendment.
Approved by the Governor, March 30, 1927.

We have just completed arrangements whereby we become the authorized depository of The Texas Farm Bureau Federation for the storage of Calcium Arsenate in Haskell County.
This means that there will be a nearby supply of Calcium Arsenate available for poisoning worms, and that it may be bought at the same price one would pay in Dallas, saving transportation charges.

WOOL COTTON TRIAL BEGUN AT LAMESA

Six seed of a new variety of cotton, known as Wool Cotton, costing one dollar per seed, have been planted for experimental purposes in Dawson county this year.

Jimmie Odell and A. B. Hefferman of Lamesa are conducting the trial, believing that the South Plains will prove an adaptable habitat. The seed was grown with fairly successful reproduction and adaptation in Taylor and Haskell counties last year.

The wool cotton grows as does ordinary cotton with about the same stalk bolls and the same sort of cultivation. The lint is of the finer and more silken type, strong and with extra long staple. At present there are no gin plants that can take care of this cotton if produced in large quantities.

It is estimated that it will take four years to complete the experiment, owing to the fact that only a very limited number of wool cotton seed are now available.

L. Baldwin owner of the building the sign has been completed.

"Haskell" in letters 9 feet high and 3 feet wide, painted in white on the roof of the postoffice building will serve as a guide to any passing plane.

HOW TO POISON THE COTTON WORMS

The cotton leaf worms, boll worms, and the "Careless Worms" or the web worms, have appeared in the cotton fields of Haskell county to a greater or less degree. Many acres of cotton in the county have been practically destroyed by the webworms, while to date the damage done by the boll worms and the leaf worms has not been so great.

Due to the fact that the web worm spends a great deal of its time eating under a web it is more difficult to destroy than the leaf worm, yet the web worm can be killed by the same poisons as are used for the leafworm; however, the difficulty comes in getting the worm to eat the poison. Where the web worms are detected in the fields in local areas it is wise to first apply the poison to the cotton around the infected spot than apply it to the cotton where the worms are eating. Should the cotton where the worms are eating have most of the leaves off it would be practically useless to apply the poison to it due to the fact that the cotton would not hold the poison and it would be wasted on the ground. The webworms migrate to new cotton stalks as soon as they have destroyed the one on which they are eating, so if the poison is applied in front of the worms the chances of killing them will be greater.

In applying the poison to the cotton the spray pump has been found to be the most economical and practical for this section of the state. For the leafworm 2 pounds of Calcium Arsenate to the barrel of water has been found to be sufficient, yet in poisoning for the webworm the poison should be increased to about 4 pounds for the same amount of water.

Where webworms are present in the cotton field on the small careless weeds the cotton should not be plowed at the present time, as the worms prefer the careless to the cotton, yet will go direct to the cotton if the weeds are plowed out.

In poisoning the webworm the poison should be applied as much as possible to the under side of the leaf. It will be noted that the webworm eats most of the time on the under side of the leaf and especially if the weather is warm; also in eating, matters not whether on the top or the underside only half of the thickness of the leaf is destroyed, so if the poison is on the top and the worm is underneath the same leaf very little poison, if any, will get until he comes out of his web and crawls around to another location. The poison can be easily applied to the undersides of the leaves by having a board or other arrangement just in front of the nozzles to knock the cotton forward as the spray is applied.

In poisoning for the webworm and the leaf worm only standard poison should be used, as there is danger of burning the cotton foliage with lye and other such mixtures. Results in the poisoning of the webworm may not be as quickly noticeable as is the case with the leafworm, yet many of the worms will be found dead after a few hours if close inspection is made.
