

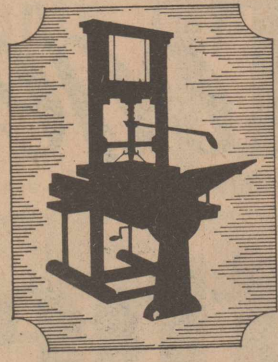

Rotan High Changing To Quarter System In Fall

The Rotan Independent School Board passed a policy at their last regular meeting implementing the "quarter system" into the 1976-76 school year. The new system, according to Superintendent Tom Harkey, will allow the school to be more flexible on increasing the elective curriculum.

The school will be in a position to offer some mini-courses and 12 weeks courses in such things as arts and crafts, various types of fine arts, journalism and student leadership in future years. The administrative staff at Rotan High School will be attending workshops this summer in an effort to better familiarize themselves with the advantages of the new system.

Instead of the traditional 6 six week periods the quarter system will be made up of 3 twelve week sessions. In larger overcrowded school the fourth quarter (summer session) will be used.

The full explanation of the quarter system, courses, electives, credits and additional information as passed by the board is carried for your information below.

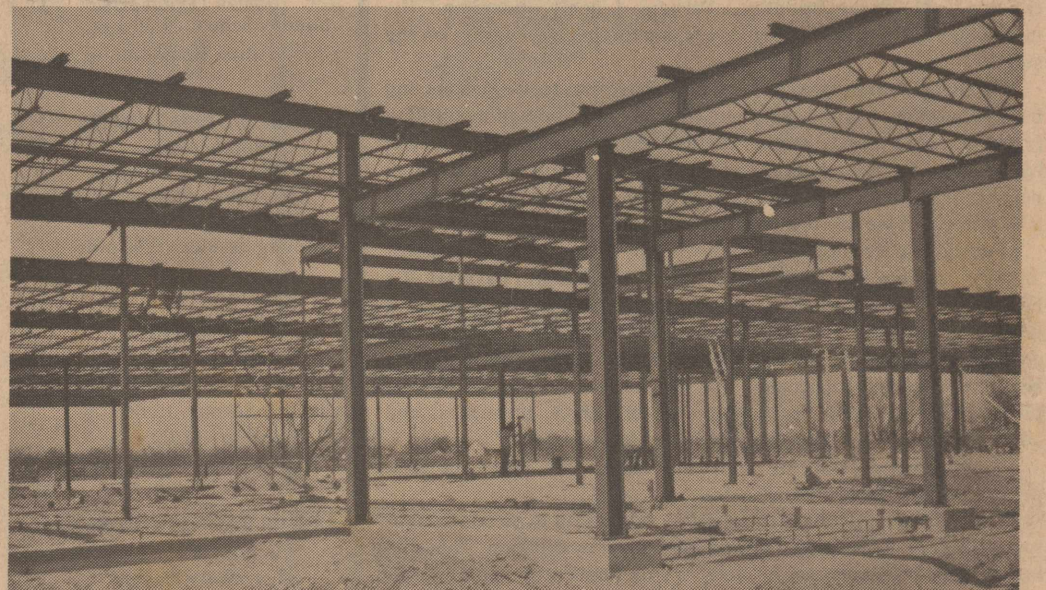
In changing from the semester plan that has been in effect for many years to the quarter system, a number of changes become necessary. Most of these changes are very minor and involve terminology, time and credit allocations, etc. with the length of the school year and most course requirements remaining the same.

So that there may be a better understanding of the quarter system, short descriptions of various aspects of the program are herein offered.

Length of Quarter (Trimester) & School Year: A quarter shall consist of approximately 60 days. The school year will consist of three quarters for a total of 180 school days.

Course Grades and Credits: Most courses will be taught for three quarters (all year) but some will be taught for only two

Rotan Band Parents Will Meet Monday

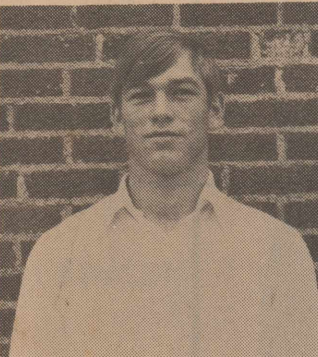
The Band Parents Club of Rotan High School will have a meeting on Monday, April 28, at 7:30 p.m. at the High School Band Hall.

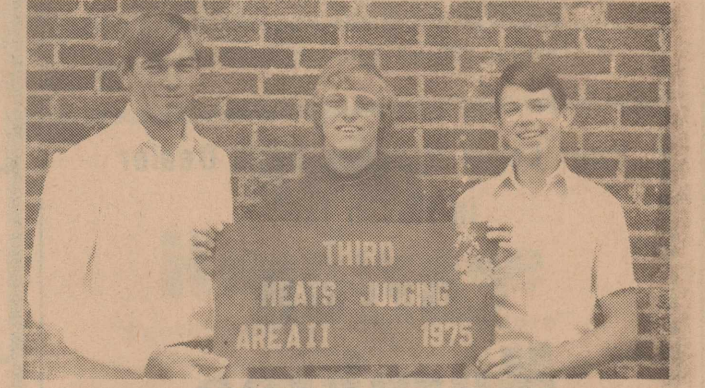
Rotan Spanish Freshman To Hold Fiesta

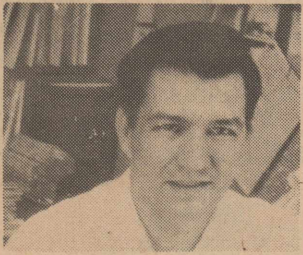


MEAT TEAM: The Rotan Meats Judging Team will compete in State competition this weekend.

Kim's Korner

Recently to this department came a clipping from R. W. Matthews. He is now retired but for many years was a teacher, Lubbock High principal and, finally, Superintendent of Schools there.

The clipping appeared in a Topeka, Kansas publication called "Bench Warrent". Judging from comments often heard around here, it will ring the bell with a number of people.

It's titled, "Please Be Brutal!" and goes like this:

"An Open Letter to the Chief of Police:

"One of the most common phrases heard in our society and our city today is 'Police brutality.' Perhaps I don't understand the meaning, but I would like to give you one mother's viewpoint on the subject.

"To begin, I should first tell you that I have two teen-age sons and being a mother, I cannot help but want the very best of everything for them. I am a 'typical mother' in that I don't want to see them hurt by anyone. I am not a typical mother, for I see things many mothers never hear of, much less become involved in, because my husband is a minister and we see the very best and the sordid worst.

"I would like for you to be brutal with my sons. Is that a surprise? If you find them speeding in a car, please be brutal. I have sat at a hospital holding a grieving mother's hand because of someone's mistake. That was brutal. I have always gone with my husband to tell a wife her husband was killed. That was brutal. I have helped nurse a beautiful teenage girl crippled in a wreck. That was brutal. I have played organ music at funeral services for babies, teenagers, and adults because someone drove too fast. That was brutal.

"If you should catch my under-age sons, with liquor in their possession, please be brutal.

"I have sat all night by my husband's side trying to piece together two under-age young men's lives, both broken by drinking. That was brutal. I have listened to the horrors experienced by another man while he was drunk and heard him recall the many jails he had served time for this. That was brutal. I have helped feed hungry children because a drunken father didn't come home. That was brutal. I have tried to console a mother whose daughter was killed after being struck by a drunken driver. That was brutal.

"If you should find my sons with drugs in their possession, please be brutal.

"I have tried to rehabilitate a woman just out of prison for shooting her husband while she was drugged. That was brutal. I have seen a handsome young man turn into an old ugly one because of drugs. That was brutal. I have seen a young mother who was addicted to a drug scream and rave for lack of a "fix". That was brutal.

"If Police ever see my sons doing something that isn't thoroughly in the interest of society, please be brutal. I have walked into a hushed, sacred church that was stripped of everything that could be sold. That was brutal. I have seen a lovely, expensive home and yard completely torn up by vandals. That was brutal. I have seen a school and its marvelous equipment torn apart by young vandals. That was brutal. I have wiped a little boy's tears and helped him hunt for his stolen bicycle. That was brutal.

"If you should ever catch my sons doing anything illegal, please be brutal! I have come to realize that your kind of 'brutality' cannot in any way compare with the brutality that comes from breaking our laws.

"My husband and I have tried to teach our sons that their rights end where someone else's begin. We believe they have learned this lesson, but in case they forget, we look to you and others who influence their lives—teachers, coaches, etc.—to see that they remember.

"I do not want my two sons to grow up into two grownup boys. I want them to become men; able to assume their places in this world and make good contributions to it. I sincerely hope they make good contributions to it. I sincerely hope they won't need your help; but if they do, and if you must, then be brutal..."

top of the hill



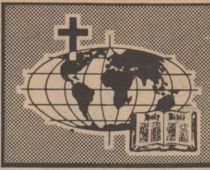

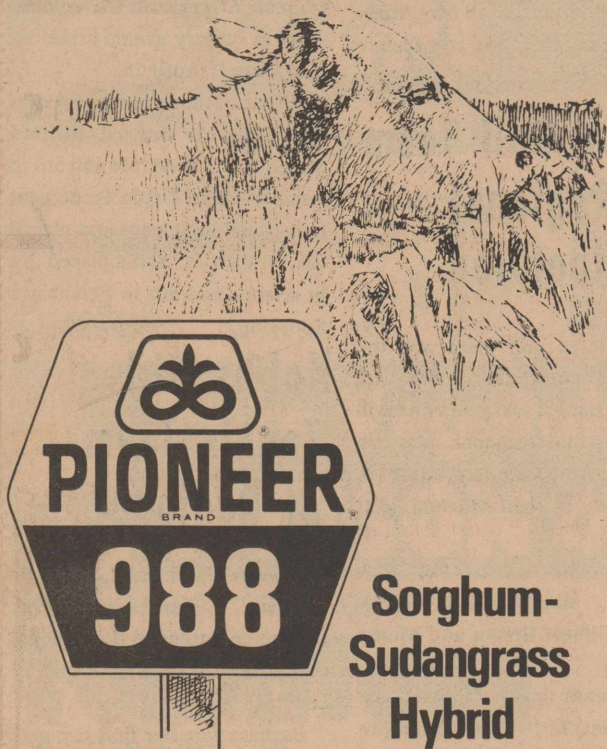

quarters, and some for only one quarter. Credits will be given on the basis of the number of quarters taught; one credit for one-quarter courses, two credits for two-quarter courses, and three credits for courses taught all three quarters. Course grades will be established simply by averaging the grades for each quarter taken in courses taught for more than one quarter; and for courses taught for only one quarter, the grades for that quarter will be the course grade. Credit will be given for all quarters taken if the course grade is 70 or above, and no credit will be earned for any quarter if the average for all quarters taught is below 70.

Credit Earned Under Semester Plan: Those who have earned credits under the semester plan may calculate the number of credits they will have under the quarter system by changing full credits to 3 quarters and 1/2 credits to 2 quarters.

Grade Reporting: Pass-Fail Report will be on a six-weeks basis. Quarter or trimester grades will be issued at the end of the 12-week period. A trimester grade will be determined by averaging daily grades and final examination (plus projects if assigned).

Exemptions: Exemptions will be based on attendance, using the following formula:

90 or above and no more than 4 tardies and absences.
80 or above and no more than 3 tardies and absences.
70 or above and no more than 2 tardies and absences.

Graduation Requirements: Sixty-six quarter credits will be required for graduation, 54 of which must be solids, and must include the following:

English.....	9
Math.....	6
Science.....	6
World History.....	3
American History.....	3
Government.....	3
Health.....	3
Spanish.....	3
P.E./Band (not considered as a solid).....	12
Electives.....	18
Total.....	66

Student Scheduling: All students must take five academic subjects each year plus 2 assignments from band, P.E. or study hall for a total of seven assignments.

Student Classification: A student's classification at the beginning of each school year will remain the same for the entire year. Each student will be classified at the beginning of the year on the following basis:

Freshman	0 quarters
Sophomore	12 quarters
Junior	27 quarters
Senior	42 quarters

Hayter Name Etched In County History

--by Delila Baird

The name HAYTER is to be found in the early records of those who came to Fisher County and remained to make it their permanent home. Mrs. F.E. Tutt (Connie Hayter Tutt) gives the following information regarding this family.

"James Charles (Jim) Hayter (1865-1925), son of John Jameson Hayter and Sarah Pippin Hayter, was born near Rogersville, Tennessee. His brother, Robert P. (Bob) Hayter, had already moved with his family to the Hobbs Community of Fisher County before Jim came in 1893. Jim came by train to Sweetwater, Texas and caught a ride to Roby with the mail carrier. In Roby he met Sidney R. Bryan and his son Sidney W. Bryan and asked them to take him to Hobbs in their wagon on the way to their home in Claytonville Community. They left him at the Hobbs Post Office which was in the home of Mr. J.P. Martin. This was located on the east side of the Clear Fork of the Brazos. Since there was no bridge across the Clear Fork, he left his trunk at the post office and walked across to the home of his brother, Bob Hayter.

"Having taught school in Tennessee before coming to Texas, Jim Hayter soon got a job teaching near his new home. He taught at Grady and at County Line in the years 1893 through 1896. For his teaching he received a salary of about \$25.00 a month. He took turns living with the families of his pupils, staying with each family for two weeks at a time. He really enjoyed this experience. Some of his pupils were Maggie Luttrell (Mrs. Carroll McCombs), Bessie Hayter (Mrs. Jackson Willingham) and Lizzie Berry (Mrs. Martin Reep).

"In December 1896 Jim Hayter and Cora Bryan (1878-1971) were married in the home of her parents, Sidney R. and Tura Bryan. Jim Hayter came to the wedding riding a horse and leading another on which to carry home his bride. Their first home was in the abandoned Bush School House located on the banks of the Clear Fork. Their first child, Clara, was born there. In about 1900 the Jim Hayters bought a section of land from Mrs. Eugenia Martin Evans whose husband had recently died. They then moved into a house which she had built on this place.

"After moving into their new

home a second child, Connie, was born to Jim and Cora Hayter. This time they didn't bother trying to get a doctor to come help with the birth of their baby. When Clara was born, by the time Jim rode to Roby to get Dr. Davis and back it was too late--the baby was already there. So Granny Wilson, a neighbor, delivered the second child while Jim had gone to get Cora's mother.

"Jim and Cora Hayter bought additional land in the early 1900's and stocked it with cattle. In 1902 and again in 1903 Jim Hayter and Barton Willingham put their herds of cattle together and drove them to market at Amarillo. Mrs. Willingham took her three babies and went along to cook for the men on the drives. Some of the cowboys who were helping on the drive were Steve Shanks, Robert Etheredge and Tom Hefner.

"In about 1902 the Bob Hayter family, Jim Hayter family, J.P. Martin family and other Methodists organized the Hobbs

Methodist Church. A church house was then built on land owned by Jim and Cora Hayter. This church was served by "Circuit Rider" preachers once each month until 1925. The Baptists in the community also used this church house one Sunday in each month, and the Methodists and Baptists had a Union Sunday School every Sunday.

"Jim Hayter remained a stock farmer for the rest of his life. He raised sheep a few years, but the wolves soon put him out of the sheep business. He was an active citizen in the community having served as school trustee, election judge, and Chairman of the Draft Board during World War I. He died in a hospital in Abilene, Texas in February 1925. After her husband's death Cora Bryan Hayter leased and rented out her land and moved to Snyder. She died there on February 2, 1971."

The children of James Charles (Jim) Hayter and Cora Bryan Hayter were Clara May Hayter (Mrs. Victor Womack) and Connie Hayter (Mrs. Fehrlin Tutt). Mrs. Tutt resides on her ranch which she continues to operate in the Hobbs Community. The Tutt's son, Fehrlin Tutt, Jr. married Jimma Dean Kingsfield (daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Kingsfield of Rotan). They, with their two children, Sue and Bryan, reside in Houston. The daughter, Helene Tutt, married Fred Marr. She is a nurse and lives in Snyder. Her two daughters are Dana (Mrs. Alan Habert of Houston) and Julie (Mrs. Brice) of Snyder.

The Hayter family lineage has

been traced back to the colonial era of our nation. The advent of the name in early Fisher County represents a continuation of pioneering on new frontiers.
