



State Sales Tax Reports Due In Austin August 1

Comptroller Bob Bullock reminded 225,000 retail businesses Monday that July 31 is the deadline for sending in quarterly sales tax reports.

"Late reports are nothing but headaches for the taxpayer and for the Comptroller's Office," Bullock said. "I'd like to see every quarterly report filed on the deadline.'

Reports due July 31 cover the April-May-June quarter. Forms for the reports were sent to all sales tax permit holders by Bullock's office in June.

"Most of the delinquent or tardy reports are just oversights and simple mistakes but the consequences under the law are just the same," Bullock said.

North Texas Workers Can Save With ERI

North Texas workers not covered by pension programs may now be able to set up their own individual savings programs and gain significant tax advantages as a result of the Employees Retirement Income Security Act of 1974.

A. W. McCanless, district director of Internal Revenue Service (IRS) operations in North Texas, said today that any employee under age 70 who has not participated in a retirement program during the year can set up a retirement program. Husbands and wives who are both wage earners may each qualify for their own individual program.

Mr. McCanless said that those who are eligible can contribute 15 percent of their annual earnings, to a maximum of \$1500, into the program. A major advantage of the program, he added, is that no tax is due on the contributions or interest or toher income earned by the contributions until the money is actually withdrawn. Because this is a retirement program, withdrawals usually would not begin until the individual was 59-1/2 or older. At that point, the individual would presumably be in a lower tax bracket than during his or her earning years.



Johnny Jackson was born in Collingsworth County, Texas, on August 4, 1933. His early life was spent in Grayson and Dallas counties. Following his graduation from high school in 1951, he entered Draughon's Business College in Dallas. Upon completion of his work there he attended Freed-Hardeman College in Henderson, Tennessee, for one year. Further work was done at Christian College of the Southwest (now Dallas Campus of Abilene Christian College), Dallas Christian College, and the University of Houston. He received his B.A. degree from Abilene Christian College.

He preached his first sermon while in high school and entered into full-time local work in April, 1954, at Pottsboro, Texas. His other local works in Texas have been with the following churches: Morton Street in Denison, 1955-1958; Abrams Road in Richardson, 1958-1964; Southside in Amarillo, 1964-1966; Central in Houston, 1966-1969. Since July, 1969, he has been with the South MacArthur Church in Irving.

For the past eighteen years he has conducted numerous meetings. His meeting work has taken him into eighteen states and Australia. In 1965 he was invited to preach in a campaign in Brisbane, Australia, and returned to preach in a second campaign in Melbourne, Australia, in 1967. In the summer of 1972, he was co-host for a tour to Europe and the Holy Land. Jackson is listed in the 1973 edition of Personalities of the South, and in the 1975 edition of Dictionary of International Biography.

The 1,200 member South MacArthur Church, for which he now preaches, is a new congregation which resulted from the merger of two Irving churches, the East Side Church and the South Delaware Church (for which he began preaching in 1969). The South MacArthur Church recently entered the first phase of a new church plant which will cost in excess of two million dollars upon completion. A 3,000 seat auditorium is now under construction and is scheduled for occupany in the fall of 1975.

Jackson and his wife, Nancy, have been married for twenty-two years, and are the parents of four children, the eldest of which is a senior at Abilene Christian College, and the youngest is an 8th grader.



That sage, however, would be wise not to peddle that theory to a lad named Mickey Early-because he ain't buying it.

In his role as one of three 1974 seven career pass interceptions, graduate of Rotan High School defensive starters who'll be earned second team all-league and entered SMU that fall. laboring at Southern Methodist fall and the Mustar ranked last in the Southwest Conference in total defense statistics last fall--Early has already been swamped by nabobs of negativism.

It's true we lost Louie Kelcher, who played from sideline to sideline, said the 180 pound Early, who gained some All SWC recognition last season, and we've got a lot of young kids who'll have to come through.

But I think our defense will come along and hold people, Early added, showing he is by no means accustomed to pessimism and not ever likely to find it agreeable. I think having so many enthusiastic young people could work to our advantage.

If the Pony performers can slow up opposing offenses even a little bit, Early feels, something explosive is ticking in another department.

Right now, we have a fantastic offensive bunch, he declared, surveying a unit which has eight returning regulars from 1974, when a 351.6 per game yardage norm was second in the SWC only to the 361.7 by Texas.

'I'd say our offense will score 30 points a game, maybe more, and if we play any defense at all, we'll be competitive."

If pessimism is agreeable to any sector, Early says bluntly, it is the media, particularly the Dallas specie.

"SMU has had three consecutive winning seasons, but I don't feel our players have gotten credit for playing on three winners in a row. The trouble is that the people of Dallas like to read about scandal as far as SMU is concerned--and that's what is given to them. Everything you read in Dallas is negative.

All the plus perspective, Early indicated, is saved for pro sports in Dib D--so if coach Dave Smith comes up with his third consecutive winning Pony assemblage (the departed Hayden Fry had a 7-4 campaign in 1972), applause may barely be audible.

"From a team standpoint, I'd say we could be no worse than 8-3 this fall. We've been 6-4-1 the last two years, and mistakes have cost us, especially in mid-season against Texas Tech. Tech beat us both years, but we finished higher in the standings last year than they did, but didn't get any recognition for





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

Pickles and relishes contribute some minerals and vitamins, contain little or no fat and. except for the sweet type, are low in calories. Some are high in sodium content, however.

Oickles are generally made from fruits and vegetables, unsafe to use. including cucumbers, green tomatoes, okra, green beans, zucchini squash, onion, cauliflower and beets.

Pickles are classified on the basis of indredients and preparation method

FRESH-PACK are quick-pro- you might like to try: cess pickles, such as cross-cut cucumber slices and whole 20 pounds (about 1/2 bushels(cucumber dills, gherkins, and cucumbers, 3 to 6 inches in dilled green beans. These are length short-brined for several hours or 3/4 cup whole mixed pickling overnight, then drained and spice combined with boiling-hot vinegar, spices and other seasonings. dried These are quick and easy to 2 1/2 cups vinegar prepare, and they have a tart pungent flavor.

BRINED OR FERMENTED PICKLES go through a curing process of about three weeks. Dilled cucumbers and sauerkraut to avoid bruising. Take care to belong to this group, while other vegetables, such as green or wipe dry. tomatoes, also may be cured the

RELISHES use fruits and vegetables which are chopped and seasoned, and then cooked to the desired consistency. Some are piccalilli, pepper-onion, tomato-apple chutney, tomato- crock. pear chutney, horseradish and

To obtain satisfactory pickle products, use good quality ngredients and proper procedures--correct proportions of fruit and vegetables, sugar, salt, vinegar and spices are essential.

Select tender vegetables and frim fruit. Pears and peaches may be slightly under rupe for pickling. Use unwaxed cucumbers for pickling whole, as the brine cannot penetrate wax.

Use fruits and vegetables as soon as possible after harvesting or after purchasing from a market. If they cannot be used immediately refirgerate them or white spots inside the fermented spread them where they will be well ventilated and cold.

Do not use fruits and vegetables that show even slight evidence of mold. Proper processsing kills potential spoilage organisms but does not destroy the off-flavor that may be produced by mold growth in the

In preparing cucumbers be sure to remove all blossoms, as they may be the source of the enzyme responsible for softening the cucumbers during fermenta-

Use pure granulated salt if available. Regular table salt has fillers to prevent lumping and may cause cloudy brine. Use a high-grade cider or white

Pickles add spice to meals and a product a light color. Use soft snacks. The skillful blending of water if possible to assure proper spice, vinegar, and sugar with acidity. If not available, boil fruits and vegetables gives crisp, water and remove the scum before using.

For heating pickle liquids use utensils of unchipped enamelware, stainless steel, aluminum or glass. Metal utensils, such as copper, brass, galvanized metal and iron react with acids and salts and cause undesirable color changes and make the pickles

For fermenting or brining pickles, use crock, stoneware, glass or unchipped enamel bowls

If necessary, make additional brine

The original brine is usually cloudy as a result of yeast development during the fermentation period. If this cloudiness is objectionable, fresh brine may be used to cover the pickles when packing them into the jars.

When making fresh brine, use 1/2 cup salt and 4 cups vinegar to 1 gallon of water. The fermentation brine generally is preferred for its added flavor and should be strained before heating to boiling.

Pack the pickles, along with some of the dill, into clean, hot quart jars; add garlic if desired. Avoid too tight a pack. Cover with boiling brine to 1/2 inch from the top of the jar. Adjust jar
