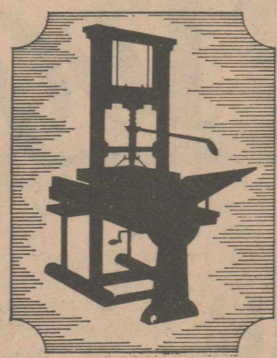


Roby Council Talks On Phone With Bell Men

Five Offices Open In 1976

COMMISSIONERS TO MAKE OVER \$800 WITH NEW RAISE

Five Fisher County Elected officials are up for re-election in 1976 and of the five only one has indicated that he will not seek re-election. Wayne Porter, Fisher County Commissioner, will not seek another term.

Other elected officials include Robert Buck, Fisher County Tax Assessor-Collector; Rudy Hamric, Fisher County Attorney; A.J. (Blackie) Ford, Fisher County Commissioner; and A.E. (Bus) Rollans, Fisher County Sheriff.

Fisher County Commissioners are currently receiving a monthly salary of \$516.00 with \$100.00 a month extra for making Commissioners Court meetings, and \$125.00 a month travel expense. Their current monthly total is \$741.00. In January their total travel and salary will be increased to \$802.00 a month with the 10 per cent pay hike recently voted by commissioners.

Rudy Hamric, A.E. Rollans and Robert Buck receive a monthly salary of \$729.00 at present. In January their salaries will be increased to \$801.90 per month.

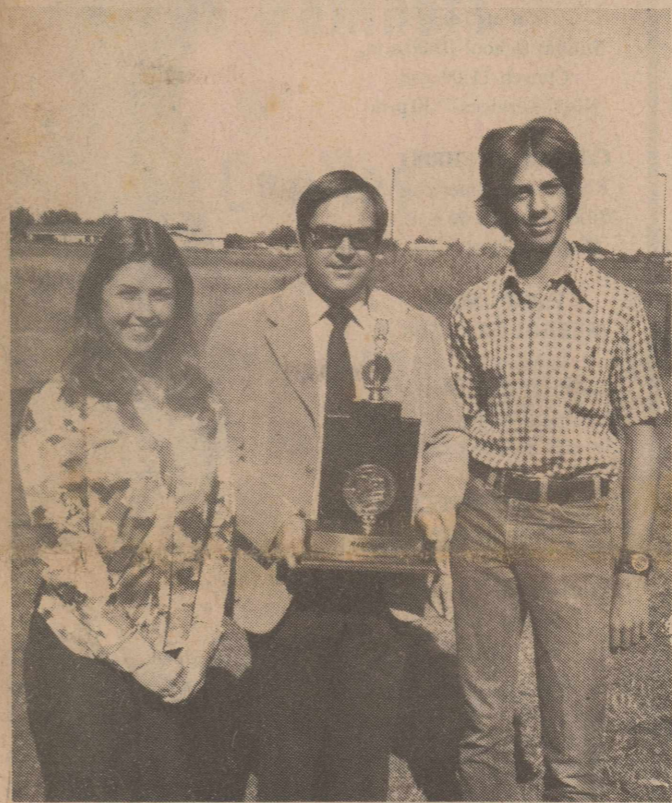
"The 65 members of our band were well balanced, sound and showed good marching style, and I was pleased with their performance", said band director Glaze.

The Roby FFA team won the Sr. Chapter Conducting contest in the Double Mountain District Roby scored a 982 out of a possible 1000 points.

They will compete in area competition November 22 at Big Spring. This makes the second year in a row Roby has won district and won second in area last year. They plan to win area and go to state this year.

Employees Get 7% Average Raise Hospital Salaries Up, Room Charges Increase

The Fisher County Hospital District granted employees an average 7 per cent pay hike recently and increased the cost of routine service charges as reflected by room rates to \$3.00 for all private and semi-private accommodations.

Mrs. Hinson, the governing board increased the starting salary for RN's to \$900.00 per month.

The board also authorized some shift differential increases for LVN's. Personnel on the 7-3 shift will start out at \$2.65 per hour; 3-11 shift at \$2.75 per hour and 11-7 at \$2.85 per hour.

The total salary adjustments for all employees will average approximately 7 per cent of the total gross payroll.

The board also increased the routine service charges upward in the amount of \$3.00 per day on all semi-private and private room accommodations. Semi-private rooms will now cost \$38.50 and \$39.50 while private room will increase to \$40.50 and \$41.50.

In other action the governing board authorized the Administrator to enter into an agreement with Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Texas who work through the

Texas Hospital Association's Shared Insurance Program to provide hospitalization and life insurance benefits to full time employees.

Grand Jury Returns No Bills In Shootings

Fisher County Attorney Rudy Hamric summed up the ruling by the Grand Jury by saying, "When the three individuals were no-billed by the Grand Jury theoretically these cases are at an end unless new evidence is shown to the Grand Jury."

Hamric was referring to the "no-bill" given by the panel of 12 Fisher County Grand Jury members in the cases involving Glenn Willeford, Epifanio Gaspar and Flores. The grand jury met for two days and listened to 14 witnesses.

Willeford was no-billed on one charge, Joe Flores was no-billed on two charges, and Epifanio Gaspar was given a no-bill on one charge. The grand jury returned a report to 32nd District Judge Weldon Kirk late Wednesday night, November 5, in which the 12 members indicated that no indictments had been drawn.

Yellowhammers Win 8-A District Title Friday

The Rotan Yellowhammers clinched the District 8A championship by defeating the Albany Lions 32-6 last Friday. This is the first time Rotan has won it outright since 1966.

The only offense that the Lions could muster was a 82 yd. play called the swinging gate resulting in their only TD. This is the first time Rotan's defense has been scored on since district play started. The "Cheap" TD only intimidated the Hammers and they scored every way possible for their 32 points.

Rotan received the KO and marched down to the Albany 16 where they lost the ball on downs. Albany had 1-10 at the 20, they lost 2, and on 2-12 on the 18 they made their TD with the trick play with 7:15 left in the first quarter, the score was 6-0.

At the start of the 2nd quarter Rotan got the ball 1-10 on their own 38 and in just four plays scored their first TD. James Goodwin went 38 yards down to the Lion 24, Tim Allen got 4, Goodwin got 4 more, then on 3-2 on the 16 Allen scored with 10:07 left in the quarter. The PAT failed, making it 6-6. Next time Rotan had the ball they started on the Albany 42. Allen got one yard, quarterback Frank Lopez, lost 4, Allen then picked up 10 and on 4-3 at the 35 Lopez threw to Vic Wilkerson for 15 yards and a 1-10 at the 20. Lopez lost 2 yards, then lost another yard on 3-13 at the 23 Goodwin got 6. On 4th and 7 at the 17 Goodwin kicked a 34 yard field goal with 4:30 left in the 2nd quarter making it 9-6. This ended the scoring in the first half.

In the third quarter Rotan got the ball 1-10 at their own one following an Albany punt. The

Hammers went the distance in 18 plays with Goodwin going in for the score with 2:05 left in the quarter. The PAT failed leaving the score 15-6. Dan Burk recovered an Albany fumble at the Lion 39 and Rotan moved down to the 15 before giving up the ball on downs. The next play John Cox tipped an Albany pass to Monte Morrow on the Albany 38. Six plays later Allen scored from the 4. Goodwin got 2 yards, Jerry Carr got 3. The Lopez pass fell incomplete and on 4th and 4 from the 33 Lopez passed to Buddy Hopper for a first and goal at the 4. Allen got the TD. Lopez passed to Allen for the 2 points, making it 23-6 with 9:46 left in the game. On the following kick off Bryan Cave recovered a fumble on the first place from scrimmage, and had a 1-G at the Albany 5, but after a penalty against Rotan they lost the ball on downs at the 3 yard line. Albany, on 3-10 from their own 3, was caught behind their own goal line by Goodwin, Carr and Burk. This produced a safety, making it 25-6 with 7:00 left in the game. On the free punt, Monte Morrow ran the ball back to the Albany 34 where Tim Allen scored on the next play for the final TD of the night. Goodwin's kick was good and the score was 32-6 with 6:47 left in the game. James Stanberry intercepted an Albany pass at the Rotan 17, Jerry Carr ran 74 yards for a TD which was nullified because of a clipping penalty.

Outstanding defensive players were Buddy Hooper, Dan Burk, Bryan Cave, Burt Weathersbee, Goodwin, Carr, Morrow, Kim Gray and Alex Flores.

Western Texas Homecoming

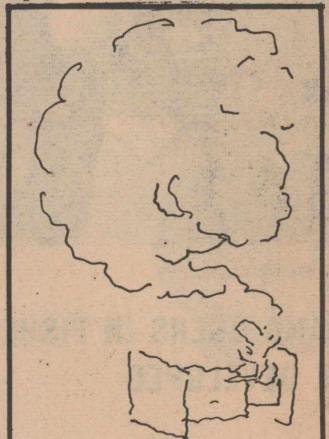
Western Texas College, which opened its doors for students in the fall of 1971, will have its first Homecoming Saturday Nov. 15.

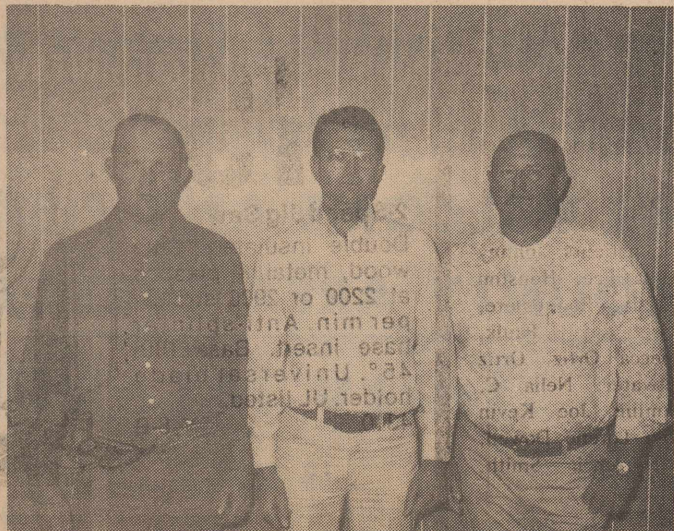

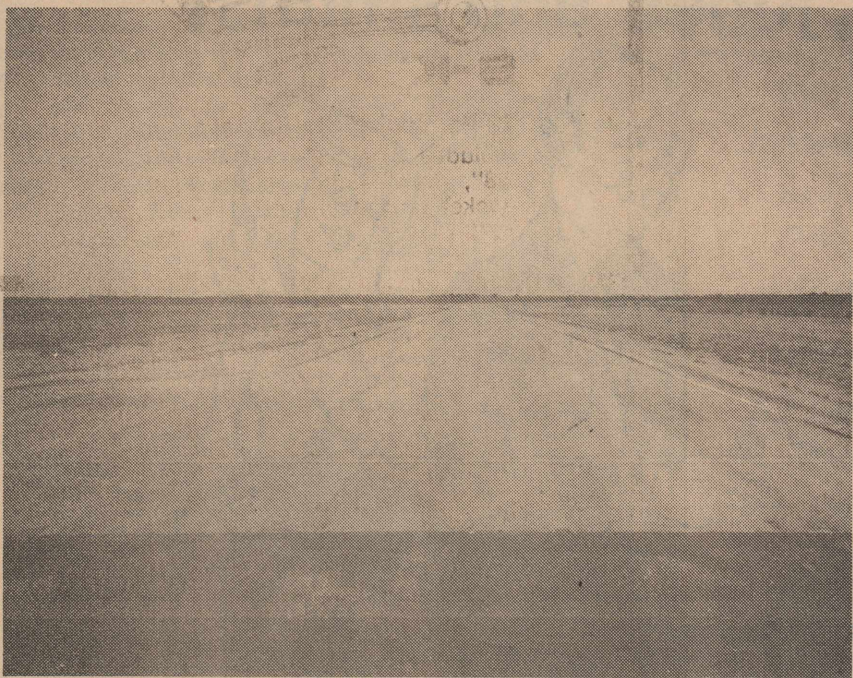

Farm Bureau Growing For 23rd Year In Row

Texas Farm Bureau has shown an increase in membership for the 23rd consecutive year, according to Carrol Chaloupka, president of the state's largest general farm organization.

decided to take bids on a new police car.

Police chief Glenn Willeford reviewed a specific case involving the arrest of a Rotan youth with council members and reported to councilmen on the police vehicle's activities outside the city limits. Councilman White commended Willeford for "trying to enforce the law", and Willeford was told by Mayor Springer that many have commented to him (Springer) complementing the job that the police chief was doing.



Charter Oak. Perhaps the most famous tree in American history, this great oak provided a hiding place for the charter of the Connecticut Colony when King James II demanded its surrender in 1687. The tree, which stood near Hartford, Conn., blew down in a gale in 1856.



Daniel Boone's "Bar" Tree. This was a beech which stood in northeastern Tennessee until 1917. Boone, probably the first man to explore the forests of the Middle Appalachians, carved this inscription on the tree: "D. Boon called a Bar on Tree in THE YEAR 1760."

Official tabulations just completed show that the TFB now has 180,470 member families in the organization, an increase of 14,254 over last year's total, Chaloupka announced. The TFB's membership year runs from Nov. 1 to Oct. 31.

All of the 210 organized county Farm Bureau organizations had an increase for the third year in a row, the Dalhart grain and livestock farmer said.

"This phenomenal increase in membership indicates farmers and ranchers are depending more and more on organized efforts to solve their problems," Chaloupka said. "Among the more serious problems facing agriculture in the past 12 months has been government and union interference with grain exports, restrictive environmental regulations, and the continuing increases in costs of production."

The ten largest counties in the state in membership size are 1. Harris, 2,811; 2. McLennan, 2,632; 3. Fayette, 2,456; 4. Fort Bend, 2,452; 5. Ellis 2,441; 6. Van Zandt, 2,387; 7. Wharton, 2,319; 8. Bell, 2,014; 9. Nacogdoches, 1,918; and 10 Hidalgo, 1,887.

The Texas Farm Bureau was founded in Texas in 1921, but had ceased functioning by the early 1930s. In 1934, it was re-organized as the Texas Agricultural Association. The name was changed back to Texas Farm Bureau a few years later when it again affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation.

The AFBF is the largest general farm organization in the world with 2.5 million family members in more than 2,800 counties in all states except Alaska.

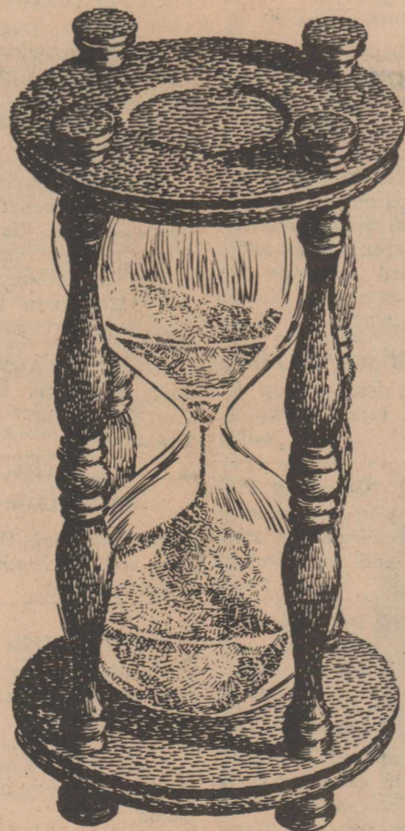

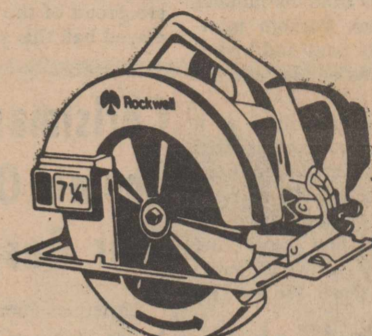

On Friday morning, Victor Ray, Assistant to the President of National Farmers Union will head a review of the "Farmers Union's Plan for Parity and Abundance" with a panel of experts to answer questions of this program.

Vice President and Elizabeth Doshier of Waco, Secretary-Treasurer.

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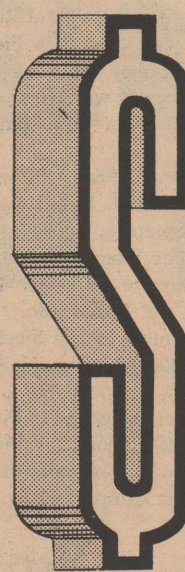

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Transportation For Needy Is Available
