Rotan Board Sets Budget Meeting For Monday

The Rotan School Board members met in session last Monday night for their August board meeting.

Superintendent Tom Harkey presented the board with a rough draft of the 1975-76 school budget in the approximate amount of \$726,000. The board deferred approval of the proposed budget until Monday, August 25, at 7:30 p.m. The board will meet approximately 30 minutes prior to the public meeting on the approval of the budget. The public budget meeting is scheduled for 8:00 p.m., August 25.

In other action the board accepted a Bible for use in the Rotan High School Library from Masonic Worshipful Master Melvin Clements. Clements and Masonic representatives Ernest Roberts and Marvin Kersh presented the Bible to the school board.

The board discussed the possibility of securing a new auditor and are scheduled to make a firm decision at the next board meeting.

A milk bid of .1050 cents on white milk and .1100 cents on chocolate milk was submitted and accepted by Gandy's Dairy.

Superintendent Harkey informed the board of a seminar on management skills that would be attended by Harkey, Neil Wright, Ray Womack and Marshall Hill beginning October 15.

The board approved the hiring of Kathy Tibbles as a 3rd grade teacher.

Each of the building principals gave a report on attendance to the board. Ray Womack, Primary Principal, reported that

there are 202 students in elementary school this year as compared with 215 last year.

Marshall Hill, reported that the junior high finished the year with 222 and had an enrollment as of last Monday of 216.

Neil Wright, High School Principal, reported 40 seniors, 44 juniors, 45 sophomores and 66 freshmen for a total of 195. The high school closed out the year last spring with 272 pupils.

In the final action the board heard Head Football Coach, Don Mullins, give a report on the football program. Mullins reported that there are 33 boys out for football in high school.

WTC ROTAN EXTENSION REGISTRATION AUG 26

Western Texas College will be expanding its off-campus extension programs this fall with the opening of new extension centers in Sweetwater, Rotan and Post. Extension centers will also continue to be in operation in Haskell and Colorado City.

Extension students in Rotan are to register from 6:30-8:30 p.m. on August 26 at Rotan High School. Classes will be held in the high school from 6:30-9:20 p.m. Monday through Thursday nights, although students taking only one course will attend class only one night each week.

Students in the Colorado City and Haskell extension centers will register on August 25. Registration is planned in Post on August 26 and in Sweetwater on August 28. Classes for all extension students will begin September 4.

Mrs. Patsy Hamric will serve as coordinator for the WTC extension center in Rotan. Dr. Duane Hood, Dean of Student Services and Registrar, is coordinator for the Rotan program on the WTC main campus.

Students enrolled at WTC extension centers may earn as many as 12 college credit hours during a semester, and may enroll at an extension center while taking a course or courses

on the Snyder campus. Students at WTC extension centers will pay fees of \$51 plus lab fees for

one three-hour course, \$57 for two three-hour courses, or \$92 for four three-hour courses, for

example, with lab fees added when required.

All courses offered at WTC extension centers are freshman or sophomore level courses, and credits earned are transferrable to other colleges and universities. Text books will be available at each extension center on the night classes begin.

Copies of the fall semester extension center classes are available at Rotan High School. Courses tentatively scheduled in Rotan are English 131, History 131, Psychology 231 and Conversational Spanish 131.

Persons wishing further information about courses offered at WTC extension centers or on the main campus may contact Dr. Hood's office in the Administration Building from 8-5 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 8-4 p.m. on Fridays. Registration will be held on the main campus Sept. 2-3, with day and evening classes beginning Sept. 4.

received horse head medallions. Jimmy Walker and Jackie Etheredge received plaques for the hard work with the program.

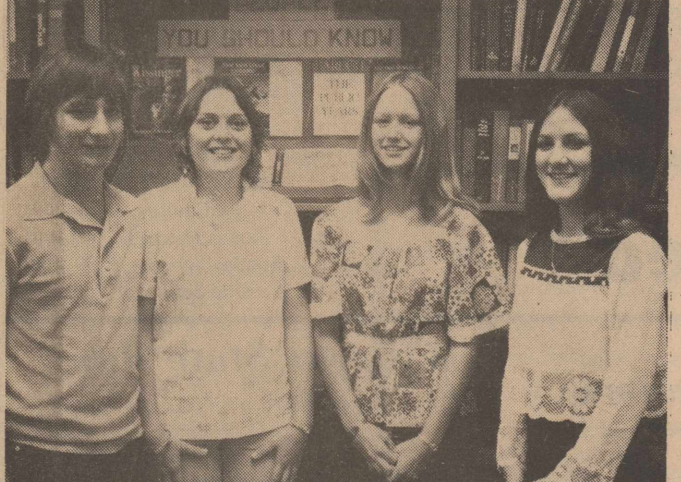
Rotan Jaycees Call Thursday Night Meeting

The Rotan Jaycees will hold a called meeting on Thursday, August 21, at the Jaycee Hall, announced Randy Murphree Jaycee President.

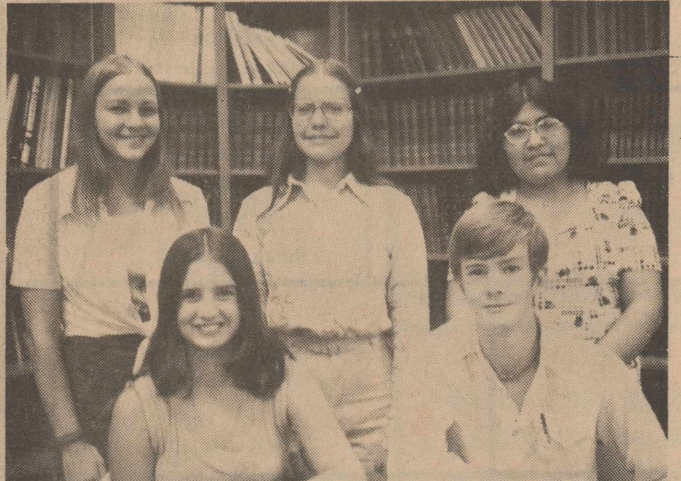

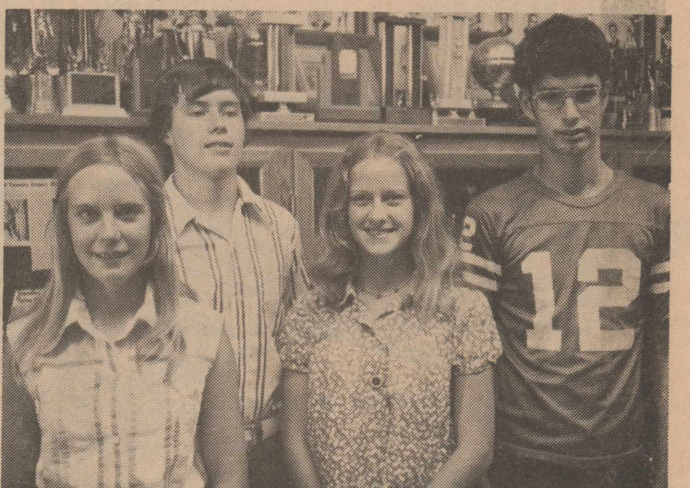

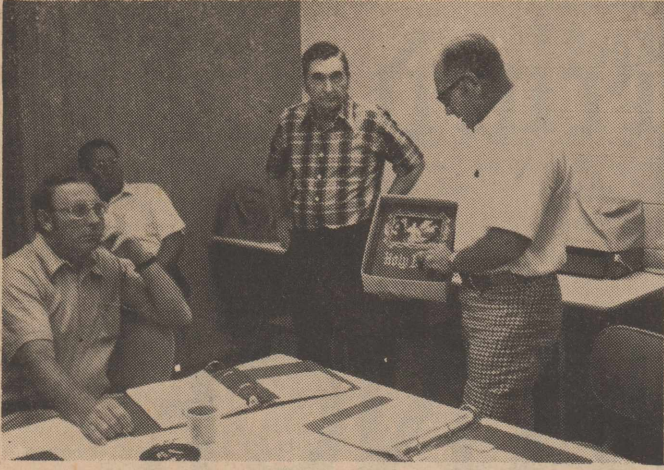

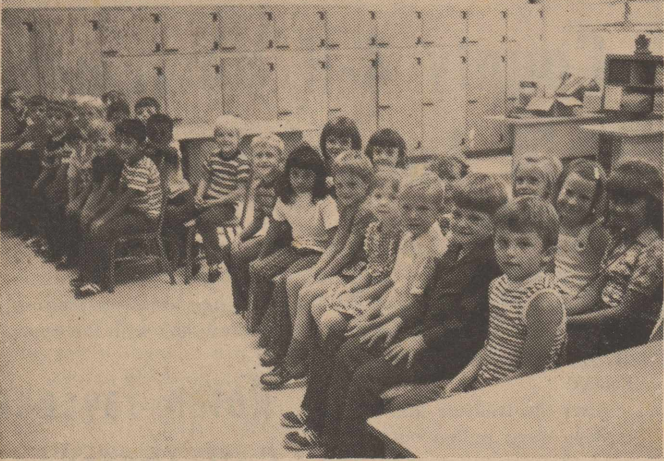

Vet. Officer Advises To Check Names

Ed Deaton, Fisher County Veteran Service Officer, stated that contrary to a misconception held by many, wills cannot change beneficiaries named on life insurance policies issued by the Veterans Administration or Life Insurance Companies.

Veterans are reminded to make certain that persons whom they intend to receive their insurance are named on their policies.

Veterans who fail to do so could add to emotional stress of survivors and cause unwarranted financial hardship, especially on widows and young children, when it is discovered the intended beneficiary was not named.

In such cases, the VA is obligated by law to pay insurance proceeds to the beneficiary of record. Most of the VA's policyholders are World War II veterans who carry National Service Life Insurance.

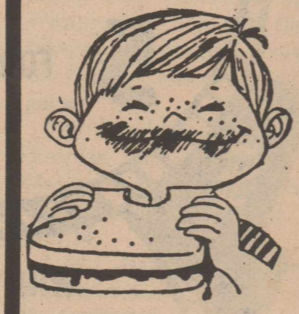
The problem of insurance benefits going to unintended recipients has arisen in most instances because the veteran simply never got around to changing an earlier listing of beneficiaries.

In a typical case, the veteran named his mother as beneficiary when he took out his policy. Later, when he married, he forgot to notify VA to change his beneficiary.

Deaton urged any veteran who

wishes to check on or change his beneficiary to contact the VA insurance center to which he pays his premiums—either in Philadelphia or St. Paul. The veteran should be sure to provide as much information as possible, including policy number, full name and address.

"Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz has once again proven that he is 'public enemy number one' as far as farmers and consumers are concerned," Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman said in Waco today.

"With the USDA's crop report, August 11, showing that we will have massive surpluses of both corn and wheat, it is inconceivable that the Secretary

would resort to such "Scare tactics" as he did in calling for a halt in international trading of grain," Naman said.

The report issued by the USDA showed that there was a reduction of 3 percent in the corn crop and 2 percent in wheat production over the July 1 estimates. However, the figures project a carry over of both crops for 1975-76, perhaps by 150 million bushels of wheat and 300 million bushels of corn.

The Texas AFL-CIO has joined with the Farmers Union in expressing its support of the grain sales while also calling for the creation of a national food policy to protect both farmer and consumer.

"Exports are good for everyone. Exports help the farmer receive a decent price for his commodities. Exports provide jobs for workers and exports help our balance of trade," the farm

leader said.

"In this context, it is grossly unfair—and a breach of faith—for either the government or the International Longshoremen to place an embargo on exports and prevent farmers from selling their crops in world markets", Naman said.

"The effect of a hold-back on exports, as advocated by Butz, would be punishing farmers for doing what the Secretary has urged them to do all along—produce all-out and rely on the free market", he said.

"In light of the crop forecast, and the Butz embargo, farm prices will have no place to go but down, and they are currently less than adequate in relation to production costs", Naman declared.

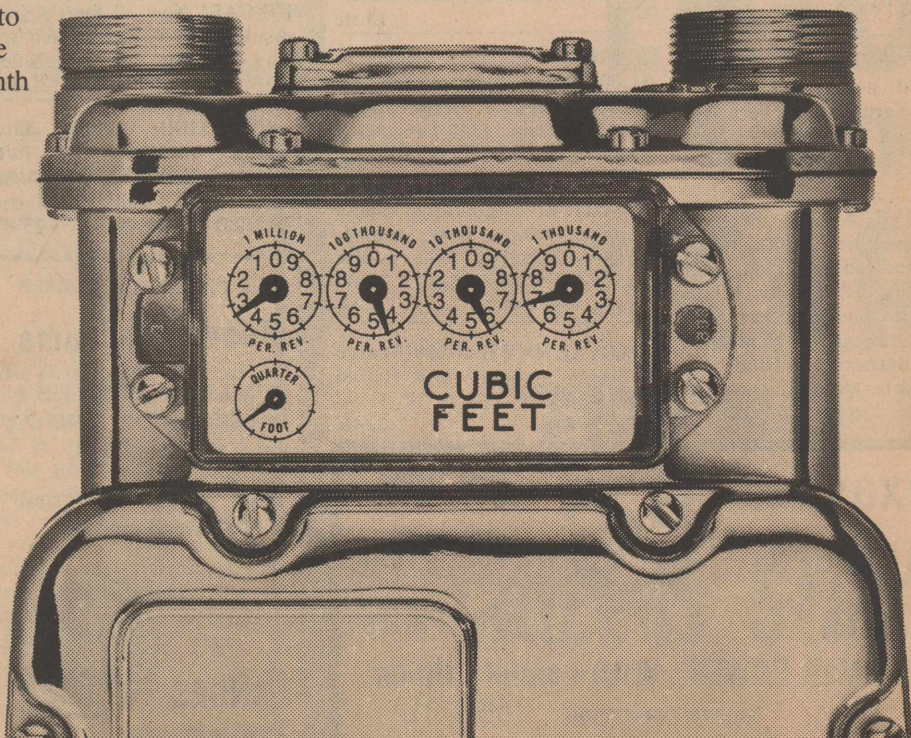

This is a gas meter. It's fairly easy to read and check to see if you're using natural gas wisely.

There are five dials on the meter face. The smallest dial is a test dial . . . and it's not included in the actual reading. The remaining four dials are divided into ten segments, using the number the hand has just passed for the reading. When a hand is between numbers, always use the smaller number.

The reading for the meter pictured below would be 3457. The last number is in "tenths," so your final reading should be 345.7 THOUSAND CUBIC FEET.

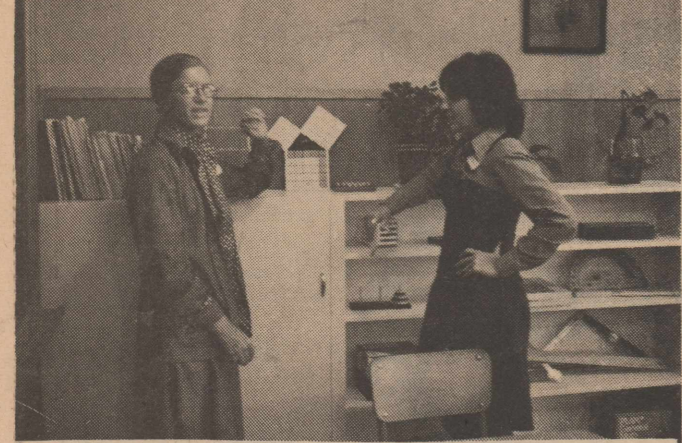
