





An Ordinance fixing and determining the general service rate to be charged for sales of natural gas to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Rotan, Fisher County, Texas, and providing for the manner in which such rate may be changed, adjusted and amended.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Rotan:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limist of Rotan, by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows: First 800 Cu. Ft. or Fraction Thereof !2.5177 Gross; \$2.2659 Net Next 1,200 Cu. Ft.-\$2.3766 Per Mcf Gross; \$2.1389 Per Mcf Net Next 3,000 Cu. Ft.-\$1.8210 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.6389 Per Mcf Net Next 20,000 Cu.Ft.- \$1.5432 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.3889 Per Mcf Net Over 25,000 Cu. Ft.-\$1.4877 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.3389 Per Mcf Net

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period, except that where customer's only use for gas service is in an outdoor grill and/or a fireplace starter, the amount shown for the first consumption block shall constitute a minimum monthly bill.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the \$1.0399 per Mcf level in the interacompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the Stae of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (exept state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to July 1, 1975, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in the increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make any ajustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing dates; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry on its reasonable rules and regulations in

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1. may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office. SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting





A Benefits Available At WTC

Veterans enrolling at Western Texas College extension centers are eligible for VA educational benefits just the same as if they were enrolling on the WTC Snyder Campus, Dan Dever, WTC Veterans' Outreach coordinator, said.

Most veterans with service after Jan. 31, 1955, are eligible for benefits provided the active duty was continuous for 181 days or more. Veterans who have less than 18 months of active duty may also receive benefits, with their training allowance figured on the basis of one and a half months of entitlement for each month of active military service.

The Dependents Educational Assistance program provides aid for the education of sons, daughters, wives and widows of

Veterans or other adults who did not complete high school or a GED program may be admitted to WTC by individual approval. WTC has appointed coordina-

tors for each of its five extension centers, and persons wishing information about extension courses may contact them. They are Bill Blakley in Haskell, Mrs. Barbara Gray in Colorado City. Mrs. Pat Hamric in Rotan, Mrs. Charlotte McDonald and Lane Tannehill in Post, and Gary Rotan in Sweetwater.

Veterans who would like complete information about educational benefits may contact Dever in the WTC Administration Building.

New SCS Book For The Birds

People who enjoy having birds around their homes will find a new Soil Conservation brochure, 'Invite Birds to Your Home," a big help in planning and landscaping for birds. The brochure, written by Olan

W. Dillion, Jr., SCS biologist, tells the birdlover how to satisfy habitat needs of nesting and wintering birds with "trees, shrubs, and food. It tells how a conservation landscape plan used in the selection of trees and shrubs will beautify your yard and attract the kinds of birds you

"A conservation landscape will guide you in placing bird-attracting features near a window, patio, or terrace so you can observe the many varieties of birds that accept your invitation," Charlie Black, SCS district conservationist at Rotan states.

Even birdlovers in dense residential areas can attract birds by providing water for drinking and bathing and living fences and other shrubs for cover. "A single plant, the elderberry, is used by 51 species of birds and will dress your vard nine months out of the year with its white flower clusters and

red-black berries," Black said. "Invite Birds to your Home" will tell you the kind of food preferred by different kinds of birds, and how you can provide for them during food-short winter months.

sation paid to "service-connected" disable veterans have been increased with the signing of Public Law 94-71 on August 5, 1975 by President Ford, said Ed Deaton, Fisher County Veterans Service Officer.

The law also privides increases in the payments of dependency and indemnity compensation to widows and children of veterans whose deaths were service connected.

These increases were effective August 1, 1975 and the VA expects to begin including them on regular payments on Oct. 1st. The retroactive amounts for August should be paid by supplemental check on or before Sept. 15th.

The new rates of disability compensation for veterans are: 10 percent disability, \$35; 20 percent, \$65; 30 percent, \$98; 40 percent, \$134; 50 percent, \$188; 60 percent, \$236; 70 percent, \$280; 80 percent, \$324; 90 percent, \$364; 100 percent, \$655.

When a veteran drawing disability compensation is rated 50 percent or more he is entitled to additional amounts for his dependents. Some of the added monthly amounts paid for dependents of veterans rated 100 percent are: Wife only, \$40; Wife and one child, \$67; Wife and 3 children, \$105; One child, \$26;

School child over 18, \$61. Dependency and indemnity compensation for a widow is based upon the military pay grade of the veteran, and the new total rates for some of the ranks are as follows: E-1, \$241: E-2, \$248; E-5, \$278; E-9, \$329; W-1, \$304; W-4, \$344; O-1, \$304;

O-5, \$392; O-10, \$615. Another \$29 per month is now paid for each child, and \$72 per month if a widow, is in need of aid and attendance allowance.


