


It's just an old toy-yet in his imagination this boy can climb to supersonic heights with it.





Gin Waste Can Be **Profitable To Farmers**

Cotton gin waste can be to 14 tons of stripped cotton-gin converted from a problem into a trash. profit, say Cotton Incorporated

agricultural researchers. Two possibilities are selling the waste as a source for industrial raw materials or feeding it to ruminant animals as roughage in ration formulations.

Chemical companies tell us that gin trash contains potentialvaluable products," said Dr.W.F. Lalor, manager of search Center.

trash to a user's plant at the right price," he said.

The biggest problem today, Lalor explained, is handling and transportation. To overcome the problem, Cotton Incorporated researchers are testing a new gin trash cuber.

"Although the technical feasibility of cubing gin trash has already been demonstrated many times, the problem of high cost remains," said Lalor. "The angle we are exploring is to cut cubing costs in half by using more abrasion-resistant dies than those used in traditional cubers.'

Lalor said Cotton Incorporated's test cuber, known as a 'gear cuber'', is now undergoing trial at a gin in Texas. Another possibility being ex-

plored by Cotton Incorporated is packaging gin trash in modules of agricultural research. on pallets, the engineer said. "This is especially promising in areas near feed lots," said Lalor.

While costs of moduling gin 32-foot apllet will accomodate 13 ed in New York City.

'We found that gin trash compares favorably with other systems and cost engineering at feedstuffs of similar nature," the Cotton Incorporated Resaid Lalor. Mrs. Ben Hargrove, program chairman, presented the special guest, Mrs. Gee Gee Privitt, who is the West Texas Chapter Representative of the Arthritis Foundation. She resides in Lubbock.

Mrs. Privitt was a vibrant and outstanding speaker. She said, "Arthritis is the nation's number one crippling disease. It affects everyone of us in some way, directly or indirectly, physically or economically. It is three times worse in women than in men, 250,000 children were crippled by arthritis last year. There are at least 50,000,000 Americans with some kind of arthritis.

The Arthritis Foundation is the only national voluntary health organization which is trying to do something about this crippling disease problem, a disease long taken for granted and neglected. Its program include support for scientific research, training of arthritis specialists, public information and education about arthritis and help for arthritis sufferers in their own communities. Much more could be done if people gave it top priority for action. Contritubted funds are needed, of course. Equally needed, are volunteers, people who will work through their Foundation chapters to ease human suffering and to eliminate this universal, lifetime disease. The key to success in controlling arthritis is early diagnosis by a doctor with a complete physical exam, x-rays, and perhaps blood tests that will settle the issue. Then follow his advice.

He is in the light we have that if they wanted to do well, fellowship one with another and they had best be friendly to the blood of Jesus Christ Abraham. But the conditions cleanseth us from all sin. I John 1:7

One of the delightful experiences fellowship with the Lord. afforded peace loving people is fellowship with one another. Someone has said, fellowship is two fellows in one ship. I would not limit the number, however, to just two. Another definition of fellowship is, "an association of persons with common interests and activities".

In the above scripture is embodied both fellowship with God and with people of like precious faith. It is not uncommon or abnormal for us to think of finite persons having fellowship with one another. But when we think of the infinite almighty God having fellowship with finite mortals we can scarcely take it in. The truth is, this is not an isolated scripture.
