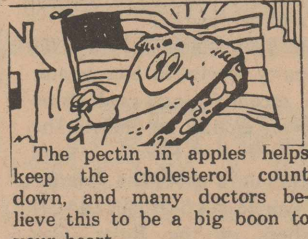

Using slide presentations and question and answer sessions, TWU field service personnel will present information about careers in health fields.

TWU offers a wide variety of career choices to potential students in the health sciences, such as nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, music therapy, therapeutic recreation, and health education.

The Rotan Yellowhammer JV played the Aspermont Hornet JV last Thursday night. Again, it was the same old story, the Rotan defense devoured the Hornet's offense and Rotan won 26-0. In four games the Rotan defense has not been scored on while the offense has scored 91 points. The Hornets did manage 5 first downs but really did not threaten to score. In the second quarter Ruben Castillo recovered a fumble on the Aspermont 43. It took Rotan 11 plays to hit paydirt. Yanez and Goodwin carried the ball down to the 4. On 4th and 8 Morales went around the left end for the score, the PAT failed. With 1:20 left in the first half, the score was 12-0.

Rotan, on their 2nd series, on the 34, got the ball first and ten on their own 28. In 11 plays Morales went over on a 8 yd. quarterback sneak for the TD

with 2:05 left in the 3rd quarter. Mark Henderson kicked the PAT, making the score 19-0. The next time Rotan had the ball they went 43 yards in 11 plays for the score. With 5:13 left in the fourth period Goodwin went over from the one and Henderson added the PAT making the score 26-0. Morales ended with 30 yards running, Goodwin 63, and YHanez 128.

Defensive standouts were Larry Wester, Kerry Brede-meyer, Donny Mullins and Ysidro Yanez.

1975 Tax Act Important To Area Farmers

The Tax Reduction Act of 1975 increased the investment tax credit from 7% to 10% for a period of two years. The credit will automatically revert to 7% unless positive action is taken by the Congress to make the increase permanent. Congress is completing its consideration of tax reform and the future of the credit will undoubtedly be decided in the tax law expected to be passed late this year or early next year.

The investment tax credit acts as a reduction in the cost to the purchaser of farm equipment. For example, a purchaser of a \$10,000 machine receives a credit of \$1,000. The credit reduces the buyer's income tax by \$1,000, thereby reducing the actual cost of the machine from \$10,000 to \$9,000. If the credit is allowed to revert to 7%, the actual cost of the \$10,000 machine will go from \$9,000 to \$9,300 with the additional \$300 representing additional income taxes paid by the buyer of the machine.

In effect, a reversion of the credit from 10% to 7% will be a tax increase to every purchaser of farm machinery. Proposals have also been made to increase the credit to 12% and legislation to this effect has been introduced.

Jim has been the workhorse behind the scenes for the Young Farmers activities. He is noted for his outstanding teaching of the FFA members in Roby. His name is well known in the district area, and state levels among Vo-Ag students and teachers. Only at this past Vo-Ag teacher convention in Houston Jim was on the program for Ag Mechanics.

Daughters Of Republic Of Texas Review Early Life

The Col. John H. Moore Chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas met in the home of Mrs. Jimmy D. Hale Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 23, at 4 p.m.

The President, Mrs. Hale, called the meeting to order. The chapter chaplain, Mrs. J.L. McCright, led in prayer. The pledges to the United States and Texas Flags were repeated in unison. Mrs. Hale then reviewed recent developments and legal actions concerning the Alamo as well as Bicentennial plans at the Alamo by the Texas Army and the NBC television network. The DRT are owners of the Alamo and other historical places in Texas.

Prefacing the program, Mrs. Hale showed a copy of the 45 ft. mural in the Texas State Library in Austin. The mural depicts Texas history from the time of the Spanish Conquistadors to the discovery of oil and the beginning of modern, industrial Texas. It is known that the idea of a library for Texas was proposed in 1835, even before Texas' Declaration of Independence was signed and that President Lamar signed a joint resolution with Congress in 1849 to establish a library.

The theme for the program was Early Life in Texas. Miss Josie Baird and Miss Delila Baird led in a discussion and showed pictures. The pictures, displayed on cardboard, portrayed typical scenes of everyday life in early Texas. The poster entitled "Homes and Everyday Chores" revealed pioneers hunting for food, building homes, etc.. Another poster showed the life of a cowboy and one revealed the social life and school days of early Texans. The recreation poster included such fun as the "old swimming hole". A poster of hazards had pictures of prairie fires and stagecoach runaways. Also, a poster had pictures of businesses and homes of Rotan during her beginnings as a town.

The following text, prepared by Mrs. Bill Graham, was read by Miss Josie Baird.

The country along the Gulf of Mexico beyond the United States possessions was called Texas by the Spanish and the Mexicans.

Americans began to move into this region about 1819 and soon large numbers had arrived. Both John Quincy Adams and Andrew Jackson (when they were president of the U.S.) had tried to buy the territory, but Mexico, which had gained her independence from Spain, refused to sell. The Texans began to talk about independence, and in 1835 fighting began. They organized the Republic of Texas and asked to be admitted to the United States. Many Northerners opposed talking Texas, because they feared that it would give the southern, or slave holding, states so much more territory.

"President Tyler favored annexing Texas. The North opposed him strongly, but Tyler's plan succeeded, though Texas did not actually join the Union until 1845, when Polk was President. On Feb. 16, 1845 Texas became a state in the Union; the Lone Star Flag of the Republic was lowered and the Stars and Stripes were raised. Texas was given the right to be divided into five states later if its people so desired. But the Texans have been so proud of the size of their state that they have never wished it to be divided.

"Mexico had never acknowledged the independence of Texas and had threatened the United States. Mexico said that some of the land claimed by Texas had never been a part of Texas and that she would never give it up. So President Polk ordered General Zachary Taylor to advance into the disputed territory. Soon a body of Mexicans (on April 24, 1846) attacked a small part of this force. The President declared that Mexico had begun war against the United States and on May 13, 1846 Congress declared

war against Mexico. The rest is history. Mexico was forced to make peace. All claim to Texas was given up.

"Today I am going to show some of the early life of the Texans using clippings from the Abilene Reporter News and the Rotan Advance (1956-57). The paintings were done by the late D.D. Parramore, a member of one of West Texas' most prominent families. Mr. Parramore, in a Grandma Moses style, did his paintings for his grandchildren. The Advance pictures were published on Rotan's Fiftieth Anniversary. All of the pictures are typical of early day life. Also, I included a program from Canyon's Musical "Texas". It has several sketches that are true Texas scenes. Each one of us had an obligation to help preserve the past and present and to contribute something for the future. Our ancestors left us a great heritage!"

After the program Mrs. Hale served refreshments from the buffet. The following members were present for the meeting: Misses Delila and Josie Baird; Mmes. Sturley Fisk of Valley Mills, Calvin Phillips, Mike Porter, J.L. McCright, Ernest Smith and Mrs. Hall, all of Rotan.

Home Economics

Screwworms have been confirmed in Fisher County. The case came from Odell Rains' ranch located 16 miles west of Rotan on FM Road 1614. The infestation was in the calf navel.

All herds in the county should be checked regularly and all surgical practices stopped until after frost. All possible samples should be collected and sent to the lab in Mission, Texas. Vials are available from my office.

A fly drop will be made in Fisher County September 30, weather permitting.

Robbing the cradle as far as calves are concerned may be both economical and tasty. If you have a weaning calf or can buy one, eat it. Up until two years ago, this type of calf would bring twice as much money in an auction to go to the feedlots in West Texas as it was worth on your table. Recently, these calves have been bringing 34 cents a pound at auctions compared to fed cattle at about 53 cents.

Because these calves have never been fed grain and are not old enough to marinate, the meat is not as desirable as heavy hoiced beef for charcoal broiling.

Any other method of preparing calf meat is ideal. It is even better than veal and can be substituted in a veal recipe.

Some physicians recommend this type of beef because it has less fat.

Baby beef or calf, as it is advertised in grocery stores and meat markets, should be slaughtered at seven to eight months, right at weaning age.

Calves should not be weaned and fed for 30 days prior to slaughtering, as some people practice. If you do feed them for only a month, you're wasting time and money.

If you feed them for this short period, the first week they'll just bawl; the second week, they'll nibble; the third, they'll eat a little; and the fourth, they'll eat enough to gain back what they lost during the three-week adjustment period. The best time to get them is right after weaning.

4-H boys and girls throughout Texas and the nation will join in a salute to America's Bicentennial celebration during National 4-H Week, Oct. 5-11.

The annual observance, with this year's theme of "4-H...76... Spirit of Tomorrow," is designed to accent the history, ideals and goals of the 4-H program.

Many county groups are planning special events, service projects and recruitment drives during National 4-H Week. It's a special time when 4-H is recognized for its contributions to the growth and development of youth.

The 4-H program is active in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Virgin Islands as well as

in more than 80 countries. It is administered by the Cooperative Extension Service, and Extension professionals play an active role in recruiting, training and assisting volunteer leaders who help with local 4-H activities.

Some 7.2 million youth between the ages of 9 and 19 are currently enrolled in 4-H, with more than 215,000 of these in Texas. More than 21,000 volunteer adult and youth leaders assist with local 4-H programs in

the state. Although the majority of 4-H members still live on farms and in rural communities, 24 per cent now come from larger urban and suburban areas. Well over half the Texas 4-Hers live on farms or in towns of under 10,000 population.

Texas 4-Hers participate in more than 60 educational project areas, with the most popular being food and nutrition, clothing and textiles, and horses and ponies.

Since its beginning around the turn of the century, 4-H has offered practical learning and citizenship experiences to millions of young people.

Nutritious Snacks

Nutritious snacks given an extra boost to help preschoolers avoid tooth decay, Mrs. Mary Sweeten, foods and nutrition specialist, has advised.

"Celery cut in fan shapes, carrot curls, radish roses, lettuce leaves or raw cauliflower will tickle a preschooler's imagination—and satisfy his hunger pains," this specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said.

Serve fresh fruits such as melon balls, plums, apples, oranges, grapefruit, lemonade or other juices.

Meat, boiled eggs or cheese cubes or wedges add protein for the hungry child and do not hasten tooth decay, she reminded.

Tooth decay results from chemical reactions in the mouth. Starch foods supply the food required by germs or bacteria in the mouth. This results in acid formation, which takes anywhere from 10 seconds to 30 minutes after eating candy or other starchy

foods. Thus the result is tooth decay.

The longer this acid remains in the mouth, the more likely the tooth is to decay. This is why hard candies kept in the mouth a long time are actually more harmful than a chocolate bar or chocolate mint.

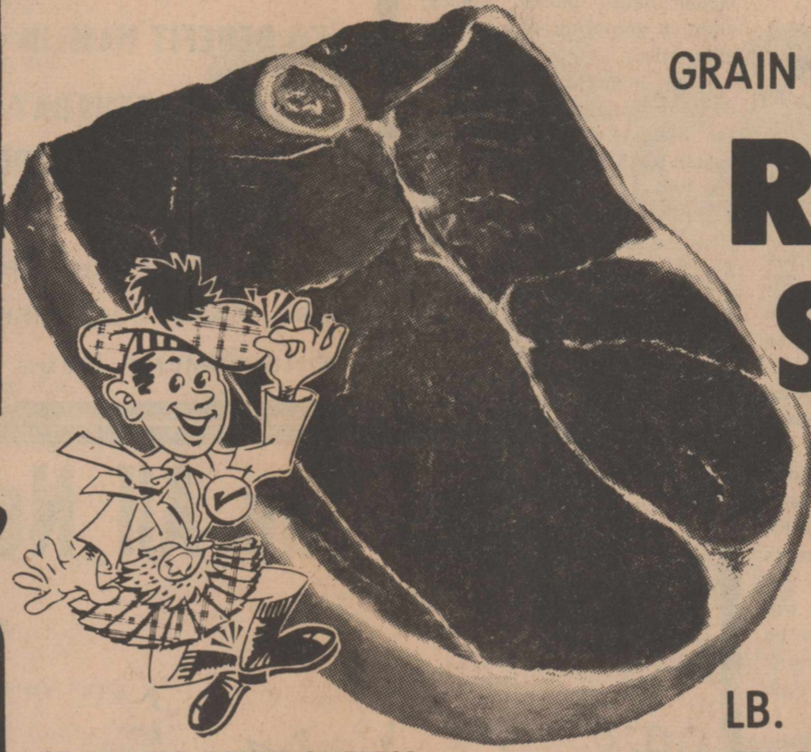
