


Let's play square with our merchants. Let's at least see they can offer us here in Haskell before we buy elsewhere. Only fair, isn't it?

TELLING THE WORLD

Outside and Inside Dope on Haskell County People As Told By Our Rambling Representative.

Heavy Smith local contractor and Jack Sills Photographer returned last Monday late in the afternoon weary and faint from the excitement of the day spent fishing in Point Creek, the popular resort of the anglers of the city. They had a story to tell the recorder of this column that was rather straining upon our vivid imagination. They told of the exact spot on the banks of the stream where they sat and fished. From their account we drew the conclusion that they used larval ropes for fishing lines. Jersey cows for bait and the fish were so numerous that they almost blocked the flow of the stream. We have since learned that both boys reported being very hungry on return which was evident that they did not catch the fish in the banks of the creek as some of the other fishermen have reported after big catches.

Boys and the Farm.

Some writers lament the fact that boys are leaving the farms as though a farm boy had not the same right to choose his vocation as other boys. There would be as much light in as saying that the son of a coal miner, for instance, should not aspire to be anything but a coal miner.

Of course if a farm boy has no ability for a certain business or profession, it is not wise to apply himself to learning a skilled trade. He had better stay on the farm. Without education, he would be worse off in the town or city than in the country. Probably remain-

ing a common laborer.

But for the intelligent farm boy who can secure an education it cannot be denied that the cities offer wider opportunities. In fact, many of the leaders in every field of endeavor came originally from the farm.

While most of the trades and professions appear to be crowded today, farming is also overdone, as may be seen by the unsatisfactory condition of agriculture. More farm products are raised than can be marketed at a profit over the cost of production.

Whenever the demand exceeds the supply we shall see better prices for agricultural products and we shall also see people going back to the farm. But until that time comes the farm boy should be encouraged to enter any vocation for which his talents and education fit him.

It may be added that there are even now excellent opportunities made on the farm for boys and others who will study and apply modern agricultural methods but the future holds little for the indolent shiftless, on the farm or anywhere else.

We had so much local work to do this week and had to attend the Fifth Sunday meeting for three days and had a lot of work to do on our books, we were kept so busy we could not get out and get our usual batch of country news that we are always glad to include in our write up. We are making plans to make more house-to-house trips in the future as soon as the

school closings and other gatherings are past and every one gets down to business after the big rain which we must have within the next week or so.

Some folks are getting blue over the rain not getting here on time, this is to be regretted, but we do not always know what's best for us. This county has lots of time to make a bumper crop yet. Some times we get in a hurry and the days get long when we are needing the rain that does not come, but the world has stood many years dependant on rain for the food supply. Let's not throw up the sponge in 1925 just because the rain did not come when we wanted it. It seldom does that any way.

We heard the story told of the fellow in this section who planted his crops around the 15th of July and made a bumper crop, but said that he had learned one thing in West Texas that this late planting, the latter part of August was not always successful.

KILLING JOHNSON GRASS IS NO EASY TASK

The eradication of Johnson Grass in sections of the South and of the far West, where it flourishes as a weed, entails much hard work. Farmers' Bulletin 1437, "Johnson Grass as a Weed," now published by the United States Department of Agriculture, summarizes several methods of eradication and suggests others which have been found most effective in various localities and under different conditions of soil climate and culture.

In attempting to clear fields of Johnson grass by any method, says M. W. Talbot, author of the bulletin, the threefold aim should be: 1) to exhaust existing rootstocks and to prevent the growth of new ones; 2) to kill new seedlings and to prevent the ripening and scattering of seeds. Attempts at eradication in fields in which the grass is well established are quite useless, a thorough job can be done.

The pamphlet explains the way in which Johnson grass multiplies itself, and general methods of control. These pasturing or mowing followed by shallow plowing and tilled crops, is the general system, subject to local modifications, which has proved most effective over most of the infested territory. In certain arid regions a combination of methods is effective. A vigorous stand of alfalfa usually thins the stand of Johnson grass. In waste places such as fence rows, railroad rights of way and ditch banks the ripening of seeds should be prevented by any practicable means.

Farmers' Bulletin No. 1537-F is a revision of and supersedes Farmers' Bulletin 279-F. It may be obtained free on application to the Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.


