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
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



General Fogleman stresses truth

New chief of staff brings his Air Force vision to the troops

KELLY AFB, Texas -Within a sea of green BDUs, a blue-clad general approached the stage as the crowd anxiously awaited to hear what the new chief had to say. And he gave the crowd his pledge.

"My pledge to you is I will tell the truth; I will tell the truth," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman to a crowd of more than 3,500 gathered in a hangar for chief's

"My wife, Miss Jane, and I have been in this business for 31 years. A long time ago we stopped serving because of the positions that might become available — we just like being around first-class people.

"We have reached that point in life that who you serve with is more important than where you serve or what job title you hold," General Fogleman said.

other than to go raise hogs in Tennessee.

There is no benefit for me to go up on the (Capitol) Hill and do anything except tell the truth, and not only do I owe it to you but there is just no gain from anything else. So you need to help me tell the truth."

The general was introduced by Gen. Henry Viccellio Jr., Air Education and Training Command commander, who said, "He has got the right perspective for our Air Force in 1994 and the years ahead. He

the right relationship between the two."

As he got up on stage and looked out of the hangar General Fogleman saw a giant C-5 and said, "All around the world that big T-tail with the American flag on it shows that this country cares."

The new chief, who also visited nearby Randolph AFB and Wilford Hall Medical Center on Nov. 15, said he wanted to talk to as many folks as he could in the total force team, not because what he had to say is focused on mission and he is was going to be so special since

"I thought that the best way to do that was to come out and see you face to face and give you the opportunity to ask some questions and give me some feedback," General Fogleman said.

He said he wasnit going to slam on the brakes and change direction for the Air Force because he felt by and large the Air Force was moving in the right direction. "I had some advice from my Navy friends that told me a saying in the Navy nautical circles that when you assume the watch and you stand on the bridge, you should not trim the sails for at least 10 minutes.

"The idea here is that you have the opportunity to figure out where you're going before you decide to change direction,


For those of you who are staying in Lubbock, I encourage you to share your blessings with those in our family who are unable to be with loved ones this Thanks-

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Chief of staff says AF downsizing nears end

(Continued from Page 1) otherwise you might wind up going in circles and Iim not interested in going in circles," hesaid.

The general discussed his philosophy since assuming his new position. General Fogleman said that external changes such as the end of the Cold War and internal changes as in downsizing of the force are all coming to an end.

"The internal change has been very painful but necessary. I feel I owe my predecessor, General (Merrill A.) McPeak, a great debt. We all do, I believe, owe a debt of gratitude for the internal restructuring that he did in building an objective Air Force," General Fogleman said, "in de-layering us and getting us in a position to survive in the late-1990s and into the 21st century. We are past that now."

He now wants to move forward and deal with operations and personnel tempo. "We need to remind ourselves that what we do is not just another job but that we are truly members of a profession, a profession of arms," he said.

He quoted Winston Churchill, who said that reservists were twice the citizen. "I know that what I am saying is not equally applicable to all, but the fact of the matter is that this is an allvolunteer organization, itis an organization and profession that is based on the premise of service above self."

General Fogleman said that through his travels the people he has met are willing to go just about anywhere and do anything for this great nation as long as four things were observed.

"One, they think what they are doing is important and worthwhile; two, that what they are doing is appreciated; and three, that they have some hope for some kind of recognition for the work that they do," he said. "But most importantly, that their families are taken care of while they are out there doing it.

B-1B passes Congressional readiness tests

Air Force bombers complete round-the-clock assessment

ROSWELL, N.M. (AFNS) — The last B-1B to fly at Roswell as part of the Congressionally mandated Operational Readiness Assessment landed Nov. 18, giving the 28th Bomb Wing a cumulative missioncapable rate of 85 percent. The flight marked the end of 14 days of 24-hour-a-day flying operations at capable rate of 75 percent. Mission-capable rated is Roswell for the B-1B unit deployed here from the percentage of time an aircraft is partially or fully Ellsworth AFB, S.D.

"We flew 109 of 109 scheduled sorties," said Lt. Col. Thomas Owskey, 28th Bomb Wing (Deployed) commander. "It just doesn't get any better than that." Owskey flew the last Roswell mission.


We've proven we can pack up, go anywhere in the

world and put jets in the air and bombs on target," he said, "without sacrificing any of our high-tech capability.'

The 700-person operation came here to complete the final hurdle of the six-month test - flying a twoweek wartime schedule from an austere location. The ORA began June 1 and will end Nov. 30. The Roswell phase started Nov. 4.

The ORA was designed to evaluate the unit's ability to achieve and sustain an overall mission capable of performing at least one wartime mission.

Congress directed the test when considering the defense budget for fiscal 1994. Concerns arose over proposed spending levels for B-1B programs and upgrades, due to low mission capable rates for the aircraft. The Air Force responded that low B-1B

mission capable rates — when compared with other bombers — were because of shortages in spare parts and manning levels due to underfunding.

Congress directed the Air Force to conduct the test and set the 75 percent goal to resolve the issue. The Air Force then called on Ellsworth's 28th Bomb Wing, its lead unit in converting the bomber to conventional use, to fly out the test plan.

Senior leaders get EO training

BOLLING AFB, Wash. (AFNS) — Senior Air Force leaders learned strategies to identify and combat discrimination and harassment during a two-day workshop here Nov. 1-2.

The Defense Equal Opportunity Management Institute at Patrick AFB, Fla., conducted the workshop for Secretary of the Air Force Sheila E. Widnall and 25 military and civilian staff members, said Air Force offi-

Secretary Widnall requested the training in response to a March 3 memorandum from Defense Secretary William Perry. Secretary Perry directed all Department of Defense personnel, including senior executive service members and new 0-7s, to attend equal opportunity training as part of a plan to solve discrimination and harassment problems in DOD.

The workshop covered topics such as preventing sexual harassment, identifying and combating factors which contribute to racism and sexism, and the relationship between power bases and discrimination.

DEOMI will hold a second workshop May 11-12 for senior leaders at Langley AFB, Va., officials said.

In his March memo, Secretary Perry also announced: ☐ The creation of the office of deputy assistant secretary of defense for equal opportunity, which will be the focal point for military and civilian programs.

Restructure of the EO counsel with the deputy secretary of defense in charge of the counsel and service secretaries as counsel members.

Secretary Perry also tasked the under secretary of defense for personnel and readiness to lead a study of the officer "pipeline" and, if necessary, recommend ways to improve the flow of minority and female officers from recruitment through the general and flag officer ranks.

Additionally, Secretary Perry asked the service secretaries to support efforts to get more women, minorities and people with disabilities in management positions.

Savings Bonds interest rate up

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The semiannual interest rate for Series EE Savings Bonds has increased to 5.92 percent, according to Treasury Department officials. The rate will remain in effect through April 30, 1995.

The rate on May 1 was 4.7 percent. The Savings Bonds semiannual rate is 85 percent of the previous six months' average market rate on marketable Treasury securities with five years remaining to maturity—in the case, 6.96 percent. The rate is announced each Nov. 1 and May 1.

Series EE Bonds purchased since Nov. 1, 1982, and held five years or longer, earn the average of semiannual rates during the holding period or the minimum rate in effect at the time of purchase, whichever is higher. Bonds issued between Nov. 1, 1982, and Oct. 31, 1986, have a minimum rate of 7.5 percent through their 10-year original maturity. Bonds issued from Nov. 1, 1986, through February 1993 have a minimum rate of 6 percent through their 12-year original maturity. Bonds issued since March 1993 have a minimum rate of 4 percent. When held five years or longer, these bonds will receive the average rate if higher than 4 percent. Minimum rates can change when the bond reaches original maturity and enters an extended maturity period.

Series EE Bonds issued before November 1982, all Series E Bonds issued since November 1954, and Saving Notes are now receiving market-based rates or their current guaranteed rate, whichever is higher, Treasury Department said.


