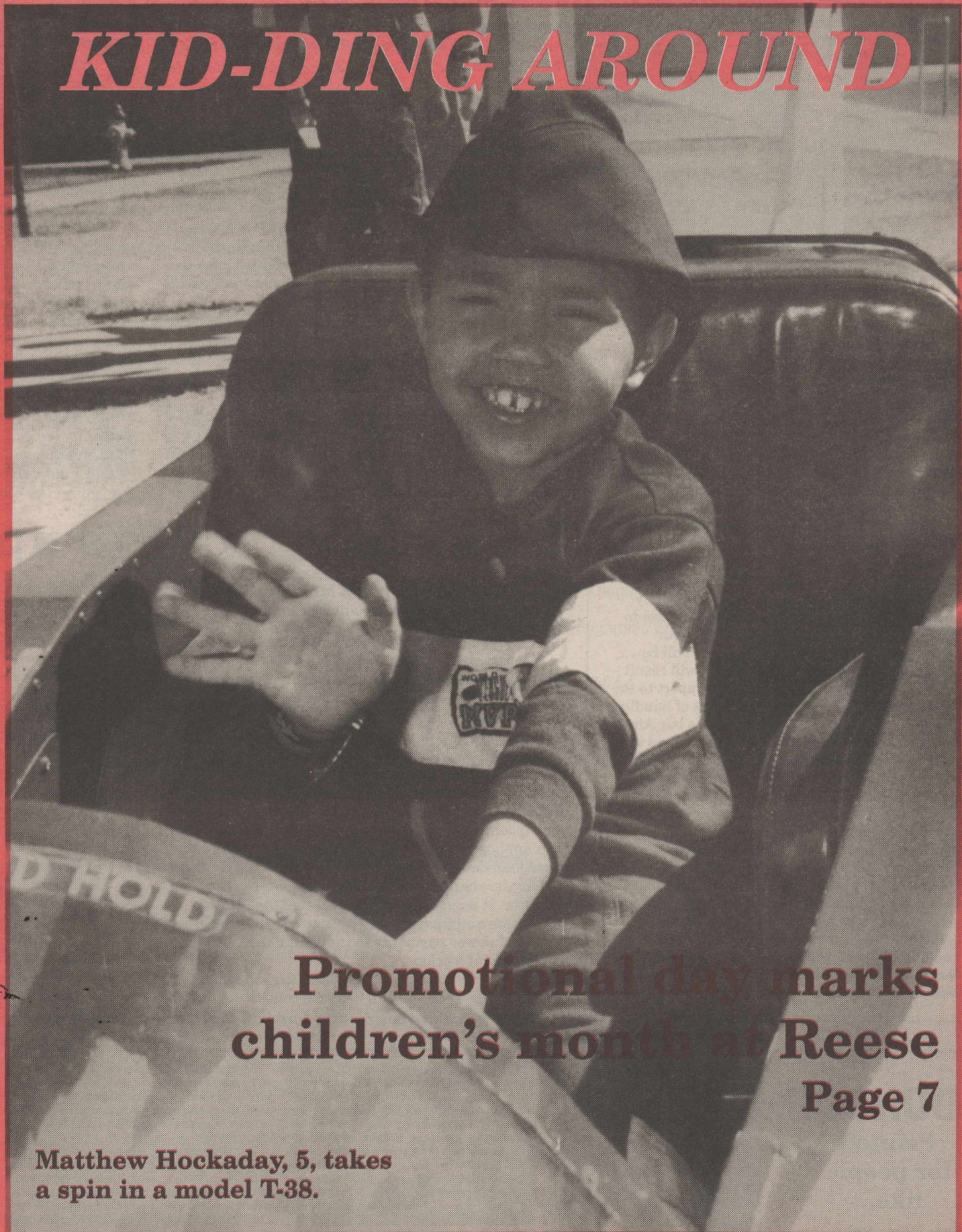

From my perspective

First, I would like to thank Col. Roger Brady for giving me the opportunity to speak to the Reese family through this column. I am relatively new at Reese, having arrived just after last Christmas.



However, my organization, Lockheed Support Systems Inc., has been responsible for aircraft maintenance at Reese since October 1989, when the decision was made to contract aircraft maintenance for the wing. Since we assumed that responsibility, our objective has been to provide the finest quality aircraft to the wing at the lowest possible cost.

Naturally, the economics of a contract operation have necessitated some differences between the traditional "blue-suit" maintenance organization and our contract operation. The most obvious is that we operate with significantly fewer personnel. We can afford to do this primarily because of the background of our workforce. We average over 12 years of Air Force aircraft maintenance experience, and many of our senior people have more than 20 years on Air Force flightlines. This level of experience results in an ability to repair routine aircraft problems very quickly and contributes to high in-commission rates.

Most importantly, I want to tell you that we consider ourselves an integral part of the 64th FTW. To our people, this is more than just a job. Most of us spent our entire adult lives in uniform, and it is not a coincidence that our Lockheed maintenance uniforms are blue. This contract gives us an opportunity to continue to serve our country and to be around airplanes and the people who fly them, which is worth more than money to most of us.

As is the case in the Air Force, Lockheed enthusiastically supports the concepts of total quality management. Accordingly, we have been steadily evolving our maintenance organization at Reese to improve our service and responsiveness to our customer, the 64th FTW. This spring, we will be making some additional changes, which will result in even more responsive maintenance support to the flying squadrons and more efficient ways of handling some of our other responsibilities, such as our Air Combat Command companion trainer sites and our recovery responsibilities for other AETC and ACC aircraft with cross-country maintenance requirements. These organizational changes are a result of careful analysis of our process, and while most of them will be transparent to the rest of the wing, we are confident that they will improve our service.

I invite any member of the wing who has a suggestion to improve our service to visit me or anyone in my organization and provide us with your suggestion. We are a service organization, and as such, are only as good as our customer feedback. We are committed to the wing, Reese and Lubbock for the long pull. We want to do our part to make Reese the best in AETC and in the Air Force.

Child care during recalls

We're having a real problem with the child development center during base recalls, one that has been discussed at the parents' advisory board with 64th Services Squadron officials.

We have been told that the child development center is on the command post's check list to call. Obviously, the command post is not doing their job of calling and getting them open. I don't understand why we have to pay such high prices to get good care, and we can't even get the center open for base recalls.

There are a lot of military married to military on this base. The dependent care on base does not work when it comes to recalls!

I appreciate your call. Our objective in exercising the base recall plan is to determine if we can respond quickly to taskings or emergency situations. Individuals are required to have standing arrangements for child care in case of such an emergency.

As part of initial in-processing, members acknowledge that the child care center and youth center would not be considered a source of primary care for dependent children. In most exercise scenarios, however, we can plan to open the child development center during an after-duty-hours recall — and we will do this for future exercises.

If you haven't done so recently, this is a good time to review Air Force Regulation 35-59, "Dependent Care Responsibilities."

Service on your smile

I just wanted to say how pleased I was with the service that we've been getting out at the Reese hospital. The primary care clinic has been very accommodating in getting appointments either the same day or the next day. They never put you off and they treat you very nicely when you're there.

The other day something really nice happened. I got a call from the dental clinic saying they had pulled my records from civilian personnel. They were going through the retirees working at the base and they called me in for a cleaning appointment. They identified a filling I needed and fixed it. I was also able to get my wife in and they did a root canal on her today.

I just want to commend them for the way they're trying to do their job. I understand that they can't always do it like that because of manning and all the other stuff that goes with it, but they do try very hard to do what they can. I appreciate it very much and just wanted to let you know.

'PowerPay' powers up paybacks

Getting out of debt is probably the best investment most consumers can make. It's a risk-free investment that can produce double digit returns by reducing the amount of interest paid.

Getting out of debt also creates flexibility. It allows you to decide how to use your money rather than being tied to fixed payments to creditors. Flexibility gives your family more maneuvering room in case of financial cutbacks or opportunities. Reducing your consumer debt may also help you qualify for a mortgage. Even if your income is high, many lenders will disqualify your loan application if you are carrying too much credit and other loan debt.

That is where the "PowerPay" computer program comes in. It is an easy educational tool that allows consumers and financial advisors to quickly show the impact of power payments in individual debt situations. This is how it works:

□ PowerPay first calculates what the repayment time and interest costs will be if the consumer continues making payments at current levels. It's

shocking for most consumers to see the interest costs and length of time it takes to repay debts, especially if they are making only the minimum required payments.

□ Next, PowerPay calculates the possible savings by using power payments in three scenarios: paying off creditors with the highest interest rate first; paying off creditors with lowest balance first; paying off creditors with the shortest term first.

All this information is available on printouts and can involve as many as 30 creditors. Printouts include:

- Projected interest costs and repayment time for each creditor without power payments.
- Repayment order and costs in time and interest for each creditor using power payments.
- Projected savings in time and money.
- A debt reduction calendar outlining month by month exactly how much is paid to each creditor.

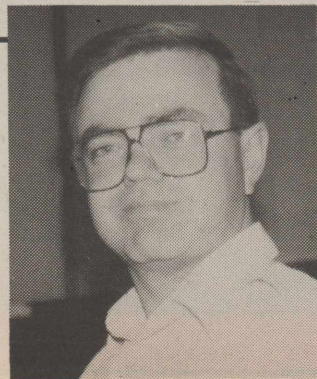

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SPTG gets new leader

Ceremony set for Monday morning

Colonel Theron E. Weimer assumes command of the 64th Support Group during a 10 a.m. ceremony Monday in front of wing headquarters.

Colonel Weimer replaces Col. Bob Brooks, who is moving to Maxwell AFB, Ala., where he will be vice commander of the Civil Air Patrol. Colonel Weimer is currently deputy commander of the 12th SPTG at Randolph AFB, Texas. Everyone on base is welcome at the ceremony.

Colonel Weimer was born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He graduated from the Air Force Academy in 1971 with a bachelor's degree in aeronautical engineering. He received a master of science degree in business management in 1978 from the University of Northern Colorado School of Business.

Following undergraduate pilot training at Williams AFB, Ariz., Colonel Weimer was assigned to the 38th Tactical Airlift Squadron, Langley AFB, Va., as a C-130 pilot. In 1975, he was assigned as a T-37 instructor pilot and later as a flight examiner at Reese. In 1978, he was selected to attend the Air Force Institute of Technology at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio. He graduated from AFIT in 1979 with a masters of science degree in astronautical engineering.

Later assignments included the North American

Air Defense Command at Cheyenne Mountain Complex, Colo.; Sheppard AFB, Texas.; Columbus AFB, Miss.; and Lackland Air Force Base, Texas. While at Lackland, he was the deputy commander for flight operations at the Officer Training School and was instrumental in the creation and activation of the 1st Flight Screening Squadron, becoming its first commander in June 1990. Colonel Weimer assumed his position at Randolph in June 1991.

Looking at his new duties, Colonel Weimer said he is excited about coming to Reese.

"Joining the Reese team is quite an honor," he said. "Reese has a strong reputation for excellence and customer satisfaction. I'm very proud to join an organization with such a commitment and strong sense of community."

Colonel Weimer is a command pilot with nearly 4,000 flying hours. His military decorations and awards include the Meritorious Service Medal with three oak leaf clusters, Joint Service Commendation Medal, and the Air Force Commendation Medal with one oak leaf cluster.

Colonel Weimer is married to the former Diane Kathryn Ferreter of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. They have one son, Theron Jr.

Training inquiries addressed

The Air Force implemented a dramatic change to the enlisted specialty training program last June, and as with any new program, there has been some confusion about these changes.

In the eight months since the "Year of Training" initiatives became effective, higher headquarters has continued to provide clarification and additional guidance to help resolve this confusion. Here are some of the common questions received since the policy changes were implemented:

Q. Why must we wait six months before entering a trainee into 5-level upgrade training?

A. This is so supervisors can evaluate tasks taught in technical training, provide performance base training on 3-level tasks taught to the knowledge level at technical schools, and familiarize the trainee with the organization and mission. After six months, career development courses will be ordered and the trainee will begin five-level upgrade training.

Q. It may only take me a couple of months to provide performance base training and familiarize the trainee with the organization's mission. What do I do next?

A. First, analyze system requirements. This primarily involves data collection — data on the system, its purpose, personnel functional responsibility in the system, the subsystems and parts that make up the system, support equipment or materials, and information on how the system works, is maintained or used. The second step is to list all tasks that must be done, the equipment involved with each task, the conditions under which the tasks must be done and the standards that must be met.

Next, determine the complexity and criticality of the task. If a task is simple to teach or learn and isn't critical to the duty position (e.g., answering the telephone, filing, maybe even conducting sweeper operations) why not make them a 3-skill level training requirement? Sounds simple, but it really isn't. If done correctly, this procedure could take several months or up to a year to complete, depending on the number of tasks performed in the duty position.

One word of caution here. Even if you deem

a task non-complex or non-critical, there could be a regulation stating only 5-skill or 7-skill level personnel may perform it. If so, you must abide by the regulation. Also, if a 5-skill level task is not complex to learn but critical in nature (CPR certification is a good example), you should leave it as 5-skill level training requirement.

Q. If I have a senior airman arrive after graduating from tech school, can I enter him or her into 5-level training without the six-month waiting period?

A. No. All personnel graduating from technical training regardless of rank, must receive a minimum of six months duty experience first. However, those trainees with the rank of senior airman or higher may be upgraded after completing 12 months in training.

Q. Eligibility for promotions were based on an individual's skill level. Has this changed?

A. Yes. Airmen must have a 3-skill level (vs. a 5-skill level) to be promoted to senior airman (this includes senior airmen below the zone). In order for

staff sergeants to be eligible for promotion testing, they must have a 5-skill level by the promotion eligibility cutoff date. For more information on this, contact promotion and testing in the Reese Military Personnel Flight at 3145.

Q. I am a staff sergeant with a 7-level and my trainer is a tech sergeant with a 7-level. Is it correct since we are both 7-levels, he cannot be my trainer?

A. It depends. Normally, the trainer must possess a higher skill level; however, there will be situations where the trainer and trainee have the same skill level. In these cases, the person qualified to perform the task(s) will be the trainer.

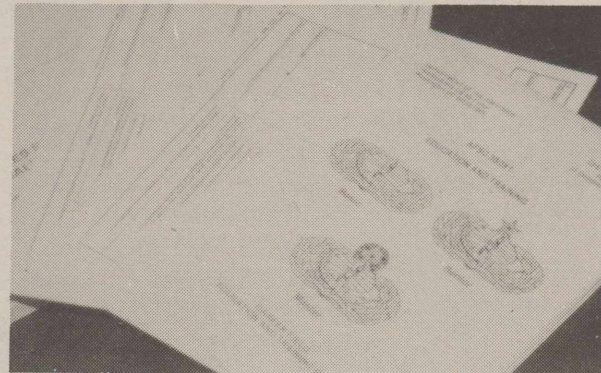
Q. So what you are saying is, I can train the technical sergeant if I'm certified on the task(s)?

A. That's correct.

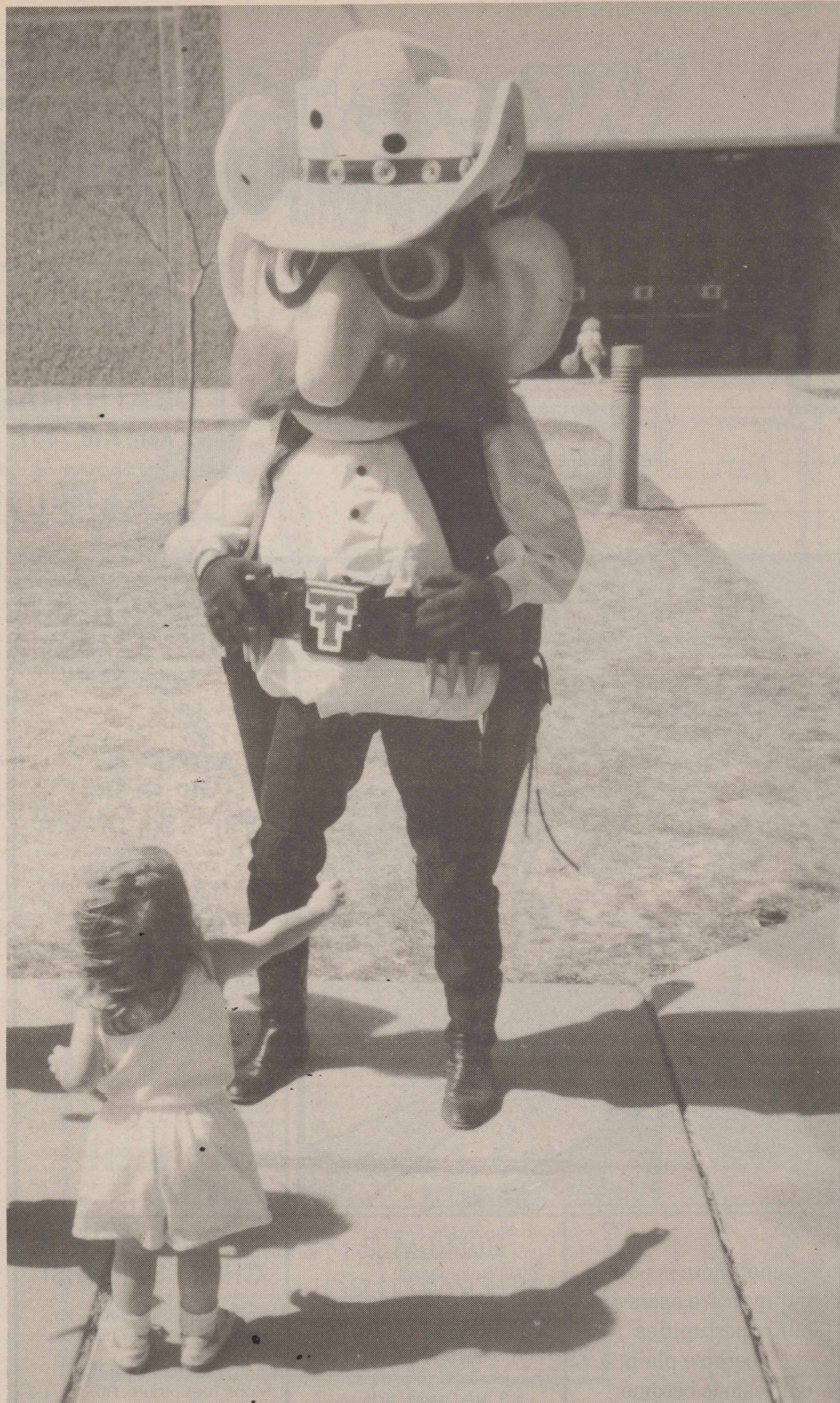
Q. When will 7-level in-residence courses be made available? Also, how will this affect my upgrade to the 7-skill level?

A. Some courses have been activated already. Once a course is activated, personnel in that specialty cannot be awarded a 7-skill level until they complete the course. Personnel will retain their 7-skill level if awarded prior to course activation.

"Overall, it really was a success," said Dulleyn Alewine from the outreach team. "The kids got a big bang out of it, and the feedback I heard was positive."

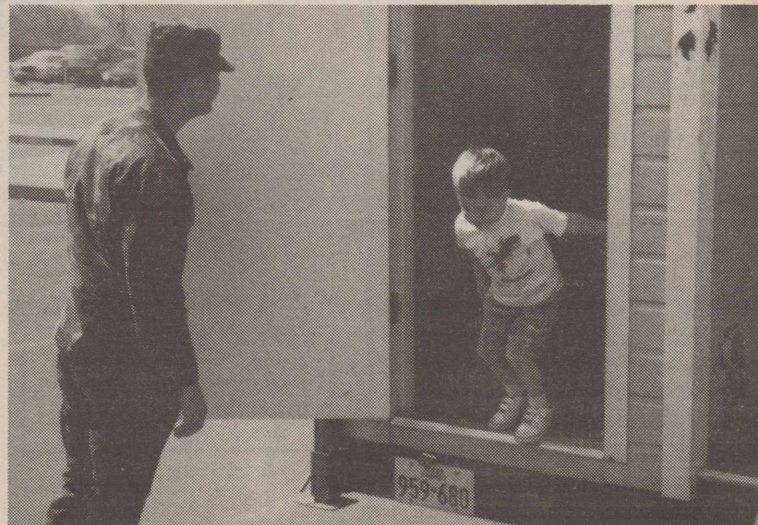
Alewine said thanks goes to all the organizations who played a part in the event.

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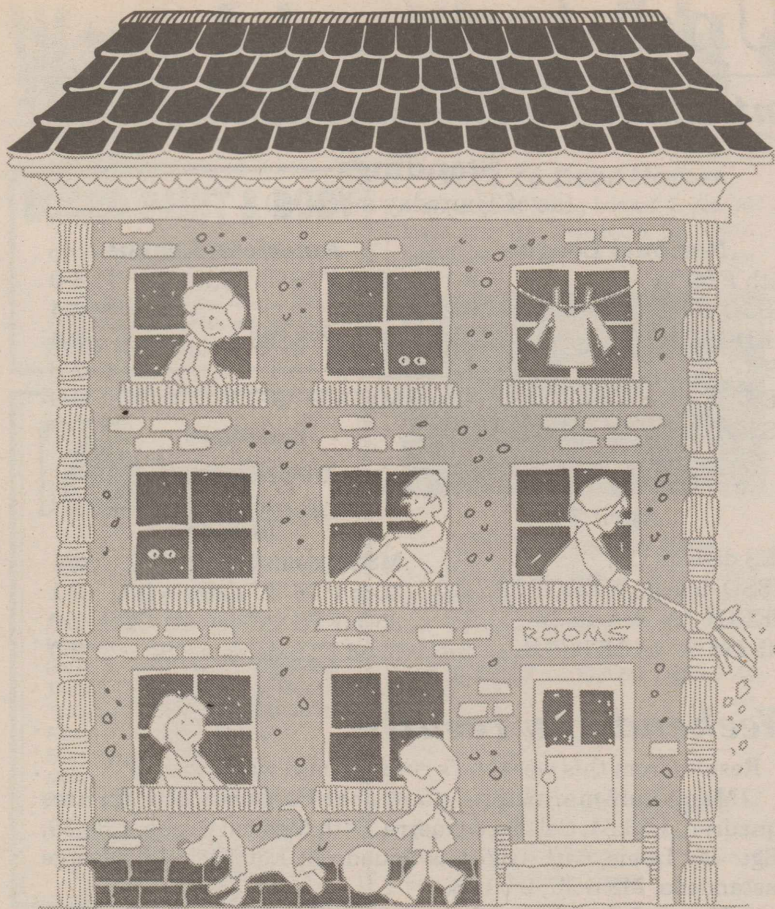
