Modified format spaces events, tests leadership

Reese T-38 maintenance and flight crews launched Air Education and Training Command's restructured Top Flight competition Thursday at Sheppard AFB, Texas.


The T-38 competition is the first of three short-notice events involving Reese aircraft in successive weeks. The T-37 teams will compete Thursday at Laughlin AFB, Texas. Reese will host the T-1A phase on July 28.

Representing Reese in the T-38 phase of Top Flight '94 were: Capt. David Specht, commander, D-Flight, 54th Flying Training Squadron and Capt. Dave Cool, instructor pilot, D-Flight. Maintenance team members included Lockheed's Jessie Hyman, aircraft mechanic, and crew chiefs Tim Martinets and Daniel Mojica.


The annual competition, which tests the leadership skills of AETC flight commanders and maintenance team leaders, is being conducted under a modified format from previous years.

In the past, flights competed at a single location over a two-day period. Under the new format, teams with like missions compete among themselves for the first phase of competition. All participating teams then deploy to Tyndall AFB, Fla., for the arrival competition and award ceremony set for

You have three months to plan and make arrangements. You take care of all the important details like reserving a meeting room, notifying all attendees, and getting on the wing commander's calendar.

You put a notice in the Base Bulletin one week before and send out reminders to everyone. As you are checking over your materials, you realize one of your slides is incorrect.

You'll have to redo it, but you're out of transparencies for your one-of-a-kind machine. You pop over to base supply.

Whoops! Base supply is out of your transparencies. Boy do they have a

Now they tell you you'll have to do an emergency walk through like when you first bought your slide machine! They ask you

where you bought the slides the last time and ask for an emergency walk through letter signed by your commander.

You explain the problem to your commander who happily signs the letter and you return to supply.

After it is loaded into their machine, the computer, and the contracting computer, they send you to contracting.

Be careful to keep the fun in outdoor cooking

Outdoor cooking is one of the most common summertime activities enjoyed by family and friends.

With a little thought, outdoor eating and

cooking can be safe and enjoyable for all concerned. When someone is careless in the preparation, storage, or cooking of food, accidents will happen.

Outdoor cooking
of meats requires
caution to prevent
the meats from
spoiling in warm
temperatures or
direct sunlight. Both
chicken and pork



can spoil very quickly. Cook both types of meat thoroughly to prevent food poisoning. Each year hundreds of people eat under-cooked meat and within a few hours have reactions. The same problem of food spoiling occurs with salads, spreads and packaged meats which are allowed to sit in warm air or direct sunlight. The simplest way to be sure food does not spoil is to keep it in the refrigerator or cooler until it is ready to be cooked or eaten.

The outdoor grill, either fired up with charcoal or gas, is a common appliance in most American homes. The outside shell of a fired up grill is always hot to the touch.

Grills must have a steady base to prevent them from tipping over when in use. Locate outdoor cooking away from other picnic activities. After use, cool the grill before it is emptied or cleaned. Never put hot coals into a trash can or dumpster until the coals are completely cool or thoroughly soaked with water.

Outdoor eating and cooking is a great way to enjoy the summer; don't spoil it with food poisoning or burns.

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

officer, the basic elements of the competition remain the same.

The first phase of Top Flight remains a "short-notice" test, giving only three days' notification to selected aircrews.

Pilot training and airlift competitors fly predetermined flight profiles with flight examiners accompanying the flights and grading areas such as mission briefings, instruction maneuvers and error analysis.

"This is a great for us to match our skills against the other T-38 squadrons in the command," said Lt.Col. Bob Herris, 54th FTS commander. "We expect the competition to be very close."

Maintenance teams are judged on preflight, launch, recovery, refueling and forms documentation.

The specific aircraft flown in the competition are also selected by 19th Air Force.

In all, 13 different types of aircraft will compete in Top Flight'94. In addition to the T-38, T-37 and T-1A, the competition will include C-5, C-141, KC-135, T-43, F-16, F-15, C-21, UH-1, T-3, and AT-38 aircraft.

F-15s and F-16s will fly composite missions during their Tyndall Aug. 26.

During the final phase of the competition, each participating flight team will be assigned a specific arrival time at Tyndall with each flight being videotaped over the arrival point against the official clock.

Nearly 22 years after receiving his pilot's wings here, Col. Randall Gelwix returns to assume command of the 64th Operations Group today.

The change of command ceremony will begin at 9 a.m. west of base operations. Col. Roger Brady, 64th

Flying Training Wing commander, will preside over the ceremony formally transferring command of the 64th OG from Col. Frank Geisler Jr. to Colonel Gelwix.

A command pilot with more than 2,000 flying hours in the T-37, T-38, and F-4 aircraft, including 45 combat missions in Vietnam and Desert Storm, the colonel graduated from pilot training at Reese in August, 1972.

Colonel Gelwix has served the past year as the

executive officer to the commander, Air Education and Training Command, Randolph AFB, Texas.

A 1993 graduate of the Air War College, Maxwell AFB, Ala., Colonel Gelwix holds a master's degree in international relations from Troy State University and a bachelor's degree in business administration from Kansas State University. He was commissioned through the Reserve Officer Training Corps in 1971.

Colonel Gelwix has also served as: deputy operations group commander, 52nd Fighter Wing, Spangdahlem AB, Germany; commander, 81st Fighter Squadron, Spangdahlem (including Desert Storm deployment to Sheik Isa AB, Bahrain); and as a staff officer and executive officer in the directorate of plans, Headquarters U. S. Air Force, Washington D.C.

The colonel has also served as an instructor pilot, flight commander, operations officer, and fighter personnel assignments officer during his career.

The colonel and his wife, Irmgard, have two children — Christ and Steve.

Colonel Geisler is retiring after more than 22 years of service. He has been the operations group commander here since September, 1993.


According to medical officials, most services will be available at the temporary clinic on a walk-in basis. The clinic will be located on the first floor of the Alexander Hall Dormitory (Bldg.

"The clinic will operate much the same as our extended hours program" said 1st Lt. Cuvier Lipscomb, 64th MDG resource manager.

The relocation of services is mandated by the installation of new generator switching gear and the movement of a transformer. 64th MDG officials urge only those people who have an urgent medical problem to use the clinic.

"Routine services such as physicals, dental cleaning, eye exams will be handled when the facility reopens on July 25," explained Lieutenant

Special Gulf War task force seeks aid for sick veterans

WASHINGTON-Declassification of Gulf War records and continued research by a special task force highlight the Pentagon's new plan to help veterans with mysterious illnesses.

Deputy Secretary of Defense John Deutch said the Pentagon wants to provide as much data as possible to help answer questions and alleviate the concerns of those who fear they may have been exposed to chemical or biological agents.

Deutch told reporters during a Pentagon press conference June 23 that there's a continuing need for extensive research "before we will know the true extent and causes of the health problems of the Persian Gulf veterans."

"I want to assure every vet-

department to provide them with every bit of information we have that may have an impact on their health," Deutch

At question is a wide range of health care problems that have eluded diagnosis and cure.

Over the past three years, some Desert Storm veterans have complained of fatigue, painful muscles and joints, bleeding gums, skin rashes, short-term memory loss and

The task force was headed by biologist and Nobel Prize laureate Dr. Joshua Lederberg and distinguished civilian scientists from academic centers such as like Stanford University, Harvard and Johns Hopkins.

"There is no evidence that either chemical or biological warfare was deployed at any level, or that there was any exposure of U.S. service memeran that it is the policy of this bers to chemical or biological

warfare agents," Lederberg

As for speculation that the oil fires in Kuwait caused the illness, Lederberg said there was no data to support that

However, the task force report stated in its conclusions that "the overall health experience of U.S. troops in Operation Desert Storm was favorable beyond previous military precedent, with regard to noncombat as well as combat-related disease."

Meanwhile, the Pentagon and the Department of Veterans Affairs are moving ahead with medical research that Deutch said will examine all potentially hazardous expo-

The departments' focus remain on the provision of health care to meet veterans' needs, research into the cause of their illnesses and compensation in appropriate cases, Deutch said.

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


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
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
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54th FTS downs 64th OSS in thriller



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

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
