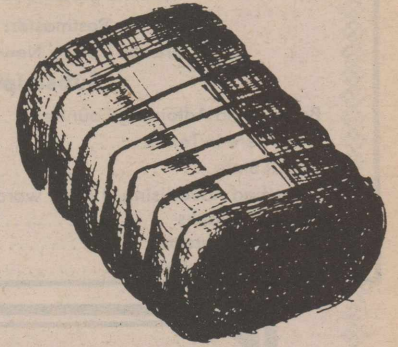
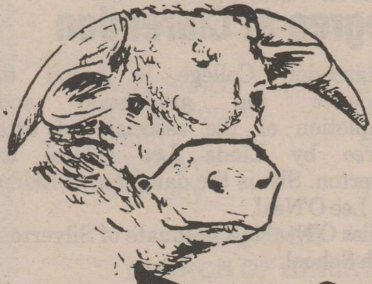

All Around The Town

Kay Ledbetter paid a nice compliment to Potter County Agent Jim Smith in her "Amber Waves" column in Tuesday's Amarillo Daily News.

Smith is the son of Mrs. Vinson Smith and is a graduate of Silverton High School, and most of you probably already know that he is leaving Amarillo to become Travis County Extension Director in Austin.

Ms. Ledbetter wrote: "It's hard to know where to start when it comes to saying goodbye to someone who plays a special role in your life and the lives of so many others. Jim Smith, Texas Agricultural Extension Agent in Potter County, is leaving us this week. He has accepted a position in Austin as Travis County Extension Director.

"Amarillo is definitely the loser in this deal. Smith was more than just the County Agent for Potter County, although he served in that position well.

"He was honored with a resolution from the Texas A&M University board of regents for outstanding work in 1985. He was the 1986 state winner of the National Association of County Agricultural Agents Public Information Award. In 1985 and 1987 he was the NACAA state winner of the Search for Excellence Award-Urban Programs award. In 1988 he was the NACAA state winner of Search for Excellence Award-Public Relations award.

"The awards continued in 1988 with the Urban Forestry Award from the Texas Forest Service for Amarillo. In 1989, he was a National Dow Study Tour winner. In 1984 and 1989, he was the state winner of the NACAA Search for Excellence Award-Farm Income. In 1989, he received the TAEX Superior Service Award; 1990, Southern Region NACAA Dow-Elanco Pride Award winner; and in 1990, he received the TAEX Specialists Association Community Development Award.

"Many of those awards came because he was a promoter of Amarillo, a believer in what the city had to offer and how agriculture could play a role in its growth and stability.

"He was a member of the Chamber of Commerce, serving as committee chairman of the Agribusiness Committee, co-chairing Amarillo's Special Events Committee and serving as beautification chairman of Keep Amarillo Beautiful.

"Smith traveled to Dubai, United Arab Emirates, as an Amarillo trade delegate for the Middle East Ag Show. He served on the Amarillo Centennial Committee, the Trees for Texas Task Force, the Chamber of Commerce Economic Development Council and the Mayors Food Processing Task Force.

Incumbents Re-Elected In Local Elections Here

Perry Brunson and Terry Grimland were returned to their seats on the board of trustees of the Silverton Independent School District Saturday. Brunson polled 96 votes and Grimland received 104. They were unopposed, but some write-in votes were cast.

Wayne Nance was unopposed in his election as mayor of the City of Silverton. He received 93 votes and will replace the late A. R. Martin. Some write-in votes were cast for mayor.

John Bowman polled 67 votes to be re-elected to his seat as councilman.

Golden Spread Farmers Market kicked off. He was a member of the Tri-State Fair board and the Will Rogers Range Riders board.

"It's easy to see why the Extension Service would want to promote him and it's easy to see why his absence will be felt in Amarillo.

"Since Smith started in Potter County in 1983, he's been instrumental in getting approval of Lorsban for use in combating the Russian wheat aphid, a pest that could cost the Texas economy more than \$140 million.

"He worked diligently on the Wildflower Project, soliciting \$1,200 to plant wildflowers to beautify and promote tourism in Amarillo. He also was involved in the Pink Lady Project, a project to introduce a new tree species to Amarillo and seeing 30,000 of them planted and the 'Don't Bag It' leaf management program.

"He has devoted considerable time to the Equestrian Center, an ongoing project. Smith solicited \$5,000 from the city and chamber for a feasibility study by the Texas Extension Engineering Service, which indicated a construction cost of \$10 million and an expected benefit of \$320 million over the next 20 years.

"This is one project I wish he could have seen finished before moving on to greener pastures. It needs all the help and promotion it can get.

"But he didn't ask me if he could leave, so I guess I'll have to just wish him the best.

"He's more than a County Agent to most, he's more than a source to me. He's a friend and he's going to be missed," she concluded.

We're sure his mom, Jerry Smith, is very proud of him!

James Griffin received 86 votes and a place on the City Council. He fills the position left vacant by the resignation of Lynn Frizzell.

The other candidates were David Tipton, 46, and Ned V. Childress, 31.

One hundred nineteen votes were cast in the City election.

Rabies shots will be \$5.00; distemper shots, \$10.00; Parvo, \$7.50, and the City dog license is \$1.00.

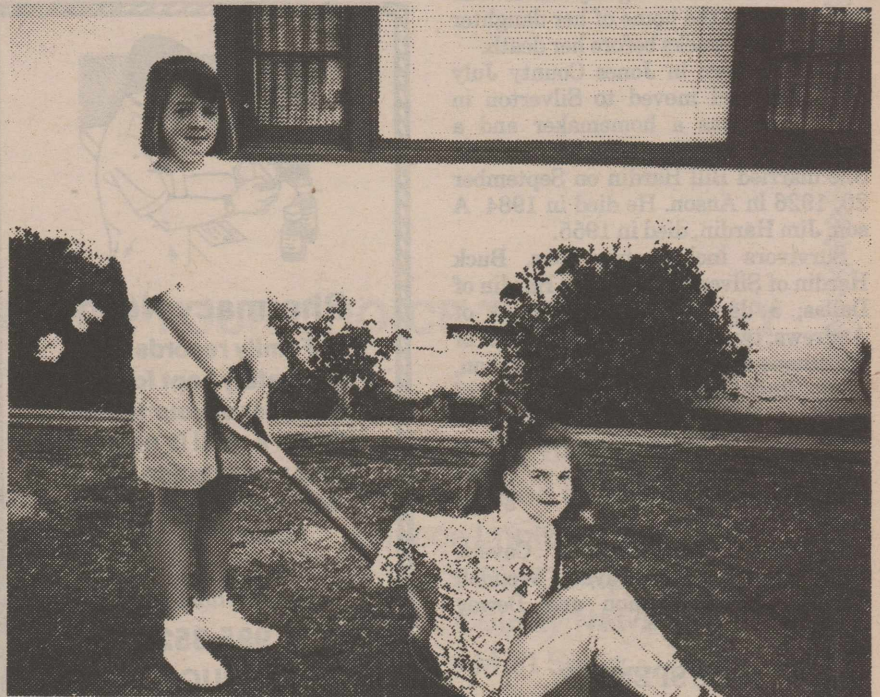
Little Wrangler Rodeo Entries Due on Monday

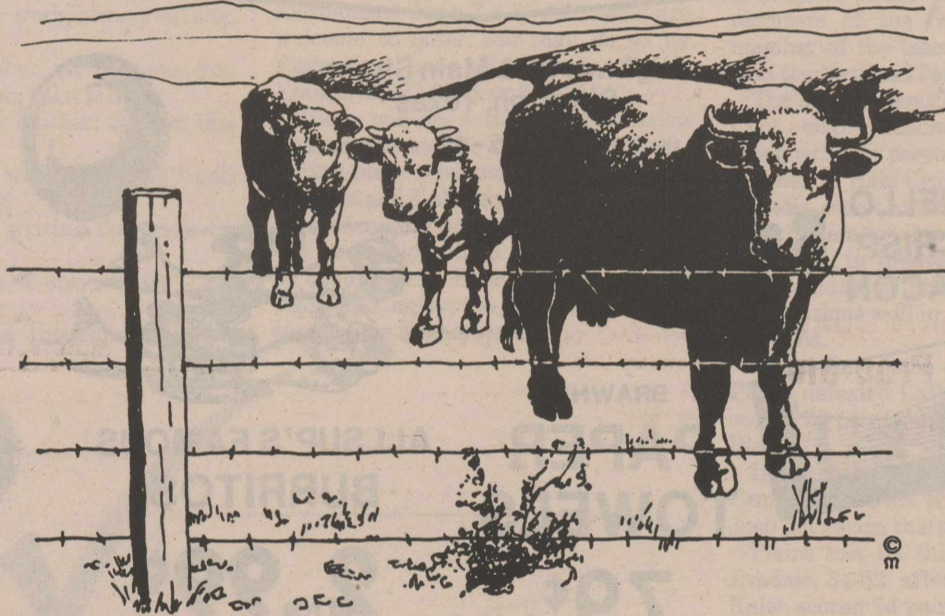

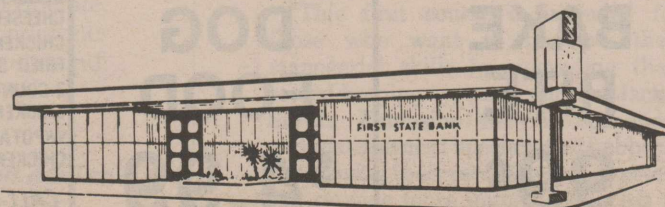

But my country had called me, to go do my part.

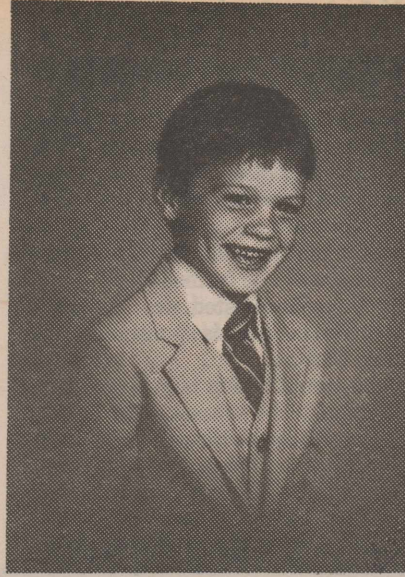
I kissed you and said goodbye, although it hurt me, too.

The software used in this two-day session will be Quicken, Version 4, by Intuit. Since first introduced on the software market several years ago, Quicken has been widely adopted for small business and home record keeping.

While not specifically designed for agricultural use, Quicken is flexible and easily adapted for this purpose. It is especially satisfying for those who have purchased a computer and are anxious to put it to use.

Participants will learn to use Quicken by a case study approach. They will set up a record keeping system with various accounts, income and expense categories and enterprises. Participants will write and print checks and enter transactions in the register.

These transactions will be used to generate customized reports that can be memorized for repeated use. Speeding entry of repeated transactions, using quick keys, and other tips will be discussed. Reconciling, interfacing with Lotus and word processing packages, budgeting, payroll and investment accounts will be covered, as time allows.

This course will run from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. each day. The cost will be \$100.00, which includes workshop materials and catered lunches each day. The necessary software will be provided for the duration of the course. No prior computer experience is necessary. Enrollment will be limited to 14. The deadline for registration will be May 7.

The Computer Training and Education Center is in the Moody Building at the Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 14 miles west of Plainview on Highway 70.

Lake Record Walleye Caught Here Sunday

Lewis Cannon of Tulia brought in a new lake record walleye Sunday at Lake Mackenzie. The fish, which weighed five pounds and thirteen ounces was certified on the scales at Cactus Cove Marina. He caught the big fish on Model A crank bait in the main part of the lake, and broke the previous record of five pounds and two ounces. The record he broke was one he had previously set.

Word from Cactus Cove Marina is that a lot of crappie are being caught on minnows in the creeks by fishermen who are angling four to six feet deep. Many of the crappie are eight and one-half to nine inches in length, but there have been good keepers to twelve inches.

Sand bass are being caught in the creeks and main part of the lake to two pounds on minnows in eight to ten foot deep water.

Temperature at a four-foot depth is 61 degrees and depth at the dam is 99.3 feet.

Other big fish certified at Cactus Cove have been a 3½-pound largemouth caught on a plastic worm in the main part of the lake by Pete Seca of Plainview on April 27.

May 1, a 20-pound 9-ounce yellow catfish was caught on a trotline baited with perch in Tule Creek by Darron DeBerry of Plainview.

A three-pound largemouth bass was caught on a chrome Rat-L-Trap near the second boat ramp by Bill Glenn of Tulia on May 3.

The next day, a 2-pound 14-ounce and a 2-pound largemouth bass were caught on crank bait in the main part of the

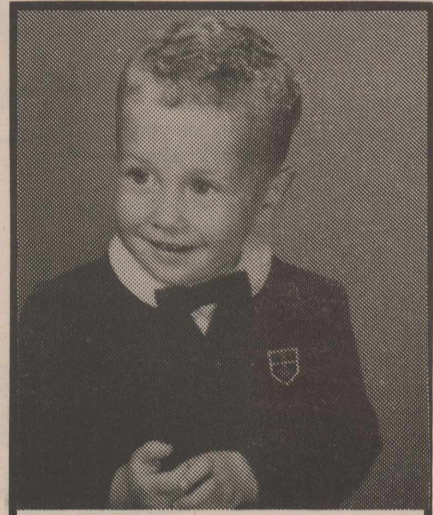
To mother . . . at set of sun: As once

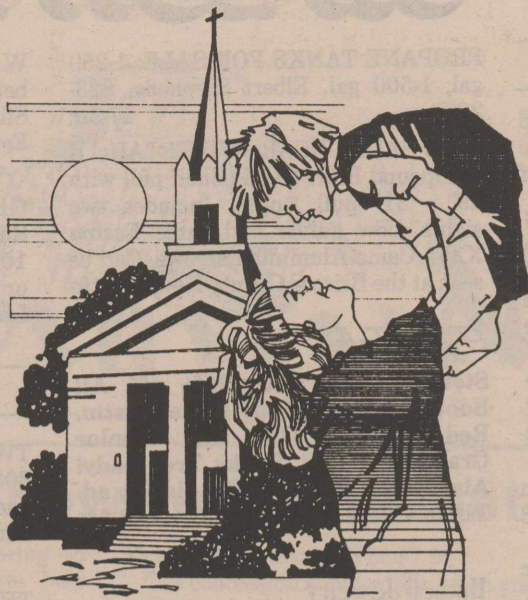

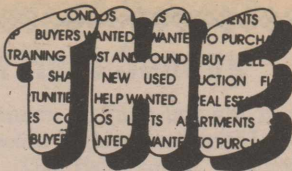

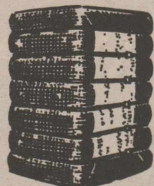
