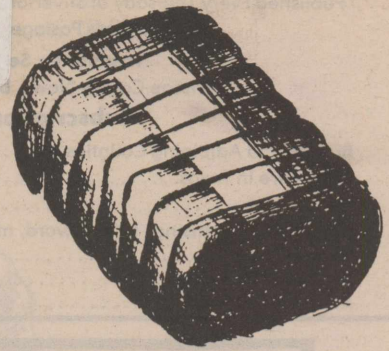

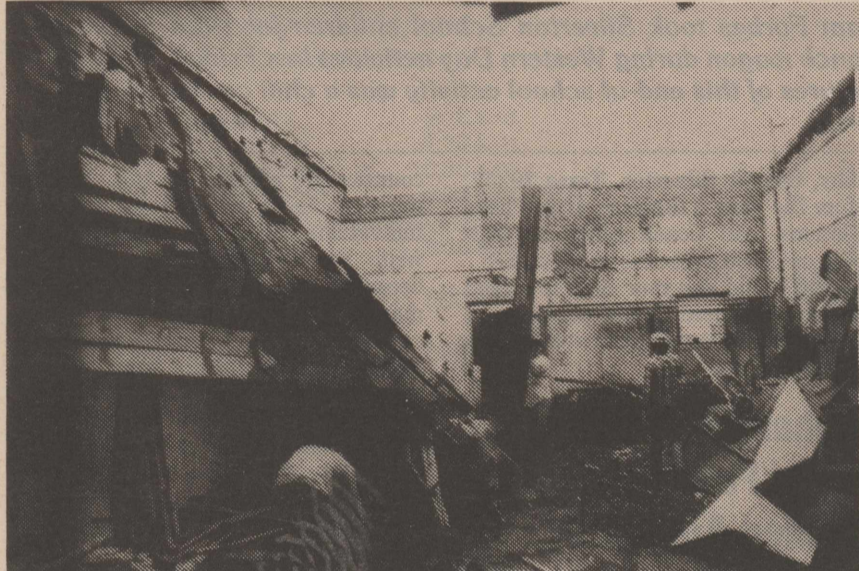

JUANITA (SIS) SELF

Graveside services for Juanita (Sis) Self, 80, were conducted in the Silverton Cemetery at 3:00 p.m. Monday, May 27. Rev. Lee Roark, pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Silverton, officiated.

Mrs. Self died Saturday morning, May 25, at their home on the farm where she was reared.

The former Juanita Jeannetta Riddell, she was born June 6, 1910 in Silverton, and was the daughter of H. L. O. (Harve) Riddell, who came here in 1891 and helped organize Briscoe County, and Delia Lavonia (Johnston) Riddell.

She was married to M. B. (Mart) Self December 31, 1924, in Silverton.

She was a homemaker on the farm until a year ago when they moved to their "winter home" in Silverton. They continued to spend much of their time at the farm.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, J. L. Self of Silverton and Bill Self of Abilene; four daughters, Delma Masey of Lubbock, Deal McGowen of McAllen, Lou Younger and Zobie Self, both of Silverton; a sister, Leona (Tone) Brooks of Silverton; 12 grandchildren, 23 great-grandchildren and a great-great-grandchild.

She was preceded in death by a sister, Nancy Manemma Hutsell, and a brother, R. L. O. (Rags) Riddell.

Grandsons served as pallbearers.

ANNA LEE ANDERSON

Funeral services for Miss Anna Lee Anderson, 93, were conducted at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, May 25, at the Silverton Church of Christ. Officiating were O. C. Rampley and Gary Weeks.

Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements made by Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors.

Miss Anderson died early Wednesday morning, May 22, at the Tulia Care Center where she had resided for a short time. She had broken her hip in a fall at her home several weeks ago.

Miss Anna Lee, as she was known affectionately to her many former students and friends, was born February 9, 1898, in Silverton. She was the daughter of Thomas Lee Anderson, who came here in 1890 and helped organize Briscoe County, and Elizabeth Ann (Cooper) Anderson, who came to this area in 1893 in a covered wagon.

She attended Silverton Schools and was graduated from Silverton High School. She taught three years, in the Flint community in Swisher County and in Hereford, then went to college and taught a year in Texhoma, Oklahoma. She returned home to Silverton in September 1925, and

taught 42 more years (1925-1967), retiring in 1967.

She was a member of the Silverton Church of Christ.

Miss Anna Lee was preceded in death by a sister, Ruby Elliston; four brothers, Gill, Clarence, Clagett and Ronald.

Survivors include several nieces and nephews and sisters-in-law, including Josephine Anderson of Silverton.

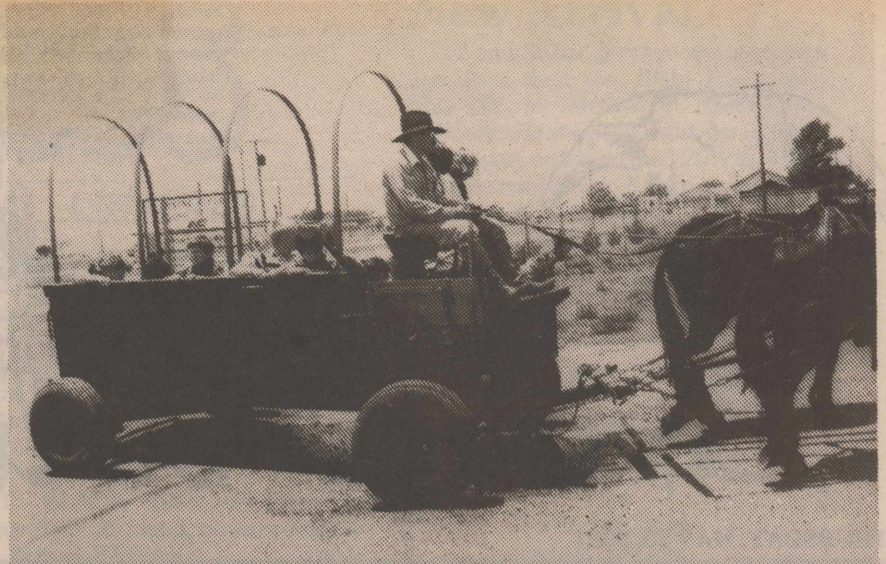

Facilities at Lake Mackenzie Are Constantly Improving

Facilities at Lake Mackenzie continue to improve with many additions having been made during the off-season. One of the greatest needs of the lake at present is more water. The lake depth is the lowest now it has been in several years; without the reservoir, however, the cities of Tulia, Silvertown, Lockney and Floydada already would have experienced serious water shortages during the recent dry months.

Since John Earl Simpson has been manager of the Mackenzie Authority, a shop has been built where the table shelters and barbecue grills are constructed, mostly during the winter months when activities decrease at the lake and the work load at the treatment plant is lighter.

Ready-made table shelters were priced by Simpson at \$1,900.00 each plus freight and the time required to assemble them. By utilizing its employees, the Mackenzie Authority is building its own for about \$600.00 each.

"We are fortunate to have such good welders among our employees," Simpson said.

Campsites at the lake are among the cleanest to be found anywhere, and the entire staff of Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority takes pride in this.

There are now 55 campsites, 38 of which are in the recreational vehicle area where there are water and

electricity hookups.

Two dump stations are provided for campers, and there are public restrooms with shower facilities in one of them.

There is a paved road to serve the homeowners of Coronado Shores on the north side of the lake, and there is an all-weather road on the south side of the lake.

About 700 trees have been planted in the last four years.

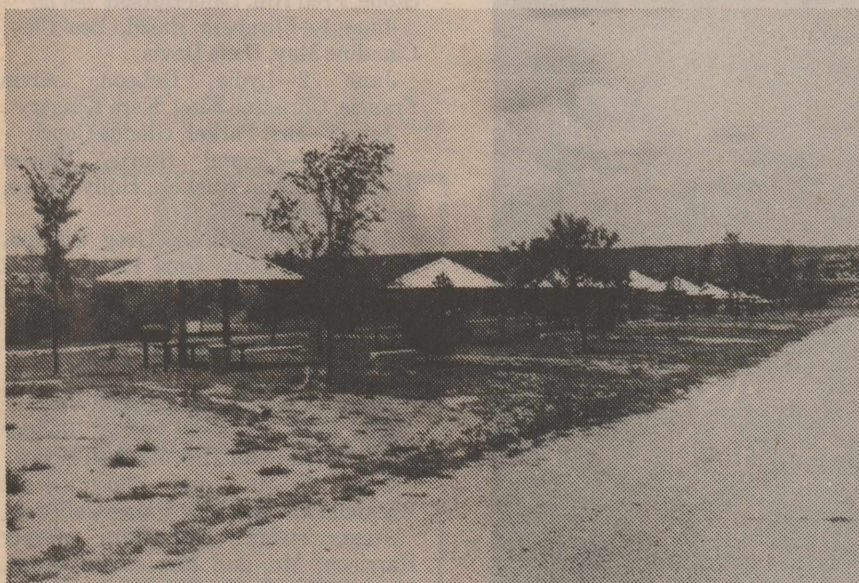
A group shelter is provided for family reunions, business meetings and picnics. It must be reserved by contacting the Authority office. Reservations also are taken for hookups when recreational vehicle clubs and others who want to be sure to have them available for their use.

Future plans include the building of a crappie house on the lake for public fishing.

Estimated attendance last year was near 50,000, and it is expected that attendance will continue to grow each year.

A 2-lb. largemouth bass caught on minnows in Tule Creek May 18 by Kevin Wieland of Lubbock.

Charles Bednorz of Panhandle came out with a 7-lb. 9-oz. striper in Tule Creek while fishing with chicken liver on May 18.

The next day, Christopher Lamborn of Tulia caught a 1-lb. 11-oz. sandbass on crank bait near the second island.

May 21, a 14-lb. and an 11¼-lb. yellow cat were caught on perch in Williams Creek.

Derrick DeBerry of Plainview was the lucky fisherman who caught an 11½-lb. and a 7½-lb. yellow cat on perch near the dam on May 22.

May 24, a 2¼-lb. largemouth bass was caught on a chrome Rat-L-Trap in Tule Creek by Glen Johnson of Tulia.

The next day, a 13-lb. 7-oz. yellow cat was taken on minnows in the main part

of the lake by Boyd Meyers of Dimmitt.

Also that day, Silvertown fisherman J. L. Williams caught a 6-lb. 8-oz. walleye on minnows in Deadman's Creek.

Also that day, a 1-lb. 13-oz. channel cat was caught on minnows in Tule Creek by Jeremy Blair of Lubbock.

Sunday, a 3½-lb. largemouth bass was caught on a Rat-L-Trap in Tule Creek by Chris Mock of Levelland.

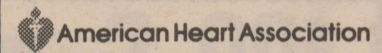
Monday, a 4¼-lb. and a 2¼-lb. largemouth bass and a 1-lb. and 2½-lb. sandbass were caught on minnows near the bluffs by Lonnie and Cindy Venable of Olton.

Reports to Cactus Cove indicate that crappie still are biting good in the creeks. Sand bass are good on minnows in the main part of the lake against the banks. Catfishing is picking up.

Water temperature at a four-foot depth is 74°, and the water depth has risen a little, to 99.12 feet at the dam.

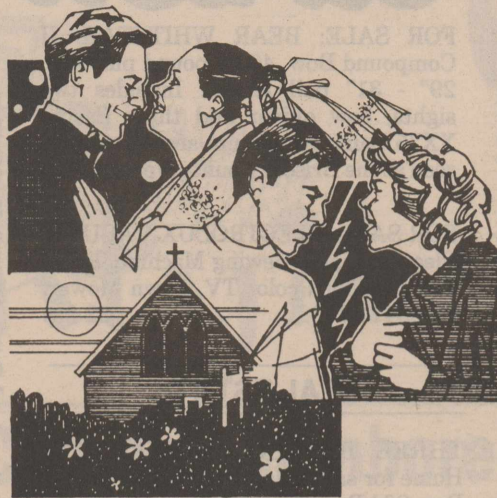

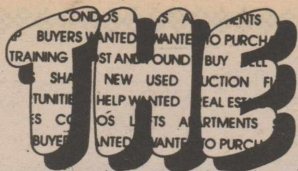

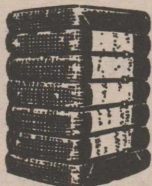
