

Bioenvironmental officials caution against excessive fluoride levels

Since fluoride was first added to drinking water and toothpastes, the number of cavities in children under 14 has decreased.

In West Texas there is enough natural occurrence of fluoride in the water so local water systems don't have to add it to the water.

It is possible for these levels to be higher than considered safe for drinking by the Environmental Protection Agency,

When is this likely to occur? Primarily in the summer months when ambient temperatures reach above 90 degrees. The City of Lubbock Health Department and Reese Bioenvironmental Engineering continually monitor the water for fluoride content.

Despite the recent heat wave, flouride levels in the Reese and Lubbock drinking water remain at safe levels. If the floride level did increase. bioenvironmental would alert Reese personnel through various media sources including

the Roundup, Reese Bulletin and the Commander's Access Chanell (11).

Excessive levels of flouride occur in two categories -- maximum contaminant levels and secondary maximum contaminant levels. Maxim levels would be high enough to pose an actual health risk, secondary levels -- the most likely to occur -- could couse a condition known as fluorosis, which can discolure and damage teeth.

There are two ways to help prevent flourosis in the case of secondary fluoride levels. Children can drink bottled water, but this won't have any fluoride. The Reese Dental Clinic can provide fluoride drops by prescription which will provide the necessary amount of fluoride. For information about fluoride presecriptions contact the clinic at 3711. Children can drink a mixture of bottled and tap water (1:1 ratio).

Anyone with questions concerning the base's water should call bioenvironmental engineering at 3327.

President dedicates Korean memorial

WASHINGTON — President Clinton, Republic of Korea President Kim Young Sam and thousands of Korean War veterans and veterans' family members from around the world gathered on the National Mall July 27 for the dedication of the Korean War Veterans Memorial.

The throng, estimated at more than 50,000, endured oppressive heat and horrid humidity to pay tribute to those from 22 nations who fought, died, were wounded and are missing from the 37-month war that began June 25, 1950, and has commonly been called "The Forgotten War."

"The Korean War veterans endured terrible hardships, deathly cold, weeks and months crammed in foxholes, an enemy of overwhelming numbers, the threat of brutal imprisonment and torture,"

Clinton said.

"They set a standard of courage that may be equaled but never surpassed in the annals of American combat," Clinton

Roughly 1.5 million Americans served in the Korean War, including 54,246 who died; 103,284 who were wounded, 7,140 who were prisoners of war, and more than 8,100 still listed as missing.

Set on 2.2 acres directly across the reflecting pool from the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, the \$20 million memorial was paid for largely with private donations and is a dramatic blend of granite and steel and water and landscaping.

The dominant element of the memorial is a column of 19 larger-than-life stainless steel statues of servicemembers trudging up a hill toward an American flag that represents

Each statue weighs about 1,000 pounds and all U.S. branches of military and ethnic groups who served in the war are depicted. The expressions on their faces — as they scope the surrounding area for snipers - mirror weariness and resolve.

Next to the American flag is a 30-foot in diameter black granite reflecting pool that pays homage to those who lost their lives and those who are still missing.

The memorial is anchored by a 164-foot-long and 8-inch thick highly polished dark granite wall that features more than 2,500 photographic archival images of all aspects of land, air and sea and support troops who fought the war.

Among the attendees was Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman.






