pervisor to take an active role subordinates' development, evaluating their performance and potential, counseling and advising that individual on professional development, and being a positive role model are the mentor's core responsibilities," said John Mitzel, chief, AETC education and training branch for personnel.

Each individual is just that, an individual," said Mitzel.

"Every person has a different potential level. An AETC mentor will identify top performers and what needs to be done to challenge them. He also needs to be able to identify lesser performers and what needs to be done to make them

as good as the best," said Mitzel.

A member's professional development includes future assignments, promotions and advancements, academic education and personal issues.

A mentor is responsible for counseling and advising subordinates on the next best move to make in the advancement of his career.

"The mentor shouldn't push people for something they are not qualified for or ready to assume," added Mitzel.

The best way a mentor can fulfill his job is by being a positive role model, Mitzel advised.


"How can a supervisor tell

his subordinate to continue his professional military education when he himself hasn't taken full advantage of PME opportunities? Mentors must practice what they preach."


The program, which will be administered at the wing level, is basically a trickle down process, said Mitzel.

a budget dispute between Congress and the administration causes a government shutdown Oct. 1, military and DOD civilian employees will receive their September end-of-month checks on time, DOD Comptroller John J. Hamre said.

Thousands of DOD's 830,000-plus "nonessential" civilian employees will be furloughed if the so-called train wreck occurs, he said.

Pay for the "essential" civilian employees and 1.5 million active duty military personnel who must continue working will be delayed until a budget is signed, Hamre added.

"It all depends on when we get an appropriation from Congress that the president signs into law," he said. "Until we get an appropriation, we'll not be able to write checks. But people will be paid for their duty time-military and civilian. That's not in question."

If a budget isn't passed by Oct. 1, Congress could authokeep the government operat-

"Uniformed service members are not governed by the same rules and regulations as civilians, so uniformed people will not be furloughed," Hamre said. "They'll be expected to show up at work. But in some cases, they may be doing different things. We may need military personnel to help us support some of the nonappropriated funds activities, such as the athletic facili-

"If the government shuts down, there will be large numbers of civilians who must show up for work because they're required for our war-fighting mission," Hamre said. Other civilian employees exempted from furloughs include fire fighters, police, air traffic controllers and medical service personnel, he noted.

They'll be exempted "partly because what they do involves dollars that were appropriated

rize a continuing resolution to in previous years and partly because they're responsible for the safety of lives and property," he said.

We'll have to get permission after the fact to pay them, but there's no doubt in my mind that Congress will give us that authority."

Military and civilian retirees' checks are not affected by a shutdown, Hamre noted.

"Those checks are financed through a trust fund, and we'll have legal authority to continue to pay those checks," he added. "Social Security recipients and other retirees will be paid as usual."

The last government shutdown occurred in 1990 for three days, but only one was a work day-the other two were a weekend, Hamre noted.

"It was treated like a snow emergency in Washington, where we shut down," he said.

"After the fact, Congress gave us the authority to pay everyone, whether they came to work or not that day." Pay time will be decided later. In 1980, the Pentagon oper-

ated without money for 12

Allotment payments are affected, Hamre warned. "We'll not be able to pay an allotment until we have an appropriation that allows us to pay the salary, period," he said.

"We can't make an allotment apart from the appropriation. So it's not possible for us to make a mortgage payment for someone with an allotment if we don't have the authority to make the payroll."

Hamre promised to do everything he can to help those with allotments. "I'll communicate with the banks and ask them to understand the circumstances we're in," he said. "We'll do everything in our power so people are not penalized if a disruption happens."

The Office of the Secretary of Defense, Joint Chiefs of Staff and the services are working on a plan that will identify

vilian employees.

"We won't know who all our nonessential civilians are until we see the details of the plan," Hamre said.

Hamre said he is concerned about the impact a shutdown will have on DOD civilian employees overseas, including school teachers. He emphasized they will be taken care

"Anything that involves the lives and safety of people living overseas will be kept open — commissaries, hospitals, exchanges," he said. "There will be no compromise in anything-in food, medical care, communications—for people overseas."

A shutdown is a serious possibility, Hamre cautioned, but people shouldn't overreact. "Everybody knows this would be an extreme situation," he said. "I don't think this will be a long-term condition because people will understand how serious and disruptive it is."

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



Deliberate Force air strikes continue

AVIANO AIR BASE, Italy (AFNS) — NATO aircraft flying in support of Operation Deliberate Force continue to streak over the Adriatic Sea to deliver their weapons to Bosnian Serb military targets.

The multi-national force has combined to deliver more than 300 tons of ordnance during the operation's nearly 1,200 sorties. U.S. Air Force crews and aircraft account for about 800 of the sorties.

Col. Charles Wald, commander of the 31st Fighter Wing and the 7490th Provisional Wing here, said the NATO operation is the culmination of joint efforts that span the past two years.

"The planning for this operation wasn't conducted in a vacuum and neither is the execution. It's been a team effort across the board — between the U.S. services, between the NATO countries, and between the active-duty and Reserve and Guard forces. The cooperation is absolutely critical to the success of this operation,"

Wald said.

The coalition force began to form here nearly two years ago, under Operation Deny Flight, to enforce the no-fly zone over Bosnia-Herzegovina.

NATO and United Nations leaders shifted the mission to air attacks Aug. 30 when it became apparent the Serbs would not meet their demands to remove military threats from Sarajevo.

NATO Secretary General Willy Claes said the coalition has four main objectives, and they have remained unchanged.

They are to attain:

- ☐ The compliance of the Bosnian Serbs to cease attacks on Sarajevo or other safe areas:
- ☐ The withdrawal of Bosnian Serb heavy weapons from the total
- exclusion zone around Sarajevo;
- ☐ Complete freedom of movement for U.N. forces and personnel and non-government officials;
- ☐ And, unrestricted use of the Sarajevo airport.





The event will be free to Lubbock residents and visitors.




