

## QAFA tests Reese ability to mobilize

The major stressed that participation in the CFC is strictly voluntary and that contributors can select specific agencies or can elect to have their contributions distributed through the general fund to all agencies.


Every contribution goes to the agency designated.

## **Reese JA warns against** government card abuse

A new and widespread problem in the Air Force is the abuse of the government American Express Card.

This card is issued to military personnel for expenses associated with official travel only.

For example, if someone is assigned to go TDY, he or she can get cash advances using this credit card. This replaces the old procedure of going to Travel Pay for an advance.

In addition, the member may use the card to pay for meals, lodging, and other expenses related to official travel. However, it is most emphatically not appropriate to use the card for personal expenses unrelated to

any TDY.

For example, if a member holding an AMEX Card wishes to make some private purchases—say, pay for a meal at a restaurant here in Lubbock or use it for expenses incurred in a family vacation-it is illegal to do it with this credit card.

Such purchases go beyond the intended purpose of the card and, in fact, can be the subject of disciplinary action under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. There have been courts-martial at other bases and we have given out some Article 15 punishments here at Reese for improper use of these credit cards.

Make sure that you only use the cards for expenses associated with official travel. Any other use spells big trouble.


## **Social Actions clarifies article**

Reese will hold its annual Prisoner of War and Missing In Action observance here Wednesday

The local observance begins at 3:30 p.m. with a POW/MIA service at the Reese Chapel.

A retreat ceremony is scheduled at 4 p.m. A T-38 fourship fly by is scheduled for 4:20 p.m. The T-38s will fly the "missing man" formation.

More than 90,000 Americans — most of them from World War II — are still listed as prisoners of war or missing in action since the first world war ended in 1917.

Air Force officials said the remained a POW or MIA folcluded establishing a joint rescue coordination center before hostilities began in the Persian Gulf and working with other defense agencies to rapidly locate and identify downed

More than 2,100 Americans are still unaccounted for in Southeast Asia, including 783 Air Force members. The majority are believed to be in Vietnam or adjacent countries that were under the control of Vietnamese forces during the war.

While the level of cooperation by the Vietnamese government has fluctuated over the last 20 years, joint U.S.-Vietnamese field activities since 1988 have resulted in the

released during Operation recovery of the remains of 314 Americans who were previously unaccounted for, officials said

> The United States has acknowledged Vietnam's increased cooperation in several ways, including, lifting the trade embargo and announcing the normalization of relations. These actions are aimed at achieving the fullest possible accounting of American POWs and MIAs, officials said.

Some 8,100 people are still unaccounted for from the Korean War. Since 1990, Korea has turned over 194 sets of remains which are being analyzed at the Army Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii

To date, only five sets of remains have been identified.

Although the United States had access to World War II battlefields for extensive searches after the war, more than 78,700 Americans remain unaccounted for.

Since 1977, the United States has recovered only 122 sets of remains from crash sites in Europe and the Pacific.



Appell, a transitions assistance specialist at the family support center. "We want to make the transition process as easy as possible for everyone."

The center offers a wide range of programs and workshops to help base people relocate. It carries relocation brochures on Air Force bases, Naval bases and the communities surrounding them.

Also, the center is working closely with the Lubbock community to find jobs for people who want to stay in the local area.

## **JPATS** aircraft slated for Randolph First joint trainers to arrive in early 1999

AFB, Ohio (AFNS) Randolph Air Force Base, Texas, headquarters of the Air Force's Air Education and Training Command, will receive the first production Joint Primary Aircraft Training System in early 1999, according to Air Force officials.

That first delivery will be followed by deliveries to three other, specialized, AETC undergraduate pilot training bases. The three basea are: Laughlin AFB, Texas; Vance AFB, Okla.; and Columbus AFB, Miss.

While delivery schedules are WRIGHT-PATTERSON tentative, depending on when JPATS contracts are signed, the Air Force eventually will receive 372 of 711 aircraft in scheduled production increments.

> U.S. Navy primary training bases are scheduled to begin receiving the other 339 JPATS aircraft in early 2002, with the last delivery in 2017.

JPATS will replace the Air Force's T-37 aircraft and the Navy's T-34C aircraft as the primary aircraft trainer.

It will incorporate several features that are not available on current Air Force and Navy training systems.

Improvements will include missionized ejection seats, improved birdstrike protection and electronic flight instrumentation. Other improvements are digital cockpit display, pressurized cockpit, and flexibility to accommodate a wide range of pilot candidates, both male and female.

The program is managed here by Aeronautical Systems Center's Flight Training System Program Office, directed by Col. John L. Hudson.

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



The event will be free to Lubbock residents and visitors.


