

Air Force changes 7-day option policy

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Air Force has changed its "seven-day option" policy to give lieutenant colonels and below a "say" in when they separate or retire if declining an assignment.

Changes in the non-voluntarily extended active-duty service policy became effective Sept. 29.

The policy, which gives officers seven days to decline an assignment, applies to all actions requiring an additional active-duty service commitment, including formal education and training.

The Air Force changed the policy to improve customer service while still meeting its captain can:

needs. As an example, officials gave this illustration:

Captain Jones has 15 months left on her active-duty service commitment before she can separate. She is selected for an assignment to Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala. Since this is a two-year assignment, Jones would have to extend nine months; but she doesn't want to extend.

Under the previous policy, her only option would have been to request a hardship or miscellaneous discharge. Since the Air Force needs her skills, the request probably would be disapproved.

Under the new policy, the

Request a separation or retirement date equal to her current commitment. Personnel officials will either approve that date or offer an earlier date of separation, based on requirements.

☐ Decline the earlier date of separation and keep her original separation date. However, the Air Force could leave her where she is; send her to an alternate assignment, either in the states or remote: or send her to the original assign-

location with her current separation date.

"People say they understand the new policy and appreciate the change," said Lt. Col. assignment policy team chief.

She said changes to policy do not include "grandfathering" provisions so people selected for an assignment or 3420.

Reese Village residents responsible for pet care

Whether you are a new pet owner or have owned pets since arriving at Reese, there are responsibilities that you, as a resident of the base, should

Local policy states that only three pets under the category of dogs and cats are allowed in base housing.

Exotic pets, such as ferrets, are not allowed to be kept in base housing. All pets residing on base are required to be registered at the

Veterinary Treatment Facility within 30 days of arrival.

Pets must be restrained at all times, either in quarters, on a leash, or under direct control and supervision of a responsible person. Pets are not allowed to run loose on base.

If your pet is picked up by the Security Police while running loose, it will be taken to the Lubbock Animal Shelter.

The owner of the pet will be responsible for all boarding fees and must provide proof of rabies vaccination, or the animal will be vaccinated there at the owner's expense. If you suspect your pet may have been picked up, you should call the Reese Law Enforcement Desk at 3333.

Excessive barking, destruction of property, unprovoked biting of people or other pets, or owners failing to control their pets may result in the pet being barred from the base.

Now that autumn is here and temperatures are getting colder, residents of base housing will be turning on their furnaces.

Remembering this information about carbon monoxide will help everyone have a safe heating season.

Carbon monoxide is a colorless and odorless gas produced by the burning of fuel, in this case natural

Because incomplete burning of gas produces higher amounts of

CO, Reese Housing Maintenance personnel check burner adjustments during annual inspections.

Residents should never adjust furnace burners on their own!

Symptoms of elevated levels of CO in your home may be headache, fatigue, and/or nausea.

CO poisoning leads to more intense symptoms and possibly confusion, unconsciousness, and

As of today, 90 Reese Village units have had CO detctor alarms insyalled and the reaminig units should have the alarms installed within the next few weeks..

> If your CO detector alarms, do not wait until symptoms set in, leave immediately and call 911 from another residence.

If you do not have a CO detector installed yet, and suspect the presence of CO in your home, leave immediately and call 911 from another residence.

If you require an emergency response to your home, responders will check for the presence of CO, and maintenance personnel

will inspect the furnace for malfunc-

If you have questions about furnace servicing, call Reese Housing Maintenance at 3047.

If you have questions or concerns about carbon monoxide, call the 64th Civil Engineer Squadron Bioenvironmental Engineering Flight at 3327.

The 102 Critical Days of Winter

Now is the time to get your yard ready for the cold

Today marks the beginning of the 102 critical days of winter -- for maintaining your yard.

Since Old Man Winter's first "hard" frost is just around the corner, now is the time to begin protecting your yard against winter's damaging effects, while preparing it for a healthy start next spring.

If you haven't already done so, set your mower height to three inches to help protect your lawn against winter temperatures. Applying fertilizer during the next two weeks will provide your lawn critical nutrients for the dormant winter months, getting it started on the right foot next spring.

Your lawn, trees, and shrubs still need watering on

a regular basis. However, after the first hard freeze, cut back on watering to just once or twice a month until spring.

Trim shrubs one final time to keep them looking good through the winter months. If your lawn has a few bare spots, it isn't too late to plant grass. Fescue works best this time of year. Other types of grasses are better suited for the spring season.

The yard inspectors are still out there; so, keep the area around your quarters well-maintained.

You need to rake on a regular basis until all the leaves have fallen, but please don't rake leaves into the street. The Civil Engineer sweepers don't have the capacity to pick up leaves. Bag your leaves and place them near the curb on Monday mornings.

You might need to mow

once or twice during the winter months because winter grasses, weeds, and seed heads will sprout throughout the winter.

One good, final edging around the end of November should carry you through the winter, but keep one eye open just in case you need to edge again.

Strong winter winds mean you'll occasionally need to pick up trash and limbs.

Specific guidelines on maintaining your quarters can be found in the "ABC's of a Happy Home" brochure provided to you by the housing office when you moved on base.

Following the simple guidelines discussed above should keep your lawn healthy, attractive, and prepared for next spring.

Fertilizer, grass seed, and soil are available through the Reese Self Help Store, Airman 1st Class Chris Watson, self help center, stacks bags of potting soil. The center has a variety of yard care items available.

CE will deliver soil on Friday afternoons, but remember to submit your request to the self help store by noon on Thursday for Friday delivery.



64th CONS keeps base running

Working together with other base organizations to benefit the Reese community and meet AETC goals

Who's responsible for ensuring that the buildings are repaired, roads constructed and commodities purchased?

Primarily, civil engineer and contracting personnel working together for the benefit of all Reese Air Force Base people.

The 64th Contracting Squadron is a customer service organization. Last year the office purchased 8,753 items necessary to keep Reese running smoothly. These items included everything from repairing typewriters and roads to maintaining aircraft and providing simulator instruction for the flying mission as well as computer software and hardware.

Contracting teamed up with civil engineer and financial management to award 113 construction

projects for fiscal year 95. Many projects are necessary due to impending base closure.

Contracting personnel are tasked with not only providing the taxpayer the "most bang for the buck," but also for meeting socioeconomic program goals mandated by public law. The Air Education and Training Command goals for contract dollars placed with small, socially and economically disadvantaged businesses were all exceeded.

Another noteworthy accomplishment of contracting personnel was spending 98.6 percent of available dollars on a competitive basis. These programs allow smaller firms to compete with larger firms—a process which keeps everyone "on their toes." Also, the citizens of Lubbock will be pleased to hear that over 5 million, or nearly one-third, of available dollars were spent with local firms. In addition, more than one-third of the dollars were spent in Texas.

With the cooperation and support of the wing, a lot was done for Reese AFB in FY 95. Look for even

better service from the 64th Contracting Squadron in FY 96.




