

This year, the 64th Security Police Squadron has the following events


planned for National Police Week:

☐ Saturday and Sunday: The 64th Security Police Squadron will be the coordinator for the Reese Child Protection Program which will be implemented at a booth during the Reese Air Show from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Child Protection Program is an identification/protection program that provides crucial information to law enforcement personnel to aid in finding lost or stolen children.

The Child Protection Program consists of three steps: (1) child fingerprinting; (2) a kid care identification book which provides emergency identification on a child It's basically a passport for children). (3) and finally, lifesaver shoe tags that attach to a child's shoelaces and provides critical information to responding emergency personnel (they're similar to military dog tags).

Parents can choose an optional fourth step and have their children videotaped. The tape can then be provided to local law enforcement officials for identification of a child in



case the child is missing or abducted. The entire program is provided free of charge, except for the video cassette tape. Parents must provide a blank tape if they want their chil-



Augmentees endure five days of training in basic law enforcement duties before they can assume the responsibility. Fraining consists of M-16 and M-9 weapons handling; arming and use of force; searching and handcuffing; foot, bicycle and vehicle patrolling and other on-the-job training.







Joining the all-star cast of entertainment are the U.S. Army Golden Knights parachute team and Country music star Tracy Byrd.





BRAC expands base closure review

WASHINGTON, D.C.-The Derense Base Closure and Realignment Commission voted Wednesday to add 29 military installations to the list of bases it is reviewing for realignment or closure.

In a hearing in Washington, D.C., the eight-member commission also voted to evaluate for greater realignment or complete closure six bases that were recommended only for realignment by the secretary of

defense when he submitted his list to the commission February 28. "Just because a base was added to the list today doesn't mean U will close or be realigned," said former U.S. Senator Alan J. Dixon, the commission chairman. "It means the commission believes a fuller evaluation of the base is a reasonable thing to undertake at this time.

We do not make additions to the list lightly, but it is the

responsibility of the commission to submit to the president by July 1 the best possible closure and realignment list," Dixon said. The commission's actions affected bases in two overall categories: those that were not on the secretary's February list and those that were. Those that were not on the list were added today "for realignment or closure." Those that were on the list were added "for further realignment or closure." Further realignment means an action that could result in greater job loss at the installation than contemplated by the secretary's list. tween now and June 11, the commissioners will visit bases added to the list Wednesday and conduct regional hearings

regarding the added bases. The commission will begin its final deliberations June 22 in Washington.
