

\$264 billion DOD budget goes to Senate

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Senate Armed Services Committee approved a \$264.7 billion fiscal year 1996 defense budget June 29 that recommends a pay raise, quality of life improvements and reflectsteh Air Force's current plans for no additional B-2 bombers.

The B-2 recommendation runs counter to the House version — approved in mid-May — that recommended \$553 million in fiscal '96 to begin the process of re-establishing essential elements of the B-2 production line to buy additional B-2s.

There is also no provision, as in the House bill, to require

discharging servicemembers who test positive for the AIDS virus or to prohibit military hospitals abroad from performing abortions.

The full Senate will consider the bill later this month and House and Senate negotiators will then work out differences in a joint conference later this summer. It will then be forwarded to the White House for President Clinton's signature.

A statement from SASC chairman Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., indicated he was satisfied that the committee "addressed a number of long-term concerns."

"In this era of decreasing defense spending, it is essential to achieve the appropriate balance of readiness, modernization and quality of life programs," Thurmond's statement read. "I believe our National Defense Authorization Act for fiscal year 1996 accomplishes that goal in a responsible, forward-thinking way." Other specifics of the bill

include: A 2.4 percent raise for

military members and a 5.2 percent increase in basic allowance for quarters effective Jan. 1.

An increase of \$300 million to maintain and repair buildings and facilities to slow a growing \$13 billion backlog of repair work. □ Nearly \$11 billion for military construction and family housing projects that support readiness, quality of life and the welfare of military personnel and their families.

About \$275 million deferred or realigned for new dormitories, modernization or replacement of existing dormitories, various family housing improvements and critical mission facility requirements.

□ Full funding for the F-22 stealth fighter and C-17 airlifter.

Increased funding for a wide range of precision guided munitions and conventional bomber modifications recom-(Continued on Page 4)



Skin cancer affects one-in-six

Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States, affecting one in six individuals. People who are fair-haired and light-skinned have

a one-in-three risk of developing skin cancer.

Fortunately, the tumors are easily seen and therefore may be treated early and successfully. Ninety percent of all skin cancers are caused by exposure to the sun.

Other less common causes of skin cancer include overexposure to x-rays and exposure to certain chemicals such as arsenic, tar, and coal.

Some common types of skin cancers include basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma and malignant melanoma. The occurrence of malignant melanoma is especially common. Note the following "ABCD's" of malignant melanoma:

A=Asymmetry-A mole that is not a mirror image of itself when divided in half.

B=Border irregularity-The edges of the mole are jagged and uneven.

C=Color variation-The mole is composed of several colors, including brown, black, red, blue, or white.

D=Diameter-The mole is larger than five millimeters. In addition, any mole that changes in size, color, shape, elevation, surrounding skin, surface, sensation, or consistency should receive medical attention.

As with all types of cancer, the best treatment is prevention and early detection. Individuals should examine their skin on a regular basis. The total skin surface, including scalp, should be examined closely. The most common areas affected are the face and neck. Sunscreens with a minimum Sun Protection Factor of 15 should always be used. Sun exposure should be limited whenever possible. Most importantly, any suspicious lesions should be examined by a health care professional.

The committee represents Contractor, MFES, Commissary, Defense Finance Agency, Nonappropriated and Appropriated Fund employees and is composed of representatives from management and labor. The committee is chaired by Jerry Stevens, the President of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.

The committee is sponsoring an employee orientation regarding early intervention services the State and JobSource+ can provide to Reese employees.

All employees are encouraged to attend, especially those wishing to obtain private industry employment in the Lubbock area.

JobSource+ will conduct a one hour orientation in the Simler Theater on Wednesday, at 2:30 p.m.; Thursday, at 8:30 a.m.; and Friday at 10 a.m.

The committee's purpose is to help displaced workers make a successful transition to a satisfactory job in the shortest possible time and to serve as a communication liaison between Reese, displaced workers, the community, local service providers and the state.

Committee members can facilitate reemployment by: relaying information to and from the dislocated work force, informing JobSource+ and the state of the workforce's needs and perceptions, interacting with the local community to identify and secure appropriate resources, disseminating information to employers and to encourage hiring of dislo-





Military court reaffirms fraternization policy

WASHINGTON — A military court has "reaffirmed" that Air Force officers who fraternize with enlisted members, even those outside their command or supervisory channels, can be court-martialed.

In a decision handed down against 2nd Lt. Ronnie D. Boyett June 12, the Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces upheld a lower court's decision that Lieutenant Boyett was guilty of conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman for fraternizing with an enlisted woman.

The ruling also limits a 1983 court decision - U.S. vs. Capt. Michael A. Johanns I — that suggested the Air Force could not prosecute an officer for "engaging in mutually voluntary, private, non-deviate sexual intercourse with an enlisted member neither under his command nor supervision" since the Air Force custom had "eroded" over the years.

"In essence, the court of appeals has said the Air Force does have such a custom based

on military history dating back thousands of years, and officers who violate that custom are subject to disciplinary action," said Loren Perlstein, associate chief of the Air Force military justice division, Bolling AFB, D.C.

Lieutenant Boyett originally pleaded guilty to the charges stemming from his sexual relationship with an enlisted person who was not assigned to his organization, Perlstein said. A military judge convicted Lieutenant Boyett for violating Article 133 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice, and sentenced him to dismissal from the service and partial forfeiture of pay and allowances.
