The camp hosted 31 girls July 17-21 and 31 boys from Monday through today from the Lubbock community.


Second Lt. Michele Bly, 64th Flying Training Wing Staff, was the project officer who organized the non-profit camp.

The guest speaker for today's graduation is retired Air Force Brig. Gen. Robin Olds, one of only a handful of aviators to have earned the designation of a "triple ace."


The general shot down 17 enemy aircraft during combat in World War II and the Vietnam War. Thirteen of the "kills" were earned during World War II while piloting P-38 Lightning and P-51 Mustang aircraft. Olds added four more enemy aircraft to the list in Vietnam, shooting down two MIG-17 and two MIG-21 aircraft while flying the F-4 Phantom II.

The son of an Army Air Corps

general, Olds entered the service as a cadet at West Point. earning football All-American honors at tackle in 1942. In addition to his success as a combat pilot, Olds was also a member of the first Army Air Corps jet acrobatic team.

During his career, the general served as a squadron, base and wing commander. he has held staff assignments at the numbered Air Force, Headquarters Air Force and Joint Chiefs of Staff levels. The general served as Commandant of Cadets at the Air Force Academy from 1967 to 1971.

Today's ceremony is open to the base and will be followed by several events in the Reese Club. A buffet is scheduled from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. All Reese personnel are invited to the graduation buffet. There will be a parent's social at 6:30 p.m. and a dinner-dance at 7 (Continued on Page 4)

General Fogleman expresses grief over accident

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -Ronald R. Fogleman announced July 19 he has requested that the Army lead the investigation into the joint training accident July 18 at Fort Sill, Okla., where an Air Force OA-10 aircraft dropped

a 500-pound bomb, acciden-Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. tally killing one Army soldier, and injuring four other soldiers and five Marines.

In his announcement, Fogleman expressed his grief at the death of the soldier and injury to the other soldiers and Marines

in the profession of arms, and my condolences go out to their families and friends.

"It is important," he continued, "that we ensure such accidents are avoided by thoroughly investigating all the surrounding circumstances. Army Chief of Staff Gen. Dennis J. Reimer, Marine Commandant Gen. Charles C. Krulak and I all agree it most

"Such losses touch all of us appropriate that the Army take the lead in this investigation since the Army experienced the loss of a fine soldier.

> "The Air Force, along with the Marines, will provide operational and technical experts as required to determine the cause of the accident.

"We will make all information necessary for the investigation available to the Army. We have learned lessons

from previous joint training accidents, one of which is for all the services to work very closely together to exchange information and uncover all possible causes to avoid future similar accidents.

"Intoday's increasingly joint environment, working more closely together to improve the safety and interoperability of all the services is a top prioritv.'

Army captain killed in OA-10 accident

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. (AFNS) - One military member was killed and nine others wounded July 18 when an Air Force OA-10 fighter aircraft dropped a 500-pound bomb near the West Range of Fort Sill, Okla., striking two highly mobile multi-wheeled vehicles (HUMVEES).

Dead is Army Capt. Christopher Williams of Houston, commander of Battery A, 2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery, at Fort Sill

Four of the wounded — all Marine Corps Reserve members -were treated at the Fort Sill hospital and released. The five still hospitalized were reported to be in good condition. Four are Army members, the fifth of the Marine Corps Reserve.

The aircraft, assigned to the 917th Wing here, was one of two Air Force Reserve OA-10s flying close air support training at the Fort Sill bombing range, officials said.

He has served in a variety of staff and command positions. Prior to attending the Air War College he served as commander of the 61st Airlift Squadron, Little Rock AFB, Ark.

As commander of the 61st AS he directed unit participation in numerous international airlift operations such as Provide Relief, Provide Promise and Southern Watch.

The colonel and his wife, Stacy, have three children, Ryan, Matthew and Megan.

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

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

Wartime test begins for C-17

SCOTT AIR FORCE BASE, Ill. (AFNS) — Twelve C-17 Globemaster IIIs logged 119 hours July 16 during the first 24 hours of a seven-day simulated wartime operation.

A total of 195 flying hours,

more than 16 hours per aircraft, were scheduled for July 17, the first of two consecutive wartime surge days. These days represent an initial surge deployment period, during which a large volume of equipment would be deployed to forward operating bases.

The exercises are part of the Reliability, Maintainability and Availability Evaluation which will give the Air Force a snapshot of future military utility for the nation's newest airlifter.

RM&AE began July 7 with nine days of peacetime operations during which the aircraft flew several peacetime profiles, averaging more than four flying hours per aircraft per day.

During this phase, crews from the 437th and 315th (Reserve Associate) Airlift wings at Charleston AFB, S.C., flew air refueling, short field landing, combat offload, personnel and equipment airdrop, and other proficiency training missions.

Additionally, during the peacetime period, C-17s transported supplies from Charleston AFB, S.C., and Dover AFB, Del., to Royal Air Force Mildenhall, England.

A 14-day return to peacetime operations will follow the

week-long wartime phase ending July 22. The entire evaluation will be completed Aug. 5.

Wartime missions originated from Charleston, with Air Force equipment from Charleston and Army equipment from Fort Bragg and Pope AFB, N.C., transported to RAF Mildenhall; Barstow-Daggett, Calif.; and Bicycle Lake Airfield at the National Training Center, Fort Irwin, Calif.

The wartime phase is designed to simulate a multi-regional scenario, with aircraft future real-world operations.

transporting personnel and equipment great distances to different theaters (both eastbound and westbound) allowing the C-17 to demonstrate its unique strategic capabilities.

RM&AE was designed to compare actual aircraft performance against design requirements and goals. It is also providing additional data to support initial operational testing and to determine how the C-17 fleet will perform in





The Independent Budget for Veterans Affairs reports the VA could save up to \$2 billion a year by providing care more appropriately and efficiently. The savings could be used to reduce the amount of tax money Congress must appropriate to provide veterans with medical care.

What's more, according to the report, with improved procedures, VA could collect at least \$800 million in third-party reimbursements in the near future. These collections could be a steady source of revenue, easing the burden on taxpayers

The veterans groups also call for changes in the law to remove certain inequities and oppose any proposals to means test, tax or elimi-

ing better health care. nate compensation for veterans with service-connected disabilities

According to Senator Bob Dole, Congress should give this proposal careful consideration. It is a non-partisan document crafted by the people who know the system best-the veterans themselves.'




