charitable contributions. Charities are the community's backbone and make our nation a better place to live and work





How to eat healthy when you're away from home

The average American eats almost four meals a week away from home, and many of those are at fast food restaurants.

Many fast food restaurants have nutrition information brochures available upon request, and some even post them in the lobby area. Make some comparisons between the foods offered and make the best choices available. No matter what type of restaurant you choose, selecting a hearthealthy meal is often a challenge.

Here are some healthy tips for eating out:

☐ Call ahead to ask if restaurants honor special requests and prepare food to order. Many restaurants are more than willing to do this, since they want your business. Some restaurant chain will bake or broil anything that is advertised as fried on their menu.

☐ Order dishes that are steamed, garden fresh, broiled, roasted or poached.

☐ Some low-fat, low-cholesterol preparations are high in sodium. If sodium is a concern, watch for foods that are pickled, in cocktail sauce, smoked, in broth, or in a tomato base.

☐ You can eat bread and breadsticks, but resist high-fat spreads.

☐ Limit portions of meat,

fish or poultry to four to six ounces. Take home leftovers for another meal.


☐ Steak is not off limits if you order it broiled without additional fat or salt. Remember to limit your consumption to four to six ounces. Choose lean cuts like London Broil, filet mignon, round and flank steaks.

☐ You don't have to skip dessert. Have fruit, fruit ices, sherbets, gelatin, or angel food cake.

☐ Be wary of nondairy coffee creamers, which frequently contain highly saturated ingredients like coconut oil. Ask for skim or low-fat milk instead.

☐ If you opt for fast food, look for salad bars where you can make your own meals. Be sure to use low fat dressing. Another choice is a regular (two ounce) hamburger on a bun with lettuce, tomato and onion.

Cadets visit Reese for Operation Air Force

Operation Air Force is a decades-old program designed to introduce cadets to the "real Air Force," according to Capt. Jeff Yevcak, Operation Air Force project officer for Reese.

This week, cadets learned about the 64th Flying Training Wing through a mission brief and got hands-on exposure to operations of the 64th Security Police Squadron, 64th Medical Group and the legal office. They will get a taste of the aircraft maintenance world on Monday when they visit Lockheed Martin Logistics Management's area.

Air Force is Air Force specialty code specific — meaning that the cadet works in the office or area of the AFSC they will have when commissioned. The cadet is to do more than just observe what goes on, but take an active role.

Also during their stay, cadets will take simulator rides and train through the aerospace physiological unit to prepare for T-38 and T-1A orientation rides.

"Both the academy and ROTC want the cadets to see and do as much as possible," said Yevcak. "They want the cadets to be treated like commissioned officers."

Two other groups of cadets will visit Reese June 24 to July 12 and July 15 to August 2.

"Operation Air Force is a great opportunity for these cadets to see what the world's greatest Air Force is all about," said Yevcak. "And while at Reese, they'll get to see how the entire base supports its mission of training the world's

Scroggins leads as wing IG

Lt. Col. Jerry Scroggins assumed the duties of the 64th Flying Training Wing Inspector General here May 30.

Scroggins replaces Lt. Col. John Shackelford who retired and will become a Federal Express pilot.

A native of Torrance, Calif., Scroggins attended Point Loma Nazarene College, San Diego, graduating with a bachelor's degree in biology in 1976. After graduation and commissioning through Air Force Reserve Officer's Training Corps, he entered active duty as a minuteman missile launch officer at Ellsworth Air Force Base, S.D. While at Ellsworth, he served as an instructor and standardization/ evaluation combat crew mem-

Scroggins entered Under-

graduate Pilot Training at Reese and received his wings in January 1982. He stayed at Reese as a first assignment instructor pilot flying the T-37 with the 35th Flying Training Squadron. He also served as a flight commander and section commander.

In April 1985, the colonel was transferred to Headquarters Air Training Command (now Air Education and Training Command) Operational Plans, where he worked the acquisition of the T-46 simulator. He also assumed responsibility as the command focal point for all simulator issues.

Scroggins' next assignment was a part of HQ ATC Stan/ Eval team responsible for T-37 Supervisor of Flying and Runway Supervisory Unit programs for the command. Then it was off to HQ Air Force Personnel Center in August 1988 where he ran the T-37 assignments section and later was chief, trainer assignments branch, responsible for all ATC and outside the com-

In 1989, Scroggins earned a master's degree in business administration from Webster University.

Returning to Reese, the colonel has held a variety of positions. He was operations officer for the 35th FTS, operations officer and interim commander of the 52nd Flying Training Squadron. In August 1993, Scroggins was appointed as 64th FTW Deputy Operations Group commander and a year later as the 64th Operations Support Squadron com-

Scroggins is a senior pilot with more than 2,000 flying

He is married to the former Linda Brown of Concord, Calif. They have two sons, David and Jeff.

AF to get another operational B-2

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Under Secretary of the Air Force Rudy de Leon signed a letter of transmittal to Northrop Grumman Corporation May 24 to upgrade the B-2 flight test vehicle AV-1 to operational status.

This follows the recent decision by the Air Force to upgrade AV-1 to an operational aircraft, bringing the operational B-2 fleet to 21 aircraft.

The upgrade includes replacing the landing gear, a new avionics suite and modifications to the aircraft structure, fuel system and weapons bay doors.

The B-2 Spirit is the Air Force's low-observable bomber capable of delivering both conventional and nuclear munitions. Its "stealth" characteristics give it the unique ability to penetrate most air defenses. These stealth characteristics, combined with its long range and large payload, provide a powerful force projection capability.

Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman, Air Force chief of staff, said the B-2, with the addition of a precision conventional weapons capability this summer, "will cause us to completely rethink the way we plan attacks — instead of the number of sorties required to take out one target, our planners will decide the number of targets to take out on one pass."

The letter of transmittal obligates \$150 million with a notto-exceed value of \$493 million. This is a firm fixed price letter contract with an expected contract completion date of June 2000.

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

As of May 21, Reese Hospital is no longer required to issue non availability statements.

In the past it was necessary for the beneficiary to obtain a NAS from Reese Hospital for all non-emergency inpatient care and certain outpatient procedures. Care that was received prior to the deletion of Reese from the catchment area directory will still require the issuance of a NAS.

To obtain a retroactive NAS, the beneficiary needs to bring the explanation of benefits or any other written documentation stating that a NAS is needed when requesting a NAS application.

It will take time for the civilian providers to be fully briefed that a NAS is no longer required. Any difficulties experienced by beneficiaries during this transition will be handled on a case-by-case basis.



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
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
