Mentoring becomes reality in AETC

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas — Mentoring is no longer a concept but a reality within Air Education and Training Command, according to the command's new mentor program manager.

Since its announcement a little more than three months ago, the AETC Mentor program, conceptualized by AETC Commander Gen. Billy Boles, has broken new ground. In that

time, a new command policy directive was published and program guidelines were furnished to command bases. Contacts were also established at the wing, base and command levels and a crossflow function activated to provide information, ideas and success stories to the command, according to Terry D. Stevens, mentor program manager.

Reese officials said the wing

supplement to the command policy will also be distributed to units soon.

Senior enlisted advisors throughout the command have taken an active role to improve the program for enlisted members.

AETC Senior Enlisted Advisor Chief Master Sgt. Annette Barber is an avid supporter of the program. "All AETC SEAs are on board with

this plan," said Barber.

"Everyone has potential and can be developed to perform at their maximum level," she said. "People need encouragement, praise to build confidence, and sincere concern from their supervisors. This program provides the opportunity for all supervisors—enlisted, officer, and civilian — to take on a more active leadership role. We develop one another; that's


what a team does."

The directive outlines supervisors' responsibilities and actions under the program. "Mentoring in AETC means every supervisor — military and civilian — is designated a mentor," said Stevens. "As such, they're responsible for their subordinates personal and professional development. We view every supervisor as a





Seat belts help save Reese woman, child

Recently, my daughter and grandson were involved in a car accident. They escaped relatively injury-free, due in great part to wearing seat belts and use of an excellent child safety seat.

This is a recap of what happened:

Connie (my daughter) was driving west on Erskine Road, moving toward Reese about 5:30 p.m. on a Saturday. A Suburban was coming the opposite way. Connie moved to the right of the narrow road to insure there was plenty of room for both of them. Her right wheels moved off into the dirt shoulder. She (over)corrected back onto the highway, when another oncoming vehicle approached. She moved back

to the right of the road, lost control of the car, went into the ditch and became airborne.

The car (Toyota Tercel) flipped three times and came to rest right-side-up in a cotton field. The roof was caved in, the back window

came out intact, the front windshield was shattered. At first sight, it seemed doubtful anyone could come out of it without serious injuries.

Connie was trapped between the steering wheel and the driver's door, which was jammed. Rescue crews

from Reese, Carlisle Volunteer Fire Dept, Lubbock and the Texas state troopers took off the roof, but still couldn't get her out. They had to use the "jaws of life" to remove the driver's door and get her to an ambulance.

Miraculously, Connie "only" suffered a lot of bruises and several cracked ribs. Painful as that was, had she not been wearing her seat belt, she almost certainly would have been thrown from the vehicle, or as a minimum into the windshield. Use your imagination to describe the possible injuries she may have suffered.

My grandson Anthony was covered from head to toe with dirt, but otherwise was without a scratch. His car seat was completely intact and budged not one inch throughout the accident. We

contacted the manufacturer (Evenflo) to thank them for making such a great product. They were not only grateful for Anthony's safety, but said they would send us a brand new car seat if we would send them the old one. They told us they study car seats that have been through accidents.

There are two distinct lessons to be learned from this story. The first is to always buckle up and insure your children are secure in safety-approved car seats.

The second is to watch your speed, especially on roads like Erskine that have no dividing line and are narrow. While it's good road courtesy to give oncoming vehicles adequate space to pass, be extra careful to stay on the pavement, or you too could become airborne and potentially a traffic fatality.

In observance of National Dental Health Month, the Reese Dental clinic will sponsor two major events.

A booth will be set-up between the base exchange and commissary on Feb. 24. Information on the Tricare Family Member Dental Plan (the replacement of Delta Dental Plan) will be available, as well as dental products for the kids, balloons and short dental presentations.

Additionally, Reese Elementary and the Reese Child Development Center will each receive a presentation, including a dental movie. The children will participate in a coloring contest and prizes will be awarded to each class.

Being enrolled in and using a dental plan promotes

dental health and helps prevent future problems. Many services are fully covered including checkups and cleanings. The government pays most of the premium.

Enrolled dependents can make appointments with any enrolled civilian dentist they choose — no waiting for space available care. Since Concordia Dental will replace Delta Dental (Thursday), the list of dentists participating in Lubbock with this new program is small, but should grow. If your family is enrolled and presently seeing a dentist, check to see they are participating with the new dental health plan or else encourage them to do so.

Remember that keeping your children's teeth healthy now can provide them with a lifetime of smiles and good habits.

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Secretary Perry cites performance of C-17

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary William Perry says he's "enormously impressed" with the operational performance of the Air Force's C-17 Globemaster III, in NATO's Operation Joint Endeavor.

"It not only performs as advertised, but in this operation, the first big operation that it is

involved in, the principal characteristic it has turns out to be crucial, which is, being able to go in on a limited runway" such as Tuzla, Perry said afterward.

In addition to being capable of carrying bulkier items than C-141s, the C-17 can haul up to 80 tons of cargo, twice that

of a C-141, according to Air Mobility Command officials at Scott AFB, Ill.

Through Jan. 17, 361 C-17 missions had delivered 9,109 tons of cargo in support of Operation Joint Endeavor, AMC officials said.

"People thought in terms of short landing strips," Perry said.

"That's not the issue; it's the handling facilities at airports that really limits their ability to operate. And the C-17 goes into Tuzla, unloads ... turns around and comes out again; it can turn itself around on a small taxi strip," he said.

Earlier this month, Perry was flown on a C-17 from Aviano Air Base, Italy, to Tazsar AB, Hungary. From there, he was flown to Budapest. Perry was also flown into two locations in Bosnia — Sarajevo and Tuzla.

In Tuzla, where tons and tons of supplies and equipment have been delivered by Air Force airlifters, Perry saw the crucial role the C-17 plays in supporting the peacekeeping effort.


"You can have a couple of (C-17s) in there at once, whereas (with) the C-5, you'd be limited. If you had a C-5 there, you'd have the whole airport tied up."

He said the "consequence of all this" in Tuzla — where 20 to 30 aircraft daily are landing and unloading their cargo — is that the C-17 has "really proven its worth in the specific feature for which it was de-

signed."

On Jan. 7, Perry gave his personal assessment of the air operation in Bosnia to airmen assigned to Joint Task Force-Southwest Asia in support of Operation Southern Watch and singled out the C-17 for plaudits.

"Thank God for the C-17," he said. "It came on board just in time. And the ability of that airplane ... is just incredible."

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


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Reese finds slots for 26 casual students

Placement saves thousands in PCS costs

Twenty-six officers who had been serving the wing in a variety of support positions, were successfully placed in Joint Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 97-02 and 97-04, according to 64th Operations Group officials.

The placements ensured that all of those officers who had been in casual status here would be able to enter pilot training at Reese.

"Each of these officers had been slated to attend pilot training, but due to a shortage of training slots, had been performing different jobs around the

base until their official Joint Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training start date," said Col. Bruce Burda, 64th OG commander.

Casual students were assigned to numerous units, including: the 64th Security Police Squadron, the 64th OG Intelligence Flight, the Reese Legal Office, the Reese Quality Office, and the 64th Civil Engineer Squadron.

The probability of placing all of the casual students into training here became cloudy when training timetable was announced for Reese closure. The majority of casual students had been

projected to enter training after the start date for Reese's last class.

"Through the intensive efforts of Maj. Bob Edington and Capt. Steve Jaszai of the 35th Flying Training Squadron a plan was developed to make available enough training quotas in the final two Reese JSUPT classes for all remaining casual students," added Burda.

Representatives from the Air Force Personnel Center assisted in diverting some inbound students to other bases to free up additional training slots.

Through unprecedented command

coordination, all 26 casual students at Reese were able to complete the Flight Screening Program at Hondo, Texas, in time to start class here.

Nineteen casual students entered JSUPT Class 97-02 in November and seven more began training this week in JSUPT Class 97-04.

"The successful placement of 100 percent of the casual students saved thousands of dollars by avoiding additional permanent change of station expenses and reflected a continued commitment to the people of Reese," said Burda.

Innkeeper team visits

Winner to be announced in March

The Air Force Innkeeper Award team visited the base Monday and Tuesday to judge the lodging facilities.

Reese was selected to represent Air Education and Training Command in the small base category.

The team uses an innkeeper checklist to evaluate.

"There is a possible 1,300 points a base can achieve," said Chief Master Sgt. Jeffrey Richard, Air Force Service Agency.

Points are divided into several categories: direct guest impacts such as housekeeping, indirect guest impacts such as condition of the facilities and other management functions such as logistics and training.

The Air Force bases Reese is competing against are Dyess Air Force Base, Texas; Malstrom AFB, Mont.; McConnell AFB, Kan.; Dobbins AFB, Ga.; Kelly AFB, Texas and Misawa AB, Japan.

The winners of the award should be announced by mid-March.

Retiree 1099-R Forms to be mailed by Wednesday

Department of Defense military retirees and annuitants can expect their 1099-R forms for tax year 1995 to be mailed no later than Wednesday, according to Reese finance officials.

Former spouses who are in receipt of pay from DFAS-CL due to a court-ordered division of community property will also be receiving 1099-Rs. They will be sent to the home address on file with Defense Finance and Accounting Service.

The 1099-R form used has three copies of the information on one sheet of paper with explanations of the information on the back of the recipient's

copy. The IRS is the source for further clarifications.

Placement of boxes and the information contained is per IRS and DFAS headquarters guidelines. For example, box 1 (gross distribution) does not contain gross income, but is the total amount received - or the taxable amount - as shown in box 2a. For retirees, it does not include nontaxable income such as Survivor Benefit Plan cost, explained finance officials.

Because the 1099-R is also used to report other types of income, some of the boxes do not apply to retired pay and annuities. This is why boxes 2b

and 9 will be blank, and boxes 3, 5, 6 and 8 have been eliminated on these forms. The remaining boxes have their original IRS numbers, and so, will correspond to IRS instructions for 1040 and 1040A forms.

Retirees won't get a 1099-R if their pay is based on a disability with no withholding of any kind.

Retirees or annuitants who need to update their home address in DFAS records; or, who don't get their 1099-Rs by February 15, 1996; or, who have other questions about their 1099-R forms should call, write or fax:

and professional life," said Stevens. "Your mentor is prepared to give you their strongest support if you're doing your dead level best."

According to Stevens, a successful mentor gets to know their subordinates' personal

and professional strengths and weaknesses.

"They work to eliminate weaknesses and challenge strengths. In doing so, professional competence and the subordinate's potential grows," he said.

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

With 3:09 left in the game, Allen hit a base-line jumper to put the NL ahead by one, 61-59.



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
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
