Wednesday, 26th.—Sped forward, freely, by the liberal attention of Mr. Lockhart, of our good steamship line, we left Texas, per Texas, about the hour when the substantial citizens of Galveston were going to market, with visions of beefsteak and onions floating savorously before them.

We watched the land city until the Episcopal Church marched up to the Catholic, became a part of the same, and marched forth again upon the other side, appearing more independent than before.

The city looked like a large fittilla, bearing eastward, with spring aboard and winter in tow—the naked masts in the bay resembling a winter forest, and the residences beyond all nestling in foliage of the deepest green.

Friday morning, 27th.—Off on the N. O., J. & G. N. E. B. the polite Superintendent, Mr. T. S. Williams, having declined us over the same. It does not take long to discover the gentleman—or the reverse—even under the angular rapidities of a railroad agent.
