Arrival of the Steamship Arabia. The steamship Arabia arrived at Halifax on the 28th ult., bringing Liverpool papers of the 9th, having made the trip in nine days.

Liverpool, May 19.—The sales for the week ending Friday evening, May 18, in the Liverpool Cotton market, add up 48,000 bales; of this amount 2,500 bales were taken on speculation and 10,000 bales for export.

The sales of Friday amounted to 6,000 bales, of which speculators and exporters each took 1,000 bales.

The amount of cotton now in port of Liverpool adds up 1,111,000 bales. Of this quantity cotton 905,000 bales are said to be of American production.

The expedition of General Garibaldi in Sicily was attracting much of the public attention throughout the Continent.

General Garibaldi, at the head of an army, all of about 10,000 men, had landed at Marsala, a city situated in the northwestern part of the island of Sicily.

Directly opposite Marsala, two frigates of war, belonging to the Government of Naples, attacked Garibaldi's vessels on the 10th inst., and one of the frigates sunk and the other was captured by the Neapolitans.

After the loss of his vessels, Garibaldi at the head of his army marched into Sicily, and was making good progress.

Some said he had already captured some of the most important cities in Sicily, except Palermo, and that he was moving on the latter.

Great agitation prevails both in Naples and in Palermo on account of the great insurrectionary movements on the island and the triumphant march of Garibaldi.

Advices received from Constantinople state that the Government of Russia was acting against Turkey in the interest of the Christians.

Russian troops are concentrating along the borders of the Pruth, and a revolution is considered imminent.

The decision regarding the great prize fight for the World's Championship, between John G. Heenan and Sayers, has finally been decided.

The editor of Bell's Life, the referee, has decided that the two champions should each be presented with a belt, and they have agreed to it.

FRENCH TARIFF.—The following is that portion of the new decree which regulates the duty on cotton, cotton fabrics and wool.

The import duty on cotton and wool imported into France in French shipping is abolished, that imported in foreign shipping is to pay a duty of 100 kilograms.

The premiums at present granted on the exportation of cotton and woolen threads and yarns are abolished. They will, however, continue to be paid for two months from the date of the bill.

For three months on the exportation of cotton threads, for four months on the exportation of combed wool, and for five months on the exportation of milled woolen cloth. The bill is to take effect from the 7th of May.

Arrival of the Steamship City of Baltimore. CAPT. RACE, June 2.—The City of Baltimore left the port of Liverpool on Wednesday, 23d ult., at noon, bound for Cork, having on board 1,000 tons of mail and passengers, and bringing four days later intelligence than was received at Halifax by the Arabia.

Liverpool, May 23.—The sales for the past three days ending Tuesday, May 22, in the Liverpool cotton market add up 19,000 bales. Of this amount speculators and exporters each took 4,000 bales.

The market closed generally very dull. The good qualities of cotton closed firm, but the quotations of the lower grades are only nominal.

Gen. Garibaldi and his expedition to the island of Sicily excites much of the public attention, and all sorts of rumors are flying about regarding his movements.

At the last accounts he had made his way unopposed to Palermo, and contemplated a successful attack upon the city, which it was thought would be given up to him.

WAR WITH CHINA. The latest advices received from Peking state that the Government of China had positively refused the ultimatum of France and England. War, therefore, as the last resort, has been determined on.

DOMESTIC SUMMARY. Mr. Worth, who was recently imprisoned (in South Carolina, we believe) for circulating incendiary publications, is now lecturing in the Northern cities, and taking up collections, taking special pains to "make the churches contribute" to his cause.

In noticing the fact, the Philadelphia Christian Observer (Presbyterian) remarks, "It would be a mistake to receive 'rebels' in an humble spirit, instead of administering it—violating the laws of the State which give him full liberty and protection in preaching and teaching every doctrine and precept of the New Testament. If Mr. W. speaks of rebel slaves as the brethren would at our camp, it is right to think God that there are more converts to righteousness among them, than are reported from all the missionary stations occupied by American missionaries in all the pagan nations of the earth."

PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS. Washington, June 2.—Among the adopted amendments of the House of Representatives, is one providing for the military appropriation for the erection of an arsenal on Red River, for the support of a mounted regiment of Texas volunteers.

The appropriation to be made for the construction of this arsenal is \$788,000.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—The War Department has received information from the commander at Albany in various parts of the Territories, that the Indians had again commenced their depredations upon the frontier, and that they were to be met without delay.

On receipt of this information, the War Department sent a telegram direct to the commander at Camp Floyd, directing absolute protection for emigrants, mails and the Pony Express, from Great Salt Lake City to California.

The message in the message reads: "The United States troops will commence to move towards the country of the Indians."

WASHINGTON, June 2.—The Japanese Embassy have decided not to leave Washington until the Government provides for their speedy return to Japan.

They are to visit Baltimore on the 5th, Philadelphia on the 7th, New York on the 10th inst., Albany on the 13th, and return to the 15th inst.

On their arrival in New York, which is to be on the 20th, it is supposed they will remain in the city a week or two.

The steam frigate Niagara is at present in the Brooklyn yard undergoing repairs, and will not be ready to leave for Europe until the 15th inst.

THE MEXICAN TREATY KILLED. Washington, May 31.—The Mexican treaty negotiated by Mr. McLane was taken up by the Senate in executive session, and finally disposed of. The Democratic Senators refused to accept the amendments proposed by Mr. Simmons, of Rhode Island, and authorized by the Mexican Government. The treaty is now killed for good, nor will it be brought up again in any shape.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The Washington special correspondent of the Herald says: "The treaty has been completely routed by the Liberal forces. The Liberal party were in full possession of the City of Mexico."

The correspondent states that authentic dispatches received by the State Department say that the Liberal party of Mexico have taken the city of Mexico for the ratification of the McLane-Ocampo treaty.

These dispatches promise such success to the Liberal victories as will end the long pending struggle in that unfortunate country.

BUFFALO, May 30.—The Methodist Episcopal Conference has refused to change the rule in discipline on slavery, by ten votes short of two-thirds of the whole number of delegates.

ANOTHER SLAVEY CAUGHT.—The telegraph reports that another slave ship has been captured off the coast of Africa by the United States steamer Cutter, Lieut. Maffei, and that the slaves, four hundred and fifty in number, have been sent to Key West.

This is the third arrival of the sort at Key West within a few days, and makes the total number of Africans there, main-ained at the expense of Uncle Sam, over fifteen hundred.

THE PRINCE IS JUVENILE.—It is stated that the Prince of Wales, now on a visit to Washington, has a son for whom he wishes a naval education, and he desires he might have the privilege of one year's study at the Naval Academy at Annapolis, to be subjected there to all the rules of the institution.

RICHMOND, Va., June 2.—Judge Daniels, of the U. S. Supreme Court, died at his residence in this city on the 21st ult.

At Washington it is generally thought that the vacancy occasioned by his death will be filled by Judge Johnson, of the Virginia Court of Appeals.

THE EX-PRÉSIDENT.—On the day last week, we read that three of the ex-presidents of the United States were in New York city, Messrs. Van Buren, Fillmore and Pierce—and all of them in excellent health. Mr. Van Buren is aged 79, Mr. Fillmore 60, and Gen. Pierce 59.

LETTER FROM CALIFORNIA. St. Louis, June 2.—The central overland Pony Express, with the missing California mails and dispatches from the previous express, has arrived safely at St. Joseph.

It brings intelligence of a bloody fight which took place near Bend Tuckee river, on the 12th ult., between a body of Indians and the U. S. troops.

Major Ormsby, at the head of 150 volunteers, left Virginia City, pursuing the Indians supposed to have murdered the Americans while asleep at Miller's Station, Carson river.

On the 12th ult., the volunteers reached Bend Tuckee, and there met 500 Indians, who had just arrived, well provided with ammunition.

The Indians opened fire upon our troops, who being short of ammunition, &c., suffered heavily. The Indians were killed on the spot, and the remainder chased for a distance of thirty miles.

Major Ormsby and Mr. Henry Meredith, a distinguished hunter, were among the slain. The whole number of men known to have been killed is 21, the wounded 3, fat unknown 43, returned to camp.
