H. J. R. No. 6 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 5, Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until

their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and upon the qualifications of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate.

"Article V, Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, from mandamus or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.

The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as it may or may hereafter be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court" and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words print-

ed on said ballot: Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from return of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay for the expenses of said publication and election. Approved February 19, 1929. (A Correct Copy).

They have a fine flock of hens and are trying to make a living at home. Mr. White has a cream separator and had an incubator hatching when we called.

R. T. McGuire.

Yes, R. T. McGuire is a good farmer living on the Abbott farm. He is making good at his chosen profession. He was one of a party who visited the Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth during its progress. Mrs. McGuire is interested in raising the Plymouth Rock Chickens. She has a flock of 52 selected hens and has 150 baby chicks. She recently sold \$81.00 worth of chickens and they are milking one good cow and have some cream to sell each week. Eggs and cream pays the grocery bill Mrs. McGuire stated.

George Shuman.

We find that George Shuman living on the Abbott farm has his ground ready to plant the 1929 crop. He has a fine season in the ground, but is waiting for warmer days to put the seed in the ground. He was not at home when we called but Mrs. Shuman said that they were getting along fine. She is starting out to raise some chickens. She has a good cow and is selling some butter each week. Mr. and Mrs. Shuman are young people who have just started out in life and they are happy and contented.

C. H. King.

We stopped at a home where a man was bending over a wash tub and putting out a washing. This proved to be C. H. King one of our habitual readers of the Free Press. Mrs. King was not very well and Charlie put out the washing. But he stated that it might be a good time for some agent to sell a washing machine if he had to do

many washings. He is a good farmer and has his ground ready to plant. He has sixty White Leghorn hens which he says have already paid him one dollar each in eggs since last fall and are still on the job in egg production. He is milking two good cows. 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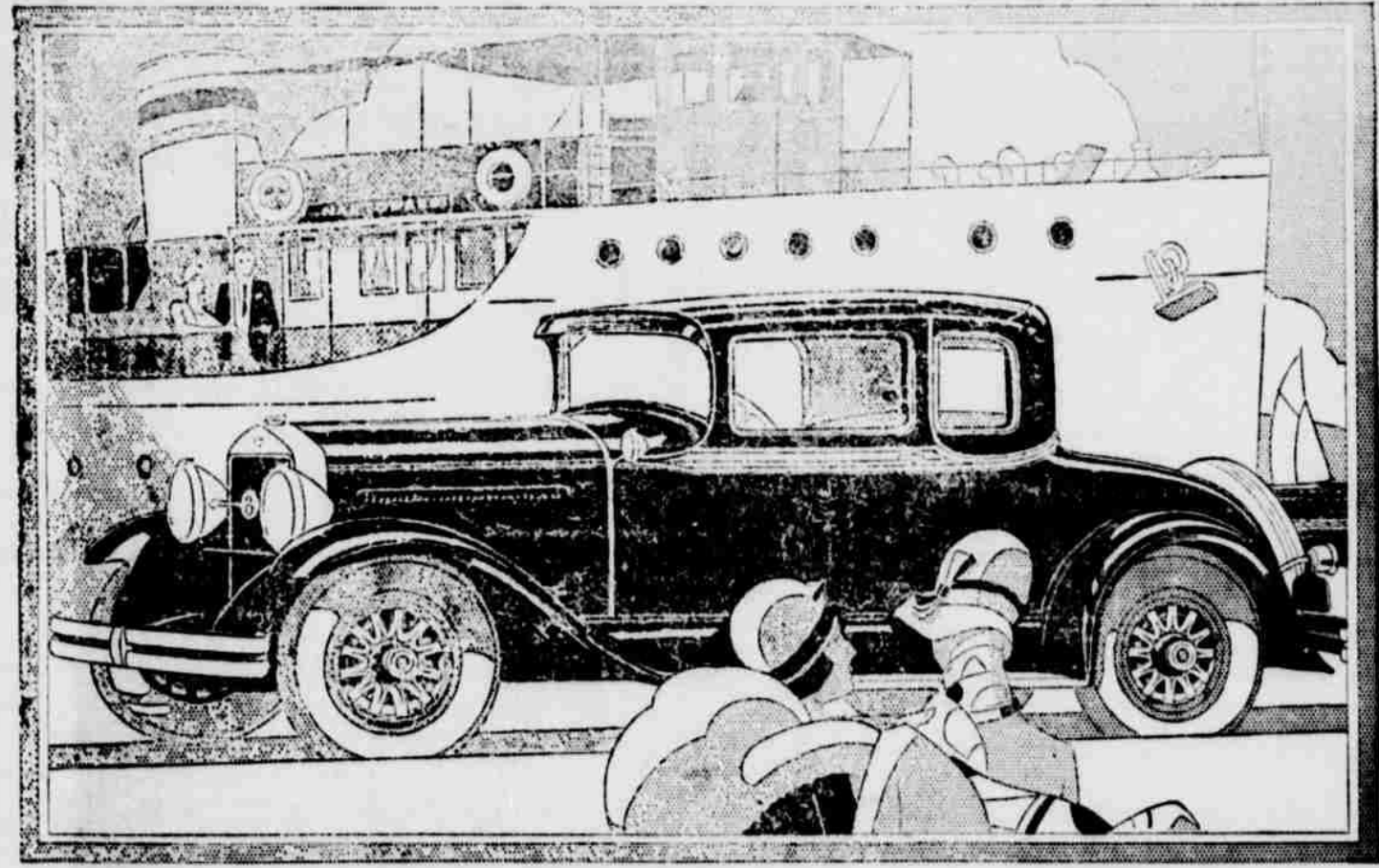

Harley Brown. Living on a fine farm with a good home and pleasant surroundings we find Harley Brown a young farmer who could not be other than happy and contented. He and his family had gone to the plains so his neighbors told us as we passed that way.

C. H. White. Living on what is known as the old Martin place we found C. H. White who was very busy with his farm work. He is a good farmer and was getting his land in fine condition for planting. He believes in diversifying and Mrs. White said they are selling three dollars worth of cream each week from two cows besides what the family uses in milk and butter. They have a fine flock of hens and are trying to make a living at home. Mr. White has a cream separator and had an incubator hatching when we called.

R. T. McGuire. Yes, R. T. McGuire is a good farmer living on the Abbott farm. He is making good at his chosen profession. He was one of a party who visited the Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth during its progress. Mrs. McGuire is interested in raising the Plymouth Rock Chickens. She has a flock of 52 selected hens and has 150 baby chicks. She recently sold \$81.00 worth of chickens and they are milking one good cow and have some cream to sell each week. Eggs and cream pays the grocery bill Mrs. McGuire stated.

George Shuman. We find that George Shuman living on the Abbott farm has his ground ready to plant the 1929 crop. He has a fine season in the ground, but is waiting for warmer days to put the seed in the ground. He was not at home when we called but Mrs. Shuman said that they were getting along fine. She is starting out to raise some chickens. She has a good cow and is selling some butter each week. Mr. and Mrs. Shuman are young people who have just started out in life and they are happy and contented.

C. H. King. We stopped at a home where a man was bending over a wash tub and putting out a washing. This proved to be C. H. King one of our habitual readers of the Free Press. 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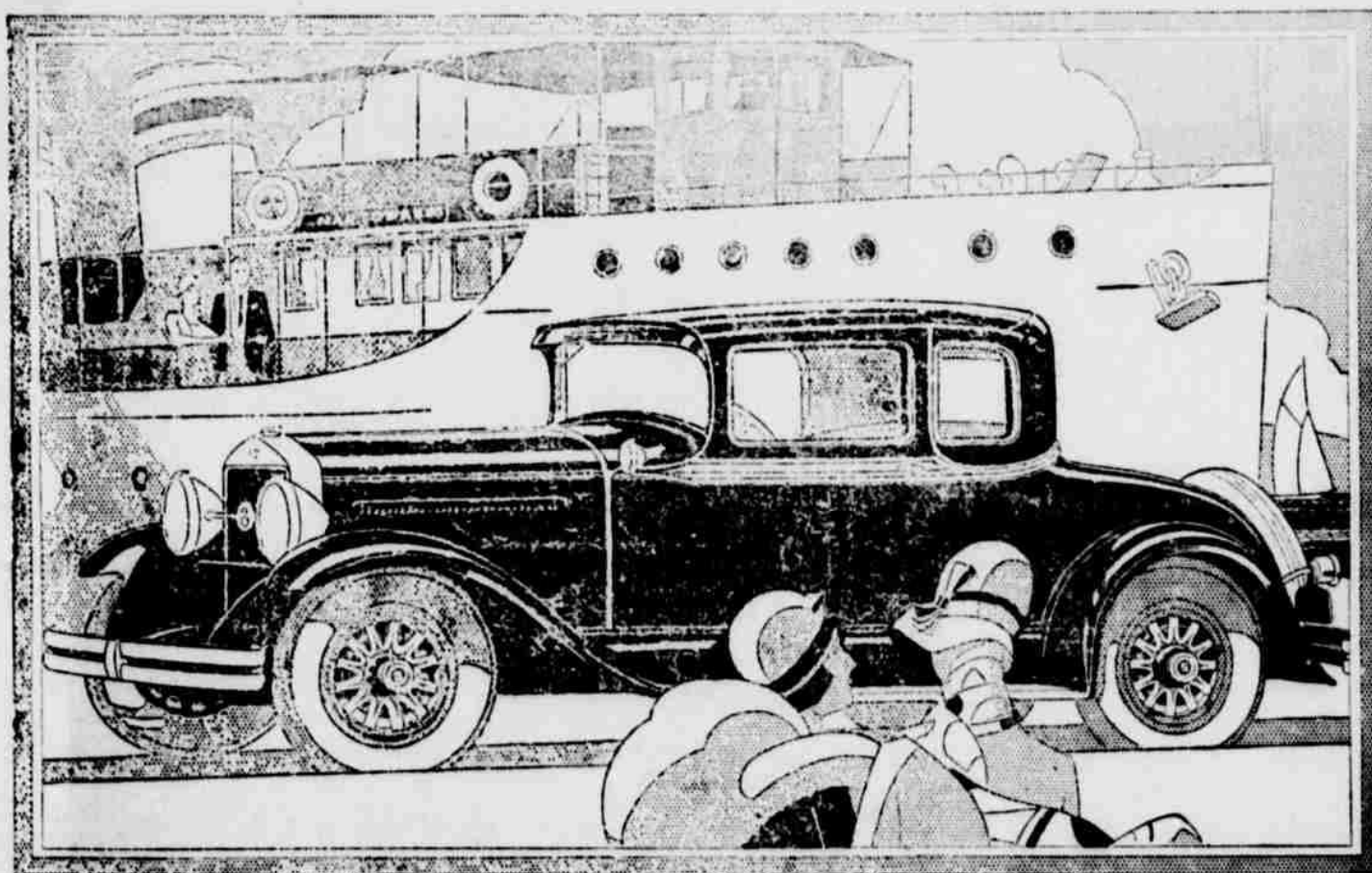

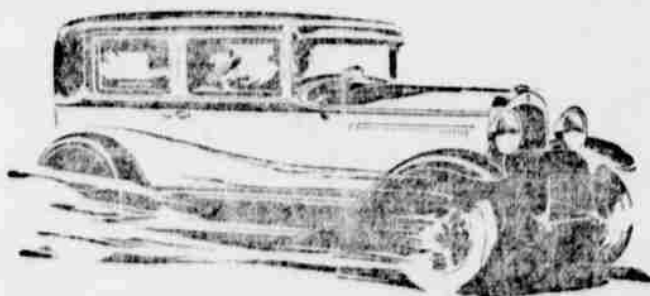

When Mr. Oates reached Brady on this trip the bank had been robbed about 30 minutes before his arrival and the town was in a stir. He was enlarging his hog pasture when we called at this farm and had the hog wire almost up around five acres of ground. He has at this time 10 head of hogs. success in this county when the ground is selected for its planting. He expects to plant half his land in feed and half in cotton this year. He does not practice the one crop system, for he has cows, hogs, and chickens. Mrs. Gam-mill has 150 laying hens and 200 baby chicks which are doing nicely. She bought the highest priced White Lechorns she could find and they no doubt will prove to be wonderful layers when they grow up. Mr. Gam-mill reads the Free Press each week. He keeps posted on all the news of the county.



FRITTS TAKEN TO FT WORTH JAIL

Fritts, under sentence of death for the fatal shooting of Hamilton, 17, Haskell county, last fall, was taken to the county jail at Fort Worth today for safekeeping pending his trial for the slaying of Hamilton. Dudley W. Hamilton, the man who was taken to Fort Worth by Sheriff W. T. Sarrells and Sheriff Clarence Lewellen.
