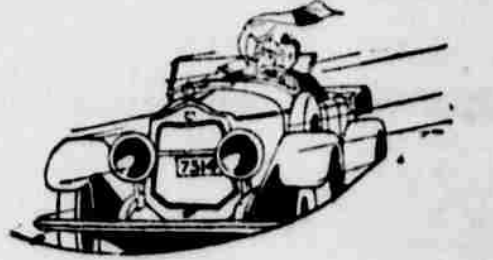

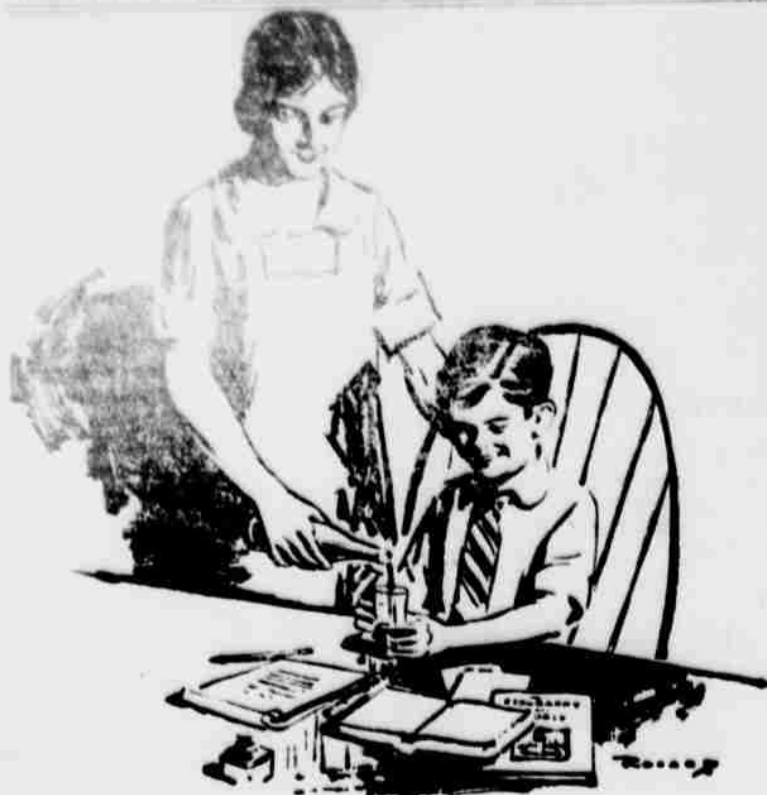

MEMBERSHIP CONTRACT FOR COTTON GROWER

The old Farm Bureau Cotton Contract revamped into the new Cotton Cooperative Association and a new membership contract which puts co-operation on a voluntary rather than compulsory basis was announced today that it was announced today that the new campaign for enrollment in the cooperative program will begin the first of June.

Williams, cotton member of Farm Board, will come from Abilene to assist in opening the campaign, with addresses at Abilene, Waco and Corpus Christi. The Board cotton member was due to his original schedule, and the dates will put him at Abilene to address the West Texas Cotton Growers' Association at its annual meeting at 10 o'clock Friday, May 24, at Waco, and at Corpus Christi at 10 o'clock Saturday, June 1, and for similar meetings at Waco at 10 o'clock Monday, June 2, and at Corpus Christi at 10 o'clock Tuesday, June 3.

On the unanimous request of the members, the organization of the A. & M. Extension and of delegations of business and farmers from a score of cotton centers, directors of cooperative associations, last changed their contract to the new plan. In the past, members of the Texas organization have been required to contract for delivery of cotton grown, and through the association, the contract allows them to back every other bale for sale in an open market, delivering one out of each two to the association. After delivery of ten more cotton need be delivered to the association, but may be by the owner on the open market if he so desires.

The liberalized contract is only one of the new features in the T. A. program, as worked out under supervision of Farm Board representatives. The state is being divided into at least seven districts, and will be given a great deal of local control as possible this year, and will become independent in as practical, each to be a self-governing member of the American Cotton Cooperative Association, with the A. C. C. A. at all cotton sales. Branches will be established in each of the seventy-five towns and having already applied for licenses, indicating their willingness to underwrite the expense of having them and of obtaining membership quota. Receiving agents will be placed at smaller centers, the whole program being decentralized membership which will allow members to handle their sales and information problems directly with local agents, rather than at long range through one state office, as now.

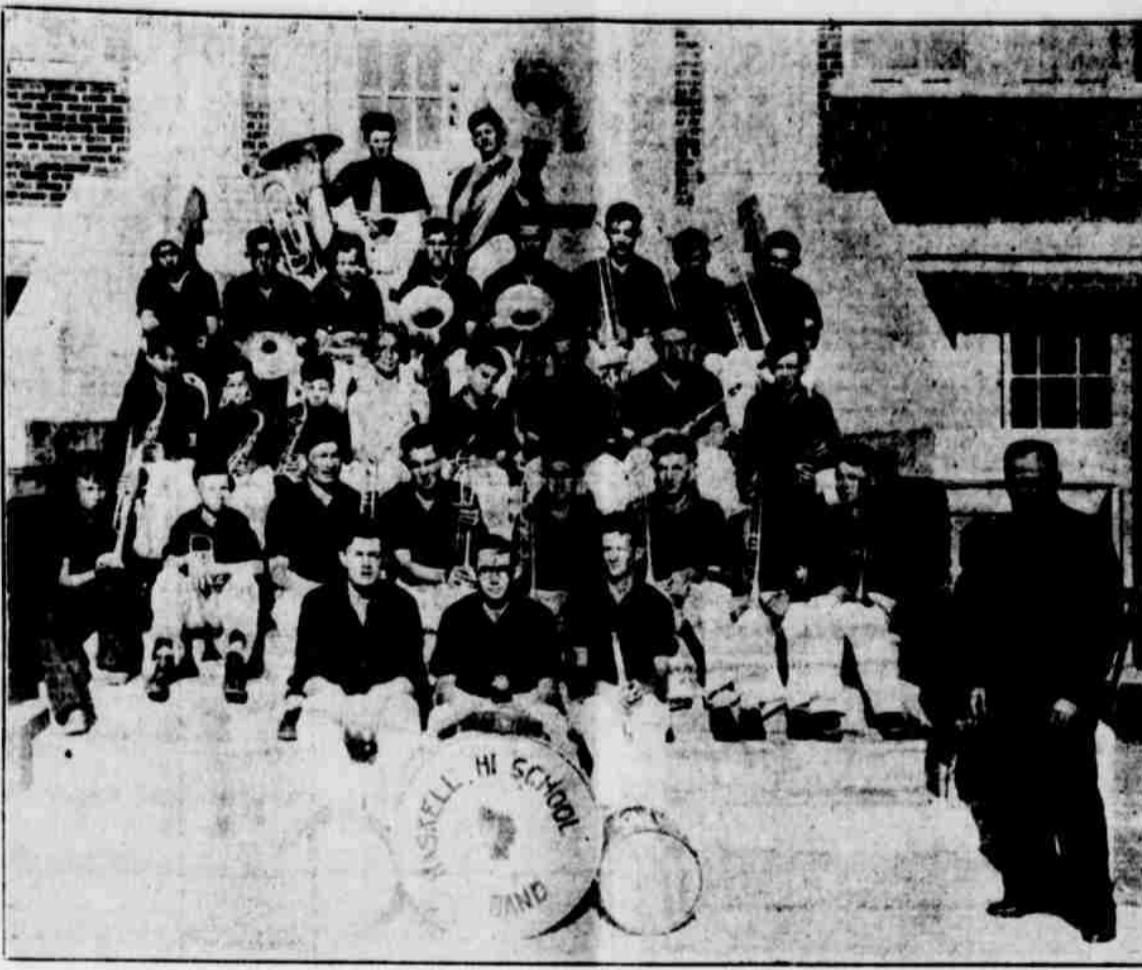

Notes of Interest To The Farmers of This Section

(By Joe C. Williams)

Terraces, High, Wide and Handsome

Asperment—The value of high and well built terraces was demonstrated on the Wade Davis farm, Stonewall County, during the recent rain in which 7.82 inches rain fell in 32 hours. Investigation revealed that water had spilled out at the ends of the terraces but at no place did it break over the tops. The terraces were built high and wide in 1926 as a demonstration of level terracing, and Mr. Davis has improved them each year since. The ends were partly closed last season to permit more water to be absorbed.

Landlord Tenant Livestock Lease

Grosbeck—Two thirds feed, one third cotton, and livestock on a 30-50 basis are the high points in a lease system as worked out by Dan Parker of Limestone County and now in operation with his renters. They jointly own 80 hens, 675 baby chicks and three milk cows, but will increase the cows after the feed is grown. All feed produced will be fed on the place and two separate sets of books will be kept on each field and class of livestock to furnish a guide for future operations. Three other local landlords have agreed to conduct similar demonstrations with their renters. The movement was inaugurated by bankers and is in co-operation with the county agent.

Grasshoppers Menace State

There are some indications that the grasshopper may become a serious pest in 1930, according to R. R. Reppert, Extension Service Entomologist of A. & M. College. Reports have been received that they are present in alarming numbers in the counties of Bexar, Kendall, Fayette, Navarro and McCollough. Following the recent rains over the state, it is possible that heavy damage to cultivated crops may develop, especially in the north, central, and western parts of the state.

It is not known how extensively eggs were deposited last fall, Mr. Reppert says. Conditions have been favorable for hatching eggs the present month. Should we have a dry season during the month of June, the insects may be forced to leave the fence rows and pastures to attack cotton and corn. The situation is one that should be carefully watched.

Poison bran mash is very effective in grasshopper control, and is made with the following formula: Coarse Wheat Bran, 25 pounds; Paris Green or white arsenic, 1 pound; high grade amyl acetate (avoid cheap grades of banana oil or bronzing liquids), 10 oz.; cane or sorghum molasses (avoid corn syrup) 2 quarts; and enough water to make thoroughly moist but not sloppy. This quantity will cover five acres.

FRITTS TRIAL AT EASTLAND SET FOR TODAY

The trial of Bill Fritts, charged with the murder of Earle Hamilton near Rochester in October, 1928, was scheduled for today in Eastland, and a score of witnesses from Haskell and Rochester have been subpoenaed for the trial. The law firm of Murchison & Davis of this city is handling the defense, and District Attorney Clyde Grissom is also in attendance upon the trial and will likely aid in the prosecution of the case.

D. W. Hamilton, prominent farmer, was slain with his son, Earle Hamilton, near Rochester in Oct. 1928, and Fritts has been under indictment for the double slaying since that time. He was tried and given the death penalty for the slaying of the boy in District Court at Anson in March of last year. The case was sent back by the appellate court, and at the beginning of the April term of District Court here a change of venue was granted by District Judge Bruce W. Bryant, the case in which Fritts is charged with the murder of Earle Hamilton being sent to Eastland, while the case against him for the murder of the elder Hamilton was transferred to Fisher County. Trial of the latter case at Roby has been set for June 2nd by Judge W. R. Chapman of the 104th District Court.

BLANTON ELECTED CONGRESSMAN OF 17TH DISTRICT

Thomas L. Blanton of Abilene was elected Congressman of the 17th congressional district, defeating his opponent Mrs. R. Q. Lee of Cisco, who was a candidate for the unexpired term of her husband, the late Col. R. Q. Lee.

Late vote tabulations from over the district, although incomplete, gave Blanton a lead of 1,891 votes over his opponent, and Mrs. Lee Wednesday conceded defeat, saying that returns yet to be received would not materially alter the present standing of the candidates. Wednesday night's returns from 19 counties in the district showed a total of 15,981 votes, 8,996 for Blanton and 7,045 for Mrs. Lee.
