The Indian Troubles.

A dispatch from Gen. Howard, which reached San Francisco the Stn. says he found the Indians on the head of Button. The Indians were strongly posted on a rocky crest. One company was left with the pack train; and others deployed and advanced handsomely, under a heavy fire. The enemy were driven from their position to another height in the rear of a greater elevation and crowned with a natural defense of lava beds. In twenty a inutes this position was also stormed from quiferent sides at once, and a rapid In twelfy is indices this position was also stormed from different sides at once, and a rapid pursuit commenced of the fleeling Indians, who abandoned their norses, provisions, ammunition and camp materials. The hostiles made for the thick timber crowning Blue ridge, where they made another stand, but were again dislodged and pushed four or five miles into the moun-

made another stand, but were again dislodged and pushed four or five miles into the mountains. The country was rough, and the great exhaustion of men and horses caused the cessation of the pursuit for the day. In the engagement five culisted men were wounded and about twenty horses killed. It is impossible to state the loss of the enemy. Their women, children and best horses were moved before the fight began apparently in the direction of Grande Roude, and the hostiles fied in that direction.

A dispatch from silver City of the 9th indicates that the Indians in that region were having it all their own way. The Indians are monarche of all they survey. The area of territory now infested by them embraces some 4000 square miles, combining all the natural facilities for a prolonged war. There are hardly 850 people in Canon City, and less than 100 of the male adult population are armed. The main street of the town is within easy rifle range of surrounding eminences, which afford numerous advantages for an attacking party, and the whole village is completely at the mercy of the savages, were they disposed to sack it. The terror-stricken inhabitants have taken refuge for several days in a huge tunnel, built for mining purposes, which affords the only safe retreat in the place.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—A Walla-Walla dispatch relating to Miles' fight with the hostiles at the Umatilla reservation, says the troops numbered about 300 regulars, and the fight occurred patch relating to Miles' fight with the hostiles at the Umatilla reservation, says the troops numbered about 30° regulars, and the fight occurred about 8° clock in the morning, within a short distance of Cayuse station. The savages were between 40° and 50° strong. Getting his men into position Miles opened fire, and the hostiles returned it, without effect, neither side sustaining any injury. This continued without intermission until 12:14, when the Indians attempted to charge Miles' line, but were driven off, being unable to stand the fire from the howitzers. In the charge the Indians sustained considerable loss—those present estimating the dead at fifteen. Miles' casualties consist of two wounded, one in the arm and one in the leg. Shortly after 1 o'clock the Indians fell back toward the mountains.

New York, July 15.—A special to the Times from H. Thompson, Dakota, reports the discovery of most extensive frauds at the Indian agencies in that section. Such robberles are unheard of on the Missouri river. Last week the Crow-Creek, Lower, Brule and Cheyenne agencies were all seized by the military. A secret investigation into their affairs developed a conspiracy between the agents and traders that startles the natives. Dr. Livingston, of the Crow-Creek, was taken without warning, and his office safe captured before he had time to remove the evidences of his wealth and guilt. Testinaons is still piling up against the ring, and Livingston in particular. It beats all former developments for thieving, perjury and forgery. The details show that they stole everything in sight, and prostituted the whole agency's machinery to their private use.

Foreign.

There was intense excitement in Montreal. Canada, last week, between the Orangemen and Catholics. The Orangemen proposed to march in procession on the 12th, the anniversary of the Battle of Boyne, and the Catholics were determined to attack the procession. Under pressure from the Catholic population a bill is before the Provincial Legislature prohibiting street processions. The Mayor issued a proclamation forbidding the procession, and organized a strong police to arrest all who were in the procession. At a late hour it was decided by the Orangemen not to march. This bitterness between the decendants of the followers of James II and the Prince of Orange, who met in bloody battle on the banks of the Boyne nearly 200 years ago, is no blessing to the presentage.

The Eastern Question.

The Congress held its last sitting in Berlin July 13th. All the plenipotentiaries and other members were present in full dress at the opening of the Congress; proceedings commenced at 2:30 and ended at 4 o'clock. The treaty was signed by the plenips tentiaries alphabetically. The secretaries attended previously, at 1 o'clock, to affix the plenipotentiaries' seal to each copt. After the signatures, Andrassy warmly eulogized Bismarck's presidency. Bismarck thanked the plenipotentiaries for their indulgence. The proceedings terminated with a grand court dinner at the White Hall palace.

We give our readers the substance of the articles of the treaty as far as they have been published:

1. Bulgaria is constituted an automatic tribu-

1. Bulgaria is constituted an automatic tributary principaltly under the "spzerainty" of the Sultan, with a Christian government and na ional militia.

2. The principality is limited on the south by

the Balkans.

3. The Prince shall be elected by the population and confirmed by the Porte and the powers. No member of a reigning European dynasty shall be Prince. When there is a vacancy the new prince shall be elected under the same con-

ditions.

4. The plan of the government will be prepared by an assembly of nobles to be convoked at Tiernova before the election of a Prince. Turks, Roumanians, Greeks and others will be taken account of in whatever relates to the election of

account of in whatever relates to the election of the government.

5. The basis of the public laws of Bulgaria will be the distinctions of the religious beliefs not to exclude any one from political rights, public employment or business enterprise.

6. Until the permanent organization of Bul-garia is affected it shall be governed by a pro-vincial organization directed by Russian Com-missioners, assited by the delegated consuls of the powers.

7. The organic government is to be settled within nine months.

8. Treaties of commerce between the Porte and other powers regarding Bulgaria will remain unchanged.

9. The tribute to the Porte shall be settled by

9. The tribute to the Porte shall be settled by the signatory powers at the end of the first year of the new organization, Bulgaria bearing a portion of the public debt of the empire.

10. The principality carries out existing railway conventions between Austro-Hungary, Servia and the Porte.

11. The Ottoman army evacuates Bulgaria; all fortresses to be destroyed within a year, and new ones not to be erected.

12. Mussulmans who removed from the principality can retain their property by allowing it to be administered by third parties.

13. There is formed south of the Balkans the province of Eastern Roumelia, under the Sultan, having administrative autonomy and a Christian governor general.

The additional articles provide that the Porte, having expressed willingness to maintain the principle of religious liberty and give it the widest sphere, the contracting parties take cognizance of this spontaneous declaration. In every part of the empire differences of religion should not be the motive of unfitness in anything relating to the civil and political rights, admission to public offices, duties and honors, and exercise of all professions and industries. Everyone should be admitted without distinction of religion to give evidence before the tribunals. The practice of all religions should be entirely free. No impediment should be offered to the hierarchical organization of different communions or their spiritual chiefs. Ecclesiastics, pilgrims and monks of all nationalities, traveling in Europe and Asiatic Turkey shall enjoy the same privilezes.

The terms of the treaty signed by the Congress and the Anglo Turkish treaty, which secures to Great Britain the island of Cyprus, is a triumph on the part of England. The path of Russia toward the East is blocked up for a time at least. England by her relations with Turkey will be able to guard against encroachments from the great Northern power, which not only threaten the destruction of Turkey, but which menace the Eastern possessions of Great Britain. Had England seized the Dardanelles, the jealousy of all the European powers would have been excited: to have occupied the extremities of the Suez Canal would have disturbed her relations with France. By occupying Cyprus she can command with her navy the Eastern waters of the Mediterranean and stand guard on the path which leads Russia to her Eastern empire.

The English Government is busy with the details of military and civil establishments in the island of Cyprus. The appointment of a Postmaster and other officials for the government of the island is announced. Sir Garnet Woolsley has already under consideration a scheme of a financial company for introducing railways on the island. Arrangements are being made for laying a new submarine cable to Alexandria, which will give direct communication with England.

Among the schemes brought to the surface by the English occupation is that of the Euphrates Valley railway. The Duke of Sutherland and others are in active communication with the Government on the subject, and it is stated that if within a reasonable time it appears that the Anglo-Turkish convention is successful, it is possible the country will be asked to give a guarantee for the proposed railway.





Death touched her kindly, and like an infant falling asleep, her gentle spirit passed away. A few moments before she breathed her last, her calm and collected countenance assumed a gaze of holy surprise as if something was being revealed to her. Twas but for a few moments, when it faded into a beautiful scraphic smile of recognition, which death left upon her countenance to greet us with in the better world. So striking and sublime was this manifestation of a heavenly vision, that all who surrounded her bed were struck with solemn awe and astonishment. To the bereaved and broken-hearted husband and children the loss is irremediable, yet for them there is a balm in Gilead. 
