The Torpedo and the Electric Ecl.

One of the subjects announced for discussion at the Autumnal International Congress of the Medical Sciences, in Geneva, is the physical character of the electric discharge of the fishes known as torpedoes, which belong to the order of rays, and are widely distributed. Their electrical apparatus, which is described as analogous to the galvanic pile, is placed in two masses, on each side of the skull. 




