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JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 21.—At five o'clock this morning the caisson surrounding the deep well leading to the entrance to the Hudson river tunnel, in course of construction at the foot of sixteenth street in this city, caved in, carrying with it an immense quantity of earth.

SEVEN were soon after taken out alive; the remainder are underneath. The water from the river flows rapidly, and steam fire engines were set to work to it, possibly, save those who might still be alive from drowning.

THE NIGHT GANG of thirty men, including assistant superintendent Woodward and two firemen, entered the shaft at midnight, the hours of work for this gang being from 12 to 8 o'clock.

THE DEPTH of the shaft is sixty-five feet, and the most of it is made of 25 to 25. Briggs, liberal member for Blackburn, moved that the erection of a statue to the late Prince Louis Napoleon in Westminster Abbey, is inconsistent with the national character.
