It yearly takes 200,900 acres of forests to supply cross-ties for the railroads of the United States. It takes 15,000,000 ties to supply the demand on our railroads, for which on an average the contractors get thirty-five cents apiece making in the aggregate \$5,250,000. It building a new road the contractors figure on 2,700 ties to the mile, while it takes 300 ties to the mile to keep a constructed road in repair. Contractors of course, buy pieces of timber-land as near to the proposed line of road as possible, paying for the timber an average of about \$20 per acre, or giving the proprietor of the land ten cents for every tie got out. The average of a good piece of timber-land is 200 ties to he acre and twelve ties to the tree.
