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

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

The Editorial Perplexity.

Your embarrassment relative to the editorial prerogative and church schools as set forth in your issue of September 11, has a cause. To set it forth will call attention to some important facts in that connection and possibly suggest

a solution of your difficulty.

The policy of the Methodist Church in this country relative to education has never been declared. The relation of the schools to the church has never been set forth. The definition of church school has never been authoritatively given. As a result of these facts, the measure of ministerial and editorial obligations has never been established.

Early in the history of Methodism in England a system of church schools from primary instruction to advanced education was definitely established. The church systematically administers and controls this department of church effort, and has extended it to all its missions. These schools are an integral portion of church machinery and their operations are reported with the annual rendering of the results of school matters as they do in the Sunday-schools, missions or any other department of Methodist toil.

Nothing of the kind has been at-tempted by Methodism in the United States. It is a remarkable fact that the future historian of Methodism will search our printed minutes throughour official records covering more than a century-and search in vain any allusion or information whatever relative to church schools, He will read through volumes of our general conference journals with the same result. Much has been said, a good attempted, considerable accomplished in reference to education by our church, but no system has been attempted, not to say established.

The results need not be stated at any length; they are apparent to all. Not a member of the Methodist church in this country if asked "What is meant by a church school?" could answer the inquiry to his satisfaction. Education under church auspices has been the result largely of individual enterprise, strengthened here and there by church action, consequently we have had aims claiming church support and church editorial endorsement, and to that extent claiming to be church schools. This claim sometimes has rested in the church membership of the teacher where no property was involved: sometimes simply the property has been held by members of our church, they selecting the teacher and controlling the operations of the school; sometimes the property has possible with all our toil.



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

DEEP LAKES,-In Baikal (Siberia), soundings have been obtained which, for a lake, are truly astonishing. In the upper part the depth is 3027 metres about the height of Mount Etna), but downward the bottom constantly deseends, and near the opposite end, a distance of some 350 miles, the depth amounts to 3766 metres. The measurement far exceeds anything to be found in the Mediterranean Sea, which in its deepest part has only 2197 metres of water. How such an extraordinary lepression as that of Baikal could have occurred in the midst of a continent is a problem which greatly puzzles geologsts, but the generally accepted idea is that it was the result of some volcanic eruption in past ages, and a sabsequent subsidence of the crust of the earth to a vast extent. The lakes in the centre of New Zealand are equally remarkable in point of depth. The extreme depth of the Taupo and Waikari Lakes in the North, and Lake Wakatipu in the South, have never been fathomed. They are known to be very far below the sea-


