RUMORS START LOCAL POLITICAL POT TO BOILING

Several Avowed Candidates Already Out For Various Offices, With Rumors Enlarging Number.

The political pot has begun to boil and if present rumors materialize there will be a hot time in Haskell County's political circles in 1935. The man or woman with a brand new poll tax receipt after the first of the year will be an important citizen in his or her community.

The majority, at least, of the present county officials will be candidates for re-election.

County Judge Joe A. Jones has not signified his intention regarding re-election, but will probably issue a statement in the near future.

County Clerk, Jason W. Smith will be a candidate for re-election and will probably make his formal announcement at an early date.

Tax Collector E. F. Fouts will ask for another term to succeed himself, and will make his formal announcement in January.

Tax Assessor Mike B. Watson will be a candidate for re-election.

Sheriff W. T. Sarrels will ask for re-election and will make his formal announcement at the proper time.

J. E. Walling, the present County Treasurer will be a candidate to succeed himself.

Miss Lois Earnest, District Clerk will ask for re-election and will make her formal announcement after the first of the year.

County Attorney, P. M. Robertson will be in politics in the coming campaign. Some of his friends have been soliciting him to make the race for District Attorney and if he does not ask for re-election he may be a candidate for the higher office.

Hon. Dennis E. Ratliff, representative from this district in the State Legislature will probably ask for a second term.

It is believed that all the members of the present Commissioners Court will ask for re-election. The Court is composed of the following members:

J. F. Simmons, Commissioner Precinct No. 3.

O. L. (Jim) Darden, Commissioner Precinct No. 4.

Chas. M. Conner, former Tax Collector, will probably make the race for County Judge according to some of his close friends.

Mayor Estory Menefee, has been prominently mentioned as a prospective candidate for the County Judgeship.

B. C. Chapman will be in the race for County Attorney according to consistent rumors in political circles. He is now serving as City Attorney of Haskell.

Roy Ratliff is mentioned as a possible candidate for the office of District Clerk.

G. F. Mullins is being strongly solicited by his friends to make the race for Commissioner of Precinct No. 1. Mr. Mullins will make his announcement in the near future.

Funeral services for Mr. Jesse Collins, age 71 years were held at the Weinert Baptist Church, Monday, Dec. 21, at 3:30 p. m. The services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. T. J. Duff, with interment following in the Weinert Cemetery in charge of the local I.O.O.F. Lodge, of which he was a member. Funeral arrangements were in charge of R. G. Campbell, undertaker of Munday.

Deceased was born at Fayetteville, Ark. March 25, 1863. He came to Texas when just a child, and was married to Miss Sarah Catherine Isam at Eddy, Texas, Sept. 1, 1881. There were eleven children born to this union, all still living except one girl who died in infancy.

Mr. Collins had been a resident of Haskell county for many years, and his death which occurred Sunday morning, Dec. 20, after a lingering illness of about eight months, brought sorrow to the hearts of a host of friends and loved ones. He was converted fifty years ago, and lived a clean and honorable life. He had been a member of the I.O.O.F. for more than twenty-five years.

NO PENALTIES ON DELINQUENT TAXES IF PAID BY JAN. 31

The following information was handed us by Tax Collector E. F. Fouts. The Tax Relief Act passed by the last Legislature known as H. B. No. 80 has been declared constitutional by the Supreme Court, the Act releasing all interest and penalties on all State and County taxes from 1885 up to and including the year 1930, providing same is paid by February 1st, 1932. After Feb. 1st, 1932 this law will not be effective. This will be quite a saving to the tax payers of Haskell county if they can avail themselves of this opportunity.
