A New York telegram of May 2says: The Southern states are actual ly entering the field at last in competition for a share of the vast immigration which is now pouring into the country.
Mr. Lang, president of the Southwestern Immigration society, will go to Europe on Saturday to establish emigration societies in Liverpool, London, tle. The states are offering to settle the incomers free of charge in salubrious locations; to assist the farmers among them in taking up homesteads and in getting a start, and to see that all the artisans are provided with work. Some of these Southern people, as for instance the board of immigration of South Carolina, are finding out that it is not absolutely necessary to estab-

ing up their affairs, preparatory to migrating with their capital to England.

A good many immigrants come here, as the Castle Garden authorities say, "on speculation." They have no definite plans or destination in view, but cross the ocean simply in the hope of finding plenty of work somewhere, and of bettering their condition. This class of incomers are easily influenced by the local board of commission to go anywhere where the prospects seem good. From the information received at Castle Garden, it is evident that most of the Southern states intend to make systematic and vigorous efforts to attract to their part of this country a fair share of the incomers. Their agents represent that no part of the land presents better inducements; that the farmers can get all the land they want, and that there is plenty of work for all classes of skilled labor; that the immigration boards will lend a helping hand until the new citizens are settled and doing well, and that they will be heartily welcomed by the inhabitants of the
