The de uand for jute bagging is gradually increasing in the United States. The greater part of our supply comes from India. During the past year about 57,000 bales of this article were received at our custom-houses. Their total value will reach \$1,140,000, and the freight, from India, about \$200,000 more. The cultivation of this fibre in the South would save the country nearly \$1,500,000 that now is annually spent in its purchase abroad.
