DR. BUCKLEY AND SOUTHERN METHODISM

After waiting a long time Dr. Buckley of the New York Advocate gives his version of his speech before the mission board of his church.

The question before the Mission Board is stated by Dr. Buckley: "A layman asked whether we should be at work in the South, side by side with a Methodist in all respects identical with our own."

Dr. Buckley, in reply, thus attempts to justify the policy pursued by his church in seeking to occupy the South at the close of the war.

"That we ought to have gone South at the close of the war, in view of the fact that a large number of our free-born citizens had settled in the South."

"On the other hand, it must be confessed that some of our churches in the South are certainly a disgrace, but they are the best we can make with the materials we can get."

We will not question this testimony of Dr. Buckley respecting the disgrace some of its churches in the South has brought on Northern Methodism.
