#### PROTECT BANK DEPOSITS

The prime function of government is to protect the life, the liberty and the possessions of its citizens. In this country a man's life is reasonably safe, his liberty is assured without question so long as he complies with the laws and his tangible property is protected with a considerable degree of success, but in one respect we have failed badly. Although we have made laws by the score, we have never been able to give assurance to the man who puts his money in the bank that he is going to be able to get it out again. In fact millions of our citizens have recently lost billions of dollars in savings, because our banking system has failed to do the most essential thing it should do-protect its demositors

With a view to remedying this defect in the banking system the Steagall bill to guarantee all deposits in Federal Reserve member banks has been passed by the House

It provides for Federal Reserve member banks a guarantee fund of 517 million dollars without a Treasury appropriation

This fund would be created out of \$167,000,000 in franchise taxes paid by banks of the Reserve System: \$150,000,000 from surpluses now in the hands of the banks, and an assessment of \$200,000,000

This fund would be administered by a board to be composed of the Secretary of the Treasury, the Comptroller of the Currency, and three members appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. Authority to liquidate closed banks and pay off depositors in full at any time after a bank is closed would be delegated to this board.

Upon payment of an assessment of double the amount required of member banks of the Reserve System, state banks not members of the Federal Reserve system would be permitted to contribute to, and participate in the guarantee fund provided by the Steagall bill.

By the seactment into law of the Stragall bell, Congress will provide better protection for all depositors in banks which are members of the Foderal Reserve system and encourage all state banks to become members of the Federal Reserve system.


#### TRAGEDY OF DESPAIR AND PRIDE
