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

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

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

10 Years Ago March 24, 2005

Venus Holmes of Littlefield, who has a place at Lakeshore Sites on Lake Stamford, caught a recordbreaking 8.5 pound bigmouth bass using only a small piece of bologna for bait. Joyce Qualls from Lake Stamford confirmed it was Haskell Indian standout, the largest big-mouth bass ever caught at Stamford





February is typically a time of year that wheat growers are more concerned with topdressing nitrogen and controlling weeds than controlling diseases; however, this topic has been on the minds of many growers in recent weeks. It is not uncommon to see small amounts of leaf rust in the fall, particularly on early planted wheat for grazing, however, rust presence generally declines throughout the winter months for most of the state as freezing temperatures will often subdue the disease. The exception being South Texas where rust consistently overwinters. Typically, it is this overwintering rust in South Texas that then migrate northward with warming temperatures during the spring.

In the past month there have numerous reports of both stripe rust and leaf rust throughout Texas will be set for high rust applications (growth stage Feekes 5-7) on winter wheat yield, but in most cases it uneconomical and has little impact on yield. Get Ready for a Fight: Glyphosate Resistant Waterhemp and Palmer Amaranth are Here!

You've all seen the horror stories about glyphosate (Roundup) resistant pigweed infestations in the Southeastern United States. Texas farmers largely dodged the bullet until 2005, when reports of resistance started to trickle in. Texas A&M AgriLife Extension and Research first confirmed glyphosate resistant common waterhemp in Central and Southeast Texas. This was followed by the confirmation of resistant Southern High Plains in

Since that time, these researchers have conducted numerous field studies to provide recommendations for managing glyphosate resistant weeds as these populations have become more widespread. Given the fact that a single waterhemp or Palmer amaranth plant can shed 500,000 to 1 million seed, one weed left in the field is too many. What follows are recommendations for managing these weeds early in the season.

Often, the most competitive weeds are those that emerge prior to, or at the same time as the crop. These weeds are quite effective at competing for the same consumable environmental resources such as water, nutrients, and sunlight that the crop seedling needs for healthy growth. This is particularly important in cotton, which tends to have a slower growth rate as a seedling compared to other crops. This early-season competition is also highly detrimental to sorghum a pre-plant application of a herbicides at this point.
