JEFFERSON DISTRICT CONFERENCE. The nineteenth session of this conference met at Mt. Vernon, Franklin county, Texas, July 8th, at 9 o'clock a. m.

1. On the spiritual state of the church and the attendance upon the ordinances and social meetings of the church. We quote as follows from the report.

2. As to Missions, etc.: "There is considerable unoccupied territory in the bounds of the district; that Beiden circuit be changed to a mission; that Texarkana mission, Boston circuit and Ammona circuit be so arranged as to make three circuits and one mission."

3. Sunday schools. From this report we gather the following: "An increased interest in the Sunday-school work; that our literature is used with few exceptions; that schools are being established in new places; that the aggregate number of Sunday-schools is not as large as the aggregate church membership; that the membership of the church is not actively engaged in this work."

4. As to their financial systems, etc.: "Forty-three churches reported, valued at \$25,600; most of said churches in good repair; that the amount assessed for the support of the gospel has not been collected as it should have been; that the assessment plan is much the best; that those following the disciplinary plan are the most successful, and that this plan be adopted throughout the district; that every charge in the district has a parsonage except Beiden circuit, which is a new circuit; that all of these parsonages are in very good repair, with the exception of the one on the Coffeeville circuit; that steps be taken to secure a district parsonage."

5. On quarterly conference records the committee reported that the books presented had been properly kept. Several of the charges did not send up their records.

The report of the Committee on Books and Periodicals was so amended as to show that the amounts of books sold as reported from Daingerfield circuit was not the amount put into circulation on said circuit, but represented the amount sold by the pastor without limit of territory.

The Committee on Memoirs could not report, as they needed necessary data relating to Father Crawford, deceased.
