## CAUSE OF SLUMP

Extravazance in governmental expeditures since the Worid War is
the cause of the worldwide depression in the opinion of Col. Robert R
MeCormick, cditor and publisher of the Chicago Tribune, (Rep.) He
also declared at a convention of the Natonal Metal Trades Association
in New York recentiy, and added that as a result of this orgy of spend-
ing "all govermments are either bankrupt or on the road to bank-
ruptey."
Some of the Federal departments at Washington he characterized
as rackets and declored that money appropriated for all the departiments was not used entirely for the purposes intended. Before the war, he said. our public expenditures were $\$ 3.000 .000 .000$
a year. including state and local governments; five years later they exceed $\$ 10.000 .000 .000$, and for 1931 were more than $\$ 14.000 .000 .000$. Concerning the extravagance of the Federal departments at Wash-
ington and the manner in which appropriations are disbursed, Col. McCormick said
and will continue to prociaim it: "There is not a cabinet officer, there is not a member of Congress, who can demonstrate that one-half of the money appropriated for any department of goverrment is used for the
purpose designated. I will be more specific, not one-half of the money appropriated for the War Department is spent to make an army; n one-half of the money appropriated for the Navy Department is spent ment of Commerce, the Department of the Interior, the Department of which are supported by small elements of our population I am persuad.
