Present conditions indicate that this year's pecan crop will equal that of last year when 32,000,000 pounds were produced in Texas, according to J. H. Burkett, chief of the pecan division of the Department of Agriculture, who has just returned from an inspection trip over the West Texas pecan producher closing Piano Recital Thursday ing section.

"Prospects are bright for a large crop next season," he said. "Climatic conditions have been good and in those sections that did not pro-duce any pecans last year, the chief enemy of pecans-the case nut borer-has been eliminated to a large extent.

"The late freeze last season about ruined the crop from Brownwood northwest, which had the effect of thinning out the case nut borer. This season there should be but a few of these pests in that section to damage the crop. The surplus underground moisture this season, along with other ideal weather con-B. Charles Burden of Kingsville, Mo., owned a hunting dog called Old Drum, of which he was very fond. His neighbor, Leonidas Hornsby, bud lost a number of sheep which and been killed by dogs during the summer and fall of 1800. He threatened to kill the first dog who was found on his place. One day he had been hunting with Dick Ferguson and after they returned home a told Ferguson to shoot. The next morning Old Drum was found dead and Burden decided to make Hornsby suffer. He, therefore, sued him for \$50 damages. The first jury dissurved. The second jury gave him \$25 damages. He appealed the case. According to Vest's family, he was asked by Burden to assist his lawyer at the trial for a stipulated sum

of \$10. He took no part in the trial until the closing appeal to the jury. when, without either notice or prepuration, he made the well-known ap peal. Tears were in the eyes of

many members of the jury and a verdict of \$500 was allowed, but the court stated that this amount was in excess of the petition and could not be allowed.

Here, although there is no special admin-Istrative provision for gorillas, the animals are protected by the most stringent laws and it is doubiful whether the British government would allow the killing or capture of one of them under any circumstances.

There are only two or three thousand gorillas at the most, in the world. Gorilla land has a population of only about 1,000. In the past the great apes, who breed very slowly, have been slaughtered ruthlessly. Few have been brought into captivity. It would be impossible to capture an adult, and the capture of an infant usually has been possiwhole family. Father, mother and children stick together when danger threatens.

For centuries the art of shorthand fell into disuse. Modern shorthand dates from 1588, when Dr. Timothy Bright produced a system to which he gave the title Characterie.





#### CAUSE OF SLUMP

Extravagance in governmental expeditures since the World War is the cause of the world-wide depression in the opinion of Col. Robert R. McCormick, editor and publisher of the Chicago Tribune, (Rep.) He also declared at a convention of the National Metal Trades Association in New York recently, and added that as a result of this orgy of spending "all governments are either bankrupt or on the road to bankruptey.

Some of the Federal departments at Washington he characterized as rackets and declored that money appropriated for all the departments was not used entirely for the purposes intended.

Before the war, he said, our public expenditures were \$3,000,000,000 a year, including state and local governments; five years later they exceed \$10,000,000,000, and for 1931 were more than \$14,000,000,000.

Concerning the extravagance of the Federal departments at Washington and the manner in which appropriations are disbursed, Col. Mc-Cormick said

"If you ask me what is the alternative, I will make this statement and will continue to proclaim it: "There is not a cabinet officer, there is not a member of Congress, who can demonstrate that one-half of the money appropriated for any department of government is used for the purpose designated. I will be more specific; not one-half of the money appropriated for the War Department is spent to make an army; not one-half of the money appropriated for the Navy Department is spent to build, operate and maintain a combat fleet; not one-half of the money appropriated for the Post Office Department is spent to move the mails.

"As for the other great branches of the Government-the Department of Commerce, the Department of the Interior, the Department of Agriculture, are not much better than rackets. Rackets, I regret to say, which are supported by small elements of our population I am persuaded that they are receiving from them special benefits at the expense of the general taxpayer."


