

Since all the old hers and the past seasons pullets are being sold by the thousands due to the price of seed and the low price of eggs and since the number of chicks hatched during the present season will be less than for the past several years, therefore, the number of pullets to go into production this Fall will be less than for the past several years and the number of eggs produced will be less. This will naturally cause the price of eggs to be higher. than during the past year when the cold storage holdings were so enormous. This year due to the fact that cold storage men lost millions of dollars on storage eggs the past year, will not go so strong on storage holdings so the fresh egg will be in demand at a good price. The middle of summer should see the price of eggs on the upward climb with Fall prices the best in reveral years.




