



When Federal Liquor Agents' Guns Spat Death



"I find that a decent and law abiding citizen has been ruthlessly murdered." That is the state-ment of William McCraw, district attorney in Dallas, following investigation of the shooting to death of Marion McGlothlin, Dallas county country grocer, and the wounding of his wife by Federal Prohi-bition Agents L. C. Smith and N. D. Heaton. McGlothlin's country store was a rendezvous where the officers, posing as customers, were to meet a bootlegger and buy liquor. Mrs. McGlothlin says that their actions led her to suspect they were robbers. When she withdrew her pistol from under the coun-ter, it was shot from her hand. McGlothlin then got his shot gun and was shot to death by the agents. McGlothlin is shown upper left; his wife, head bandaged where one of the officers struck her with his pistol is upper right. Below is the scene of the tragedy.

Primarily the radio is a device for entertainment and instruction. and advertising should be but an incidental feature used only for defraging the cost of broadcasting. It takes but a turn of the dial to time out a program that is long on advertising and short on entertainment. Advertisers should realize this and not make their advertising se cotrusive as to defeat its value. Good will will sell more merchanthe long run than reiterations that alienate possible customers. To much talk is cheapening and disgusting.





The kidnaping of the Lindbergh baby has recalled many other simher crimes, a number of which baffled all efforts to apprehend the kidcapers or find a trace of the stolen children. Among them are the blowing.

Charlie Ross, stolen in Germantown, Pa., in 1874. Catherine Winters, kidnaped in Newcastle, Ind., in 1913. Jimmie Glass, abducted in Jersey City in 1915. Billy Gaffney, kidnaped in Brooklyn in 1927.

Children kidnaped and known to have been killed include the fol-Boring

Movd Kent, of Springfield, Mo., in 1917. Billy Dansey, of New gracy, in 1919. Bobby Franks, of Chicago, in 1924, for whose murder Leeb and Leopold are serving a life sentence. Marian Parker, of Los Angeles, for whose abduction and murder in 1927, William Hickman was corrocuted. Marian MeLean, kidnaped assaulted and killed in Cinmati in 1931, her murderer having confessed after capture.

In a number of cases kidnaped children were restored to their parunharmed, sometimes after payment of ransom.

When all of the bills have been passed. is expected that the reductions will he more than seven hundred million dollars below last year's appropria-110114

This is approximately one hur dred and fifty million dollars below the amount asked for by the President through the budget.

The House of Representatives has reduced the amount the President has asked in his budget recommindations every year for the last ten years since the budget law was enacted. The reductions this year wil be greater than they have ever been before. Howevr, I think they

should be still further reduced. The great problem before the American people is that of reducing the activities and expenses of govcrnment, local, state, and national.
